

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS
OF NORTH CAROLINA

MID PINES CLUB, SOUTHERN PINES, NORTH CAROLINA

January 10-12th, 1963

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The Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina met at the Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina, for the purpose of interviewing applicants for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license and other business.

Thursday, January 10th
8 P. M.

The Board convened for dinner and Drs. Frank Edmondson, President, Joseph J. Combs, Secretary-Treasurer, James E. Davis, H. Lee Large, Jr., W. Boyd Owen, Clark Rodman, Ralph G. Templeton, and Mrs. Louise J. McNeill, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, were present.

The members of the Board checked credentials for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license; also of foreign medical graduates who are to appear to petition to take the written examination in June, 1963.

RE: Written Examination - Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that the Board continue with the passing average of 75% and a minimum grade of 60%, Part I and Part II to be averaged separately. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. James E. Davis and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Velta F. Briuks-Cannon, Dillsboro, North Carolina -

The Board was given the following information by the secretary: That Dr. Cannon was graduated by the University of Latvia in 1943, licensed in Ohio and Tennessee; that she is married to a native of North Carolina; that a statement has been received from a physician in Sylva that her services were needed. That Dr. Cannon appeared before the Board May 1st, 1961, to petition for the privilege of taking the written examination, at which time the Board ruled that she be required to obtain the permanent certificate of the Educational Council of Foreign Medical Graduates, and if so, that she be permitted to take the written examination at a special examination in December, 1961. The Board was also advised that Dr. Cannon did not avail herself of this opportunity, but did obtain the permanent certificate of the ECFMG in October, 1962, and has advised that she wished to take the written examination at the earliest date.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that Dr. Velta F. Briuks-Cannon be allowed to take the written examination in June, 1963, as approved by the Board of Medical Examiners in May, 1961. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and passed unanimously.

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RE: Dr. Elizabeth Bremner
Dr. Albert J. Kaplan, husband and wife, appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Kaplan

Dr. Owen: You graduated from Jefferson in 1938. Where have you been since then?

A. I interned at Mt. Siani Hospital, Philadelphia, in the Army until 1945, six years, flight surgery, discharged as a major. I took a postgraduate course at the University of Pennsylvania in Psychiatry and Neurology and then had a fellowship at Jefferson in Psychoanalysis, Philadelphia General assistant to the chief in Psychiatry.

Q. You plan to do what in North Carolina?

A. The practice of Psychiatry

Q. Where?

A. Durham, Chapel Hill, Raleigh area, we would like to look over the Chapel Hill area. We are both interested in Child Psychiatry.

Q. It is definite you want to come into the state of North Carolina and do you intend to do full-time practice of Psychiatry?

A. Yes

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board?

A. No sir

Q. Have you personally used alcohol, barbiturates or narcotics to excess? A. No

Dr. Combs: What have you done in the past five years?

A. I have done some work in Philadelphia and Bucks County.

Q. Have you been in private practice?

A. I am in private practice.

Q. Where is your office?

A. Park Towne Place, Philadelphia

Dr. Owen: Are you limited to Child Psychiatry?

A. No

Dr. Bremner

Dr. Edmondson: Dr. Bremner, will you tell the Board what you have done since 1935.

A. Interned at Toledo Hospital, Toledo State Hospital, where I worked as assistant physician resident and fellow's capacity for eight years, insulin therapy, then went into Philadelphia Commonwealth fellowship in Child Psychiatry in 1944. After one year I went into the Army for two years in Psychiatry, then with the Bureau of Mental Hygiene in the State of Connecticut doing Child Psychiatry. While there I was asked to go to Western Reserve with the Department of Psychiatry to start Child Psychiatry clinic. I ran that clinic for 9 years. I then met and married Dr. Kaplan and left and came to Philadelphia and began full-time practice of Child and Adult Psychiatry and Analysis. In Philadelphia I have been in full-time practice and teacher at Hahnemann, work with children and adults, teacher in Philadelphia Association of Psychiatry and teach students.

Q. Is it your intention to work with Dr. Kaplan in his Psychiatry work?

A. We do not work together. We maintain separate offices.



Dr. Bremner continued

Dr. Edmondson: Is it your desire to do institutional or office Psychiatry?

A. My desire is to do more Child Psychiatry, which would mean working in clinics and hospitals. Private Psychiatry is more lucrative, but I like institutional work. I like both and I like teaching.

Dr. Combs: You do not have any connection at the present time in North Carolina with any institution?

A. No, we have become interested in the Durham-Raleigh area because of teaching institutions and also clinic in Durham. We had heard about Watts Hospital and I know they want a Child Psychiatrist in the Asheville area.

Dr. Edmondson: What motivated your decision to move to North Carolina?

A. I have relatives in North Carolina. I have always wanted to come back.

Q. When were you thinking about moving?

A. As a matter of fact we were running a panel and got to know some of the people in Chapel Hill and Duke and we thought we would try to make that locality. We had thought of the University of North Carolina and everything seemed to be working out but to take two people at that level the dean thought would throw the advancement program out of line so we let that drop. We have been asked to come and give seminars as soon as it could be arranged by some of the people at Duke.

Dr. Combs: You have not closed your offices in Philadelphia?

A. No, we can not.

Q. When would you move to North Carolina if you were licensed to-day?

A. I would say one and a half years to two years.

Q. North Carolina does not grant license on that basis. Your appearance is the policy of this Board. They may tell you your license is in effect and if you want to move next month, give the secretary the power to grant license. If it is next year, they may want you to make another appearance.

