

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS
OF NORTH CAROLINA

Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina

January 13 - 15th, 1966

The Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina met at the Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina January 13-15th, 1966, for the purpose of interviewing applicants for license by endorsement of credentials, special limited license and for other business.

Thursday, January 13th
6:00 P. M.

The Board convened for dinner. Drs. Clark Rodman, President, Joseph J. Combs, Secretary-Treasurer, James E. Davis, Frank Edmondson, W. Boud Owen and Ralph G. Templeton were present. Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. was absent at this time. All members of the Board were present for further sessions.

Credentials for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license were reviewed by the Board.

RE: Dr. Carl Casper Warren, Jr. - The secretary reported on letter from Dr. Warren's psychiatrist that Dr. Warren had been under his care; that he remains well, is mentally stable and that reports from his work situation are highly favorable; that every indication is toward an excellent outcome; that he would continue to treat him intermittently, but that formal treatment is not indicated.

The above report was received as information by the Board.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Carl Casper Warren be requested to appear before the Board in June, 1966. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Biennial Registration - Reinstatement - The license to practice medicine of the following physicians was suspended for failure to register as required by General Statutes of North Carolina 90-15.00 and they have registered.

RE: Dr. Charles William Erwin was granted license, limited to Duke University School of Medicine to cover him as resident. He is now in a research position at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Durham, holds the rank of instructor at Duke University School of Medicine and has been offered position as consultant at Cherry Hospital. He has applied for conversion of limited to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the license of Dr. Charles William Erwin be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James Wiley Gibson was granted license limited to Duke University School of Medicine to cover him as a resident. He is employed at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Salisbury. He has been asked to serve as consultant on athletic injuries for Catawba College and has applied for conversion of full to limited license.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of Dr. James Wiley Gibson be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Robert Lee Green, Jr. was granted limited license to Duke University School of Medicine. He has been chief of the Psychiatric Service at the Veterans Hospital and has now been appointed to the staff as an associate professor and has applied for conversion of his limited license to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that the limited license of Dr. Robert Lee Green, Jr. be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. George Vernon Irons, Jr. was granted limited license to Duke University School of Medicine. He stated that he would complete his training there June 30th, 1966 and planned to practice Internal Medicine in Charlotte, to be associated with the Nalle Clinic.

VERDICT: Dr. George Vernon Irons, Jr. was approved for conversion of his limited to full license. This motion was duly ~~passed~~ ^{seconded and} passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Serhij Sochocky was granted limited license to the North Carolina State Sanatoria following written examination in 1960. He has now furnished evidence of naturalization and has applied for conversion of his limited to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the limited license of Dr. Serhij Sochocky be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Nickolaj Petrov was granted limited license to Craven County, North Carolina following written examination in 1963. He has advised he has obtained naturalization and has requested conversion of his limited to full license. He also stated that he had changed his name and desired the necessary change on the certificate; that his name was changed as per his naturalization.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license be converted to full license and that the name be changed if all requirements are met. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. (Requirements met)

RE: Dr. Freddie Clarence Butler, Jr.- The secretary presented petition from Dr. Butler for change of his name in the records of the Board to Frederick Clarence Butler, Jr. Certified copy of court order so changing his name was also presented.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that the name of Dr. Freddie Clarence Butler, Jr. be changed to Frederick Clarence Butler, Jr. in the records of the Board of Medical Examiners. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Audit November 1st, 1964 - October 31st, 1965 - The Finance Committee, Drs. W. Boyd Owen, Chairman, and Frank Edmondson reported on the audit. Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr., another member of this committee, was absent.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that this audit be accepted as reviewed. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Ralph G. Templeton and passed unanimously.

Roster of Registered Physicians- The secretary discussed the many previous problems in having the roster printed by a state facility, which has been done in the past.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the secretary get competitive bids and that authority to let the contract for the printing of the roster for 1966 be given to the officers of the Board. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Ralph G. Templeton and passed unanimously.

RE: Meetings of the Board of Medical Examiners

Dr. James E. Davis moved that the October 6-9th, 1966 meeting be held at the Blockade Runner, Wrightsville Beach, North Carolina.

Dr. James E. Davis moved that the January 5-8th, 1967 meeting be held at the Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, North Carolina.

RE: 1967 Written Examination

It was agreed by the members of the Board that the questions for the written examination be in the office of the secretary by May 1st, 1966.

Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the grades for the written examination be in the office of the secretary by July 11th, 1966. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Robert Steele Boring appeared on May 3rd, 1965 and was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he located in the state, within one year. He reported on November 15th, 1965, that he had been extended on active duty in the Navy until October, 1966, and he requested that he be allowed an extension of time to locate in the state.

VERDICT: The Board directed that Dr. Robert Steele Boring be given an extension of one year without making another appearance. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Alabama Board of Medical Examiners - At the October, 1965 meeting of the Board, the secretary was instructed that it would be unable to accept endorsement from another state unless it supplied grades on the basic science subjects, as well as clinical subjects. This was precipitated because of the fact the Alabama Board had related it would be unable to do so.

The above directive was reported to the Alabama Board of Medical Examiners and the secretary of that Board stated he would attempt to make arrangements to obtain the grades on the basic science subjects from its basic science board and certify the same.

The secretary reported that since the above information was received that the Alabama Board of Medical Examiners had certified basic science grades on two applicants.

This was received as information.