Q. Dr. Bremner, how do you wish your name?

A. Dr. Bremner

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No

Q. Have you ever personally taken alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Albert J. Kaplan was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if he moves and establishes a resident in the State of North Carolina for the practice of medicine within one year and if not, another appearance before the Board will be required.

VERDICT: Dr. Elizabeth Bremner was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if she moves and establishes a residence in the State of North Carolina for the practice of medicine within one year and if not, another appearance before the Board will be required.

RE: Dr. Tazewell Banks appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Lincoln Hospital, where he is a resident.

Dr. Edmondson: Where are you now?

A. Lincoln Hospital in Durham



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Dr. Banks continued

Dr. Edmondson: What have you done since 1957?

A. Army internship, one year in Germany, then two years in service. One year resident Freedman's and D. C. General, then six months at Freedman and now six months at Lincoln. I came there January 1st, 1963.

Dr. Templeton: What are your plans after six months at Lincoln?

A. One year at Mt. Alto and then two years cardiac fellowship and then teach at Freedman's.

Dr. Owen: What service are you on?

A. Medical service, affiliation with Duke and go there two days a week.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board or Narcotic Bureau? A. Never

Q. Have you ever personally taken alcohol, barbiturates or narcotics to excess? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Tazewell Banks was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Lincoln Hospital, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Walter Locke Bayard, a board certified Ophthalmologist, appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Edmondson: Will you tell the Board where you have been?

A. I interned at St. Lukes in Chicago, three year residency at the University of Illinois Eye and Ear Infirmary in Ophthalmology. I never planned to practice in Chicago because I did not care for the climate. I went in practice on a salary in Park Ridge, Illinois. He died six months after I went in with him. Even though I did not like the climate, I bought the practice from his wife and have been there 10 years. Finally my practice notwithstanding I decided I wanted to get in a satisfactory climate. Three years ago I started looking around and the first of October I was contacted by the Tryon group and liked it very much. We have moved down there.

Dr. Combs: You have already moved to Tryon?

A. Yes

Dr. Edmondson: Are you contemplating doing work in an institution or office work?

A. What do you mean by institution?

A. Hospital

Dr. Bayard: I plan to do surgery at the hospital there.

Dr. Combs: You have closed your office in Illinois?

A. Yes, I sold my practice there a month or two ago.

Dr. Edmondson: Were you alone?

A. I was alone. While in service, my father, who practiced in Chicago, came and held my practice together, then we practiced together until January, 1961, solo since then. I have been associate clinical instructor in Ophthalmology at the University of Illinois Medical School.



Dr. Bayard continued

Dr. Combs: You are ready to go to work?

A. Yes

Dr. Templeton : Have you rented an office?

A. I am going in with the medical group in Tryon and they are building quarters now, we have bought the equipment.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board? A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess?

A. No

Dr. Combs: Did they give you a guarantee?

A. Nominal guarantee and small salary for one year, then percentage starts.

VERDICT: Dr. Walter Locke Bayard was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. George Franklin Cox, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Edmondson: Dr. Cox, tell the Board where you have been since 1958.

A. One and a half years practice at home town of Pamlico because they were short a physician, last year in the hospital at Mullins on a salary.

Q. You are at present in Mullins as staff physician at the hospital?

A. Yes

Q. Are you on salary by the hospital?

A. Yes

Q. Where are you contemplating practicing?

A. Fairbluff, North Carolina

Q. What type of practice?

A. General practice

Q. What induced you to leave Mullins?

A. As I say I was on a salary. Dr. Bethea is leaving, the town would not be covered, and he induced me to go there.

Q. Have you served with the armed forces?

A. No sir

Dr. Combs: When do you plan to move to Fairbluff?

A. Immediately

Dr. Edmondson: Are you going to move your residence to Fairbluff?

A. Yes sir, I have already moved.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a state board of examiners?

A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess?

A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. George Franklin Cox, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.



RE: Dr. Joseph Wentworth Coxe appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Edmondson: Will you tell the Board what you have done since 1942.

A. I interned at Chester, South Carolina one year, Navy three years, residency at Chestnut Lodge Sanitarium, Rockville, Maryland, which was accredited at that time for two year Psychiatric residency. I worked for various clinics in Washington on a part-time basis for two years, part of the time in private practice. My office is now in Washington.

Q. Did you practice with a group?

A. Mostly alone

Q. Office work or institutional work?

A. Have had a few patients in the hospital.

Q. Are you contemplating practice in North Carolina?

A. Highland Hospital, Asheville

Q. Will you be a member of the staff at the hospital?

A. Yes sir, I had a lot of training in the Washington area, which is a little different from what you get down here. I think they want to try various disciplines.

Q. What connections did you have in North Carolina that induced you to come?

A. I did not have any. It was a job that appealed to me.

Dr. Edmondson: When are you planning to come to North Carolina?

A. February 1st.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been in any difficulty with any board of medical examiners? A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess?

A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph Wentworth Coxe was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Robert Stewart Darrow appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is located at Broughton Hospital.

Dr. Davis: Where were you from 1939 until you entered service?

A. Interned one year at D. C. General, then Galligher, University of Texas first year Psychiatric training 1941, 1941- September, 1942 served a fellowship in Psychiatry at the Institute of Living, Hartford, and then the Navy.

Dr. Edmondson: What are your plans?

A. I am contemplating remaining on the staff at Broughton Hospital.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. I have not.

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any state examining board?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess?

A. I have not.

Dr. Darrow was given ten days in which to complete his credentials.

VERDICT: Dr. Robert Stewart Darrow was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)



RE: Dr. Richard Edward Edmondson appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Davis: What type of work are you doing, anesthesiology?

A. Yes

Q. You do anticipate moving?

A. I have moved.

Q. You moved your family and are ready to go to work?

A. Yes

Q. In a hospital?

A. I have an agreement with Dr. Ben Ogle at Gaston Memorial Hospital. They have a nurse anesthetist and I understand they plan to get another nurse.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any board of medical examiners?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, barbiturates or narcotics? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Richard Edward Edmondson was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, provided his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary within 30 days. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Everlee G. Franks appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Lincoln Hospital, where he is a resident.

Dr. Davis: What is your status at Lincoln Hospital?

A. Assistant resident in Medicine. I have been there since January 1st, 1963, and will be there six months, then return to Freedman's. I then plan to do a fellowship in Cardiology and then practice in Durham or Raleigh.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any board of medical examiners?

A. No, I have not.

Q. Have you ever taken alcohol, barbiturates or narcotics to excess?

Dr. Davis stated that he was a very good man and is awaiting call to service. He is employed to operate the emergency room.

VERDICT: Dr. Walter Pitzer Garst was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Watts Hospital,

RE: Dr. Dorothy T. Griffith appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where she is a resident in Pathology.

Dr. Owen: What have you been doing since graduation?

A. I interned at the University of Tennessee Teaching Hospital, practiced two years in East Tennessee and came to Durham to take a residency in Pathology in July, 1960. I have been at the Veterans Administration Hospital most of the time.

Dr. Edmondson: What is your status now?

A. Assistant resident at Duke.

Dr. Davis: What are your plans on completion of residency?

A. I would like to go to Atlanta, I do not know.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any board of medical examiners?

A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess?

A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Dorothy T. Griffith was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, if and when her credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary.

RE: Dr. Anderson Page Harris appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is a native of North Carolina and plans to go with the Crowell Clinic, Charlotte, in Urology.

Dr. Combs: When are you going to move?

A. I have already moved.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board of medical examiners? A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics, barbiturates to excess? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Anderson Page Harris was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. John Leslie Humphreys, Jr. appeared October 12th, 1962, applying for license by endorsement of credentials, with incomplete credentials. His credentials are now complete and he has moved to Charlotte to do Ophthalmology.

A. Seven and a half years postgraduate training in Surgery, practiced in Syracuse nine years, then went back to the Hospital where I had my training and practiced six years in Warsaw, New York, Wyoming County Community Hospital.

Q. How long have you been in Salisbury?

A. Five and a half years

Q. Are you retired?

A. Yes

Q. What are your activities?

A. I purchased about four acres, built a home, hobby woodworking. I am on the Executive Council for Boy Scouts in America, District Commissioner Boy Scouts in that area.

Q. What do you wish to do?

A. I do not want to go back to private practice, but you can imagine I have free time and would like to utilize it. I have part-time position offered with the Mecklenburg County Health Department, about 20 hours a week.

Dr. Combs: Are you going to move?

A. No, I will commute.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a board of medical examiners?

A. Never

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess? A. No

Dr. Large: Why did you have to resign your active practice at an early age?

A. I had enough money to retire and at that time fifty per cent of my classmates were dead.

VERDICT: Dr. James D. Norris was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Ivan Lee Peacocke appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Pathology.

Dr. Large: Tell the Board what you have done?

A. Interned, Internal Medicine at Bowman Gray, assistant resident in Pathology next year, two years in the Navy.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any board of medical examiners?

A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics, barbiturates to excess? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Ivan Lee Peacocke was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary.



RE: Dr. Joseph E. Paul applied for license by endorsement of credentials, but was advised that he would be unable to obtain license by endorsement of credentials as his Minnesota license was based on the National Board of Medical Examiners certificate. Dr. Paul requested to appear at this time as he plans to take the examination of a state medical board at the earliest time as he plans to locate in Tryon to practice Radiology.

A. Tentative plans - it looks as though I will not stay in North Carolina.

Q. How long will you be here?

A. Until July 1st.

A. University of California as football team physician, then to Bowman Gray internship, Santa Barbara California.

RE: Dr. George McVay Rawlins appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials and stated that he planned to practice in Franklin, North Carolina, upon completion of his internship.

Dr. Rodman: Are you going to join a group or solo?

A. No a group with Drs. Angel and Conn.

Dr. Combs: When do you plan to start?

A. July 1st

Dr. Rodman: Do you plan to do general practice?

A. Yes

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any board of medical examiners?

A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, narcotics or barbiturates to excess?

A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. George McVay Rawlins was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, when he locates in the state.

RE: Dr. John Sidney Rice appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that since internship he had been in the regular Army and at present is chief of Dermatology at Fort Bragg; that he is to retire in April, 1963.

Dr. Rodman: Where do you plan to locate?

A. Hickory - no other dermatologist there.

Q. How did you happen to choose Hickory?

A. One of the drug detail men told me of some of the nice locations in the western part of the State. We made a trip there and were most impressed with Hickory and other communities.

Dr. Combs: Have you made any definite move, do you know you can get office space and house?

A. They could. I have not heard of any such case.

VERDICT: Dr. John Sidney Rice was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he locates in the state for the practice of medicine, within one year.



RE: Dr. Lillian Louisa Rich appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. She stated that she had moved to Black Mountain, North Carolina.

Dr. Rodman: You have expressed an intention to move to Black Mountain?

A. I am there, I am building a home.

Q. What type of practice?

A. General practice, part time.

Q. Where did you practice?

Q. Are you planning to hold regular office hours?

A. Not at the moment, not within the next month or two, after that I do.

Dr. Owen: Will you make house calls?

A. Yes, surely.

Dr. Rodman: You practiced 1940-62 in one location?

A. In Washington, Illinois in general practice.

Dr. Edmondson: Are you contemplating limited your work, no obstetrics?

A. I would not say I would not go out and deliver a baby if they needed me, but I would want to limited to internal medicine. I would not refuse anyone.

A. Mixed, basically internal medicine. When in service I was placed into service in the Psychiatric Division, which was a valuable

experience. After I came back I decided on the basis of my Army experience this was a pretty necessary thing and I wanted to know more about it and arranged to go to Philadelphia and took postgraduate work, mainly a personal analysis, under Dr. English at Temple from 1947-53. RE: Dr. Manuel de Jesus Rodriguez, graduate of the University of Havana in 1959, appeared petitioning for the privilege of taking the written examination for licensure. He is presently at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Durham.

Dr. Large: You came to the United States when?

A. In October, 1960.

Q. Where did you take your training?

A. Thomas General Hospital, El Paso, Texas

Dr. Rodriguez presented his immigrant card and photograph on file was compared with this card.

Q. If you take this examination, you should understand if granted license, this will be limited to the area in which you are working and you will be given six years in which to become a citizen, and if not obtained, license will become null and void.

Dr. Edmondson: What type of work do you contemplate?

A. I plan to do general practice in some small town in Eastern North Carolina.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No, never

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical board of examiners? A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol to excess, narcotics or barbiturates?

A. No, never

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that Dr. Manuel de Jesus Rodriguez be granted the privilege of taking the written examination in June, 1963; that if he is successful in passing the same, his license to be limited geographically until citizenship obtained, within six years or the same to become null and void. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Bhupendra Lal Sen, graduate of the Calcutta University, India in 1952, was granted special limited license in July, 1959, to the Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium, where he remained for one year. He has returned to this institution on the staff and has requested that his special limited license be extended to cover him until he can obtain license. He is to petition for the privilege of taking the written examination.

Dr. Sen stated that he has finished three years residency training in medicine, in New Jersey and the University of Pennsylvania, then came to Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium for one year in 1959; that he then went back to England in postgraduate medical school and got the specialty board in England; that he returned in November. He presented immigration card, and photograph on file compared with the same.

Dr. Sen asked if he could waive examination; that he had to go through the examination he would.

Dr. Combs: Doctor, you would not have to practice in North Carolina. If you want to practice in North Carolina, you had better petition to take the examination.

A. Yes

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a state medical board? A. No, not so far.

Q. Have you ever taken alcohol to excess, narcotics or barbiturates?

A. No



Dr. Sen continued

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Bhupendra Lal Sen's application for extension of his special limited license to the Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium be approved to August 1st, 1963.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Bhupendra Lal Sen's petition to waive examination be denied and that he be granted the privilege of taking the written examination in June, 1963; that if he is successful in passing the same, his license to be limited geographically until citizenship obtained, within six years or the same to become null and void. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Mary Gwendolen Russell Smith, graduate of the London Hospital Medical College in 1956, appeared petitioning for the privilege of taking the written examination for licensure in June, 1963.

Dr. Templeton: You know that if the Board approves you for the examination, the license would be limited geographically until citizenship obtained, within six years, or the same to become null and void.

Dr. Edmondson: If you pass our state board examinations, are you contemplating working in North Carolina?

A. Yes sir

Q. What type of work?

A. Public health

Dr. Combs: How long have you been in this country?

A. Since February, 1961.

Dr. Smith presented immigrant visa.

Dr. Combs: What did you do in New York State?

A. New York City Health Department

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a board of medical examiners?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever personally used alcohol to excess, narcotics or barbiturates? A. No sir

Dr. Combs: Your duties with the Board of Health will be what?

A. I do not have a position with them. I hope to work in Guilford County. I live in Greensboro.

Dr. Edmondson: What work are you doing at the present?

A. Sitting on my hands.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that Dr. Mary Gwendolen Smith be granted the privilege of taking the written examination in June, 1963; that if she is successful in passing the same, her license to be limited geographically until citizenship obtained, within six years or the same to become null and void. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Vamik Djamel Volkan, graduate of the University of Ankara, Turkey, in 1956, appeared petitioning for the privilege of taking the written examination. Dr. Volkan was granted special limited license to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine in June, 1958, where he was a resident in Psychiatry, and later transferred to Dorothea Dix Hospital, where he is presently located. He has participated in the five-year Psychiatric program. Dr. Volkan presented his immigrant card and photograph on file was compared with the same.



Dr. Volkan continued

Dr. Rodman: How far are you along in your training?

A. This is my last month. I took the Virginia examination in December. I now have a Virginia license. I do not know the policy of reciprocity.

Q. What are your intentions as to practice?

A. I just became an immigrant and I do not know and it was difficult to make plans. The last two years I have been doing research with Dr. Abse at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. Dr. Abse has moved to the University of Virginia and he wants me to join him and finish the study. This is one thing I am thinking about. I talked with Dr. Hargrove about possibilities in the State Hospital system. Unofficially I talked with Dr. Ewing about joining the staff at the University of North Carolina of Medicine. Right now I do not know what I am going to choose. If I stay in the State Hospital system, I would like to get a project as my project is dealing with schyzophrenia. I have some papers that have been accepted. I think this a most important thing for me at this time. The State Hospital system has a program right now, especially at Dorothea Dix and I am involved in that. This is something I like very much. I think there is opportunity for me to carry on with this program. My wife is from Indiana. I have been here five years.

Dr. Edmondson: If you take our state board, you contemplate staying in North Carolina?

A. Yes

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any board of medical examiners? A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol to excess, narcotics or barbiturates?

A. No

Dr. Combs: We do not give license by endorsement to graduates of foreign medical schools. Would you know by May whether you would stay in North Carolina? When would your possibilities culminate?

A. By May - suppose I would like to finish a study and go to Virginia for one or two years and come back? Is it possible, if I am in Virginia to come and take the examination this year and come to North Carolina in two years?

A. The Board will have to decide. Usually they expect you to plan to stay here if you take the examination.

VERDICT: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that Dr. Vamik Djamal Volkan be granted the privilege to take the written examination in June, 1963, if he is living in North Carolina at the time, license to be limited geographically until citizenship obtained, within six years, or the same to become null and void. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Joseph J. Combs and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Claudius McGowan - Dr. McGowan was requested to appear at this time because of alleged narcotic violation. (See reports of the State Bureau of Investigation on file) Investigation was made due to complaints received by the State Bureau of Investigation with regard to a registered nurse alleged to be addicted to narcotic drugs. In the course of the investigation it was learned that this nurse had worked at different times for Dr. McGowan; that on two occasions he had sent her away for treatment of narcotic addiction; that his safe was reportedly broken into and narcotic drugs stolen, which officers believed to be an inside job; that Dr. McGowan had prescribed narcotic drugs for one Fannie Carr, whom he had not seen nor examined; that he had not kept narcotic records. That Dr. McGowan was instructed by the state narcotic agent that the law required him to keep a detailed record of all narcotic he dispensed in his office and that Dr. McGowan stated he was not going to dispense any more narcotics to anyone. That later Dr. McGowan was interviewed by the narcotic agent, at which time Dr. McGowan admitted dispensing narcotics in his office by



Dr. McGowan continued

hypodermic since previous interviews; that he still had not kept a record of any narcotics dispensed except in cases where he had charts on patients and noted the same on the chart. That the agent asked Dr. McGowan to surrender his tax stamp and he stated, "You can get a warrant, but it will take 12 men to tell me I have to give it up. I am not going to surrender it." State Narcotic Agent F. E. Epps appeared at this time and reported to the Board on the investigation, at which time he was asked by the Board to follow up and ascertain if Dr. McGowan was complying with the law.

Dr. McGowan denied that he had used narcotics personally, he stated his nurse was addicted to narcotics, that he did not know who broke into his safe and stole narcotic drugs; that the nurse had admitted some forgeries; that she was not now working for him and could not again; he admitted he had not kept records of narcotics dispensed in his office. The Board instructed Dr. McGowan as to the narcotic laws and advised him that it is necessary that he comply with the same.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that this be accepted as information with regard to Dr. Claudius McGowan. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Franklin S. Kincheloe, Jr. was requested to appear at this meeting as a routine interview while under the surveillance of the Board.

Just prior to this meeting a report came to the Board that Dr. Kincheloe had engaged in some questionable practice in his office in Selma. Upon being questioned by the Board he stated that the wife of a sergeant stationed at a nearby military base upon whom he had done a vasectomy a year ago, reported to him with the menstrual period 10 days over due. That he instructed the couple to have intercourse and come to his office, which was done, and that there was secretion found in the vagina, but no sperm. That he had her return to his office the next day for an endometrial biopsy; that she had had a thyroidectomy and he thought she might have endocrine trouble. That he found no indication of pregnancy upon examination. That an attempt to do the biopsy without anesthesia was made, but on account of pain gave her sodium pentothal; that he felt the uterus was posterior on examination, inserted the dilator in the cervix upside down and found it was anterior; that when the dilator was withdrawn it was followed by gut. That he immediately admitted her to the hospital under the care of Dr. Frank Barnes. That two days later Dr. Barnes did a gut resection and anastomosis. That she had a foot of gangrenous bowel and a small tear in the posterior wall of the uterus, at which time Dr. Barnes felt she was about two months pregnant. Six days later she continued to bleed, a dilatation and curettage was done and the entire placenta and uterus were taken out.

Upon being questioned he said the endometrial biopsy was done in his office at seven P. M.; that his secretary was there; that it was his nurse's day off.

Upon first being questioned, Dr. Kincheloe stated that he thought everything in Selma had been taken care of and upon further questioning said that a conference was held by the staff and the hospital, the facts were reviewed; that it was the opinion that he was guilty of using poor judgment, but that he was not attempting to abort the patient. Dr. Kincheloe freely stated that he was guilty of using poor judgment. Upon inquiry he stated he had done about six vasectomies in his office in the past year without consultation.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the president advise Dr. F. S. Kincheloe, Jr. that this Board is familiar with his past record; that he be admonished for this occurrence he has just described; that he be advised the Board of Medical Examiners will seek additional

information and the Board will get in touch with him later. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. James E. Davis and passed unanimously. (See p. 69 these Minutes)

The meeting was adjourned.

The Minutes of the organizational meeting of the Board held June 18th, 1962, at the Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, North Carolina, were read as follows:

"The newly elected Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina, which will take office November 1st, 1962, met for an orientation period with the present Board of Medical Examiners during its meeting June 17-21st, 1962. This meeting consisted of the annual written examination and other business.

"This Board held an organizational meeting June 18th, 1962, at 5:00 P. M. The following members were present:

"Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that Dr. Joseph J. Combs be elected secretary-treasurer and this motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and passed unanimously.

"Dr. James E. Davis moved that the first meeting of this Board be held at Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina, January 10-13th, 1963. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

"The members selected the following subjects in which to examine for the written examination:

"Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the June 17-22nd, 1963 date be set for the next annual written examination. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. and passed unanimously.

"The meeting was adjourned."

Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that these Minutes be ratified. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Wiley Royster Young - To summarize, Dr. Young appeared before the Board of Medical Examiners in October, 1962, and petitioned for reinstatement of his license to practice medicine. The Board requested that he take a three months postgraduate course in medicine, the course to be approved by the secretary of the Board, after which consideration would be given for reinstatement of his license to practice medicine.

The secretary advised that Dr. Young came to the office and stated he had written three three medical schools in the state; that he could not get a postgraduate course, but submitted lectures available and stated he could make rounds. It was the concensus of the Board that it would be necessary for him to have three months postgraduate work satisfactory to the Board.

RE: Dr. Teruko O. Little, graduate of the Tokyo Women's College, Japan, 1951, has applied to the Board as a psychiatric resident for two years at the Durham Veterans Administration- Duke Hospital training program. She has been licensed in the States of Virginia and Ohio. She has not received the certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates. The chief of the Psychiatric Service at the Durham Veterans Administration Hospital has requested information as to whether or not Dr. Little will be eligible for residency training there.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that in the case of Dr. Teruko O. Little that the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners agrees to accept her license in the State of Virginia in lieu of the certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates; that special limited license be granted upon appearance and presentation of credentials for one year of residency training at the Durham Veterans Administration - Duke University School of Medicine, subject to renewal for one year; that this does not imply that she would be considered for permanent license in this state without the permanent certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James Valentine Thomas - (See previous Minutes) - The secretary reported to the Board that he had received letter from Dr. John S. McKee, Jr., Superintendent of Broughton Hospital at Morganton, that Dr. Thomas, after receiving the order of the Board dated October 12th, 1962, requested extended sick leave and had not been on duty at Broughton Hospital since November 5th, 1962. He also said he advised Dr. Thomas to seek treatment; that he had not informed him of any final decision about continuing as a staff member at Broughton Hospital, but at the present was not inclined to accept him for return to duty. Dr. McKee also stated that Dr. Thomas was readmitted to John Umstead Hospital, Butner, on December 12th, 1962, under court order. He said that he was in need of prolonged therapy.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the above with regard to Dr. James Valentine Thomas be received as a matter of information. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Dennis Dickenson Carmichael was granted license limited to the State Hospitals on the basis of written examination June 20th, 1957, until citizenship obtained. Dr. Carmichael presented to the secretary's office naturalization certificate number 8491565 dated November 30th, 1962, and applied for conversion to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the geographical restriction be removed from the license to practice medicine of Dr. Dennis Dickenson Carmichael and that full license be granted. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Ladislaw Peter was granted license limited to the State Hospitals on the basis of written examination on June 19th, 1958, until citizenship obtained. Dr. Peter presented to the secretary's office naturalization certificate number 8491566 dated November 30th, 1962, and applied for conversion to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the geographical restriction be removed from the license to practice medicine of Dr. Ladislaw Peter and that full license be granted. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Nicholas Emanuel Stratas was granted license limited to the State Hospitals until citizenship obtained, on the basis of endorsement from the State of Virginia on July 22nd, 1960. He was granted by the University of Toronto, Canada, in 1957. The Virginia license was limited also until citizenship obtained. Dr. Stratas presented to the secretary's office naturalization certificate number 8491580 dated November 30th, 1962. The secretary of the Virginia Board of Medical Examiners advised on December 19th, 1962, that Dr. Stratas was now permanently licensed in the State of Virginia on the basis of full United States citizenship. Dr. Stratas has applied for full license in this state.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the geographical restriction be removed from the license to practice medicine of Dr. Nicholas Emanuel Stratas and that full license be granted. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Harold Sylvester Pride was granted license limited to the Good Samaritan Hospital October 7th, 1960, to cover him as a resident. He has applied for conversion of limited to full license as he planned to locate for private practice in Charlotte during the month of January, 1963. He has met the requirements of the Board.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the geographical restriction be removed from the license of Dr. Harold Sylvester Pride and that full license be granted. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Joseph E. Donlan's license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina was suspended in 1958 for failure to register the same.

The Board has received information from the New York Board of Medical Examiners that Dr. Donlan's license to practice medicine in the State of New York was revoked, the execution of the revocation was stayed and he was placed on probation for a period of three years commencing March 3rd, 1962. One of the terms of the probation required that Dr. Donlan submit once in three months to a physician for a physical examination and that each such examination shall disclose that the subject has continued to avoid excessive use of alcohol; that the examining physician shall render an opinion or report to that effect. And further that Dr. Donlan shall refrain from engaging in the practice of medicine beyond the State of New York without having specific permission from the Commissioner of Education.

On November 16th, 1962, the New York Board of Medical Examiners advised that Dr. Donlan has obtained such permission and as far as that Division is concerned, he may now practice in the State of North Carolina.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that the secretary endeavor to ascertain the address of Dr. Joseph E. Donlan. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Ralph G. Templeton and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Henry Eugene Barnes, Jr. - The secretary advised he had received a letter from Dr. Glenn R. Frye of Hickory under date of December 4th, 1962, stating that Dr. Barnes had entered the Government Hospital in Kentucky for narcotic addiction.

RE: Dr. J. R. Medlin, Jr. - A routine report received from Dr. James L. Cathell, Superintendent of the John Umstead Hospital, dated December 14th, 1962, related that Dr. Medlin's work and behavior have been above reproach since the last report; that he has shown more interest in his work; that for the past six months his family has been at Butner and seem happy in their new environment.

RE: Dr. Franklin B. Wilkins - The secretary presented copy of routine report to the California Board of Medical Examiners dated December 20th, 1962, stating that he had complied with the terms of his probation; that he had not been charged or convicted with the use or distribution of any narcotics or other harmful drugs; that he had not violated city, county or state laws or been arrested. This was received as information by the Board.

RE: Dr. S. A. Pope - The secretary presented routine report from the chief of police of Beulaville, North Carolina dated December 8th, 1962, stating that Dr. Pope is doing fine and that no complaint has been brought to him. This was received as information.

RE: Dr. A. E. Perry - The secretary presented routine report from the chief of staff of Good Samaritan Hospital dated December 7th, 1962, stating Dr. Perry has continued his practice at Good Samaritan Hospital in accordance with previous directives; that he has adhered to the constitution and by-laws of the hospital. This was received as information.

RE: Written Examination - It was decided by the Board that the examination questions were to be in the office of the secretary by May 1st.

RE: Grades Written Examination - Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the grades following the written examination be in the office of the secretary by July 15th, 1963, Dr. Ralph G. Templeton duly seconded this motion and the same was passed unanimously.

RE: Narcotic Talk - Written Examination - Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. be asked to give the talk on narcotics at the written examination in June, 1963, and preview the films. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: July, 1963 Meeting - Dr. James E. Davis moved that the meeting be held at the Mayview Manor, Blowing Rock, July 25-28th, 1963. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. and was passed unanimously.

RE: October, 1963 Meeting - Dr. Clark Rodman moved that the meeting be held at the Sedgfield Inn, Greensboro, October 10-13th, 1963. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Ralph G. Templeton and passed unanimously.

RE: January, 1964 Meeting - Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that the meeting be held at the Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, January 9 - 12th, 1964. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.



RE: Federation of State Medical Boards Meeting - Dr. James E. Davis moved that each member of the Board be allowed \$300.00 for expenses for the Federation of State Medical Boards meeting. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned.

RE: Dr. Alton Lane Bullard appeared by order of the Board of Medical Examiners, without counsel, as follows:

"You are hereby given notice that at its regular meeting at Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina, Saturday, January 12th, 1963, at 9:00 A. M., the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina will hear evidence concerning whether or not you have violated the conditions upon which the Board of Medical Examiners' Order revoking your license to practice medicine was suspended as set forth in its Order of January 6th, 1961, and at which time and place it will consider and determine whether or not the said Order of this Board should be put into effect and your license to practice medicine revoked.

"You are notified and requested to appear before this Board at the said time and place for said hearing, at which time the Board will hear any evidence you wish to present, which is pertinent to the question of whether or not you have complied with the conditions as set forth in this Board's aforesaid Order of January 6th, 1961.

"By Order of the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina this 10th day of December, 1962."

Attorney John H. Anderson appeared on behalf of the Board. He presented Charges and Accusations dated November 29th, 1960, and Findings and Order dated January 6th, 1961, as follows:

"CHARGES AND ACCUSATIONS"

- "1. That before March 5th, 1958 you were addicted to the use of alcoholic beverages, and you consumed intoxicating liquor to the extent and in such manner as to impair your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public.
- "2. That on or about July 10th, 1959 you were intoxicated and under the influence of intoxicating liquor in Grover City, County of San Luis Obispo, State of California, to the extent and in such manner as to be dangerous to yourself, to other persons and to the public and to the extent that such use impaired your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public.
- "3. That on or about October 24th, 1959 you were intoxicated and under the influence of intoxicating liquor in Grover City, County of San Luis Obispo, State of California, to the extent and in such manner as to be dangerous to yourself, to other persons and to the public and to the extent that such use impaired your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public.
- "4. That during the month of May, 1959 you were intoxicated and under the influence of intoxicating liquor in Grover City, State of California to the extent and in such manner as to be dangerous to yourself, to other persons and to the public and to the extent that such use impaired your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public.



Dr. Alton Lane Bullard continued

- "5. That on or about December 24th, 1959 you were intoxicated and under the influence of intoxicating liquor in Grover City, State of California to the extent and in such manner as to be dangerous to yourself, to other persons and to the public and to the extent that such use impaired your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public.
- "6. That in April, 1960 you were intoxicated and under the influence of intoxicating liquor in California at various times to such an extent that you were dangerous to yourself, to other persons and to the public and to the extent that such use impaired your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public and that during said month you were convicted of operating a motor vehicle under the influence of intoxicant.
- "7. That in September, October and November, 1960 at Newton Grove, North Carolina and vicinity you were intoxicated and were under the influence of intoxicating liquor to the extent and in such manner as to be dangerous to yourself, to other persons and to the public and to the extent that such use impaired your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public.
- "8. That on November 6th, 1960, while attempting and purporting to be attending patients and holding yourself out for the practice of medicine, you were intoxicated and were under the influence of intoxicating liquor to the extent and in such manner as to be dangerous to yourself, to the other persons and to the public and to the extent that such use impaired your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public; that at said time and place you drew a gun on and threatened to shoot a patient, you refused to attend a patient and to deliver a baby for a patient, namely Mrs. David Sport, you refused to leave your clinic or office to examine a patient who needed and required your attention, you drew a gun upon and threatened to shoot one Robert Allen Barefoot, you engaged in an affray with one Sherrill Knowles, and that you refused to treat and pulled a gun on another patient at said time and place.
- "9. That your present mental condition renders you incapable of safely practicing medicine and impairs your ability to practice medicine and surgery with safety to the public.
- "10. That in the foregoing respects you have been guilty of dishonorable conduct unworthy of and affecting the practice of your profession and grounds exist for the revocation of your license to practice medicine issued by this Board.

By Order of the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina, this 29th day of November, 1960."

"FINDINGS AND ORDER"

"At a regular meeting of the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina, on January 6th, 1961, at Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina, pursuant to notice to Alton Lane Bullard, M. D., a hearing was held upon the charges and accusations presented against him.

"After full consideration of the evidence and the statements of Alton Lane Bullard, M. D. concerning the charges and accusations made at the hearing as appear in the record, the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina found and concluded that the respondent, Alton Lane Bullard, M. D., was guilty of dishonorable conduct



Dr. Alton Lane Bullard continued

" unworthy of and affecting the practice of his profession and that grounds existed for the revocation of his license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina.

"Whereupon, it was ordered and is hereby ordered that the license of Alton Lane Bullard, M. D. to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina be revoked, and that he surrender his certificate of licensure issued by the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina to the secretary of this Board, but that this order and revocation be suspended and not be put into effect upon the following conditions and provided:

- "1. That for a period of three years he refrain from practicing medicine in any respect except in employment in and by an institution operated by the State of North Carolina or the Federal Government;
- "2. That for a period of three years he be and remain of good behavior and not violate any state or Federal laws;
- "3. That during said time he obtain psychiatric therapy for such period or periods of time as may be advised by a psychiatrist, and
- "4. That for a period of three years he personally report to the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina or one of its members every six months to show his compliance with the conditions upon which the order of revocation has been suspended.

"Entered by order of the Board this the 6th day of January, 1961."

Attorney Anderson presented the following:

1. Certified copy of traffic violation and judgment of the General County Court of Wilson County, North Carolina, to-wit: Operate a motor vehicle on the highways of North Carolina while under the influence of some alcoholic beverage on Thursday, the 26th day of November, 1962, at 12:20 A. M. in Wilson County, North Carolina; Defendant pleads guilty - Judgment \$100.00 and costs.
2. Letter from Dr. Malcolm D. Kemp, Medical Director, Pinebluff Sanitarium, Inc., dated July 21, 1962, as to admission April 20, 1962 - discharged May 25, 1962.
3. Letter from Drs. Francis J. Kane, Jr. and Donald E. Widmann, Department of Psychiatry, University of North Carolina School of Medicine, dated July 13, 1962 - admission there March 6, 1962 - March 14, 1962, because of alcoholism.
4. Letter from Dr. Willard E. Lee, Jr., Director Wilson County Mental Health Clinic
5. Letter from Dr. H. F. Easom, Medical Director of the Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium, dated January 11th, 1963.

Dr. Bullard was asked if he wished to make any statement, though not required to do so, being without counsel and knowing that anything he said might be considered by the Board of Medical Examiners either for or against him in considering the disposition. Dr. Bullard stated that insofar as he knew the information presented was in essence correct; that he did not know whether original accusations were true or not as he did not remember; that as to the traffic violation, driving under the influence of



alcohol, he plead guilty because it was true. He said he was working as a staff physician at the Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the Board of Medical Examiners finds that Dr. Alton Lane Bullard has violated the terms and conditions upon which the order of revocation of license to practice medicine was suspended as set out in the Board's Findings and Order of January 6th, 1961, in several respects, particularly with respect to the use of alcohol, and that the order of revocation should be put into effect forthwith, and accordingly the order of revocation of January 6th, 1961, is put into effect and Dr. Alton Lane Bullard's license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina is hereby revoked. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. James E. Davis and passed unanimously.

RE: Biennial Registration of Physicians - Suspension - Following notice given by mail for failure to register as required by law that he appear before the Board of Medical Examiners at 12 o'clock noon, January 12th, 1963, at the Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina, the secretary reported to the Board that the following physician listed below had failed to register as required by law and failed to appear before the Board. Upon motion of Dr. Joseph J. Combs and seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman, it was resolved that the license of the physician listed below be suspended for failure to register as required by General Statutes of North Carolina 90-15.11:

RE: Biennial Registration - Reinstatement - The licenses of the following physicians were suspended for failure to register as required by General Statutes of North Carolina 90-15.11 and have registered:

Dr. Stuart H. Shippey, Jr.

Dr. Pierre Antoine Finck

VERDICT: RESOLVED that the medical licenses of the above physicians be reinstated.

RE: Annual Audit 1962 - The Finance Committee reported on the audit. VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved to adopt the report of the auditor, this motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and was passed unanimously.

The Board instructed the secretary to investigate and probably purchase a stamping, mailing machine.

The meeting was adjourned.