RE: Dr. Numa Richardson Carter, Shelby, North Carolina - Report was received from the Pharmacy Board dated December 9th, 1965, alleging excessive writing of narcotic prescriptions by Dr. Carter and this was presented to the Board.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that Dr. Numa Richardson Carter be requested to appear before the Board of Medical Examiners at the May, 1966 meeting with notification that he have his records concerning Mildred Harmon Daily and Rachel Griffin. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Joseph J. Combs and passed by vote of three to one, Dr. James E. Davis dissenting.

RE: Salaries:

VERDICT: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that the salary of Mrs. Betty Joe Cooke be raised to \$350.00 per month, effective January 1st, 1966.

Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the pay per hour for clerical assistance in the biennial registration office be raised to \$2.00 per hour and that this be retroactive for the work done during this fiscal year. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned.

The following physicians were interviewed for license by endorsement of credentials:

RE: Dr. Melvin Alan Anhalt appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Onslow County, North Carolina. He is stationed at Camp Lejeune.

Dr. Rodman: What kind of work do you want to do in Jacksonville?

A. We were approached to do part-time practice in Swansboro. While I was making application one of the physicians in Jacksonville started going to Swansboro on a part-time basis so we gave that up. Subsequently the president of the Onslow County Medical Society asked that we go ahead and process application to do night duty, holidays and week-ends in the emergency room.

Dr. Edmondson: How long do you contemplate being stationed there?

A. I have been there four months and expect to remain there for the two years of my obligation.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Melvin Alan Anhalt was approved for license by endorsement of credentials limited to Onslow County, North Carolina.

RE: Dr. Ray Mills Antley appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Pediatrics.

Dr. Rodman: Where have you been since 1962?

A. University of Minnesota, internship, two years, in service in Pediatrics.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with an examining board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Ray Mills Antley was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. James Blackerby appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he planned to practice in New Bern, where his son is now practicing medicine.

Dr. Rodman: Where have you practiced?

A. Stanford, Kentucky

Q. Will you be doing full-time?

A. I plan to do limited work.

Q. What type of limited work?

A. Dr. Willis in New Bern, I tentatively plan to take care of the emergency room part-time in the evening. I may open an office in addition to that.

Q. What arrangement do you have with the emergency room setup, salary or fees?

A. It has not been definitely settled, I think a minimum guarantee as I understand it.

Q. Will you cover the emergency room entirely?

A. No sir, from 6 - 12 at night.

Dr. Combs: Will you be in the hospital or on call?

A. In the hospital

Q. When it is your responsibility you will be there?

A. Yes



Dr. Blackerby continued

Dr. Rodman: Who will cover from midnight until morning?

A. They rotate among the doctors. The doctors there will see their private patients who ask for them. If they wish us to, we will see them for them.

Q. Is Dr. Willis doing this?

A. On a part-time basis, four nights a week. They want full-time coverage.

Dr. Davis: Are you in New Bern?

A. I have bought a home, but have not moved.

Dr. Edmondson: Have you terminated your work in Stanford?

A. Not yet

Q. When do you contemplate coming to North Carolina?

A. I hope to get everything liquidated by the first of March.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. Never

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that Dr. James Blackerby be granted license by endorsement of credentials. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Frank Edmondson and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Fred Newton Cole, Jr. appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he had located in Tryon for General and Thoracic Surgery with Tryon Associates.

Dr. Rodman: You have two grades below our passing average. We will accept one grade below passing.

Q. Where have you practiced?

A. I finished residency in June in Thoracic Surgery, then associated in California last summer, this did not work out. I moved to Tryon in December. I wanted to come East because of my family here. I was unhappy in California.

Q. When do you want to go to Tryon?

A. I am already to go to work as soon as I get my license. I am currently living there.

Dr. Large: Do you have your boards?

A. In General Surgery

Q. Do you plan to take boards in Thoracic Surgery?

A. I plan to. I can take them the next time they are given, will probably take them nextfall.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that Dr. Fred Newton Cole, Jr. be given a written examination in the subject of his choice in which he is deficient and if he passes the same, that he be approved for license by endorsement of credentials. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. (Requirements met)

RE: Dr. Charles Dudley Farmer appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He plans to join the Nalle Clinic.

Dr. Rodman: When do you plan to start at the Nalle Clinic?

A. As soon as possible.

Dr. Large: Which department?

A. Internal medicine.

Dr. Rodman: Where have you been since 1961?

A. Service and Rochester, Minnesota for four years

Dr. Farmer continued

- Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir
 Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No
 Q. Have you ever used alcohol or barbiturates to excess? A. No
 Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Charles Dudley Farmer was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Richard Gordon Faw appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials and stated that he planned to practice in Aurora.

Dr. Rodman: Dr. Faw does not have an internship. Could you explain why?

- A. I was kind of old to go in medical school, had a family and three children. I started an internship, was unable financially and had to go to work.

Q. Did you have any difficulties during internship?

- A. No sir, I have a letter from one of my chiefs.

Q. Did you have difficulty with anyone in authority in the hospital?

- A. Hes

Q. What was the nature of the difficulty?

- A. The internes elected me as president of their group to represent them in a grievance. When I presented them in this grievance my internship was terminated. At the time the meeting was held, we agreed if the administrator took this stand, we would all quit. I was the only one who quit. I needed to go to work so it did not make a whole lot of difference.

Q. Did you receive license after this?

- A. Yes, December, 1963

Q. When did internship terminate?

- A. October, 1963

Q. How many internes?

- A. 28

Dr. Large: What was the nature of the grievance?

- A. An agreement was made when we went in a certain internship would be provided, it was not, the internes were leaving, got a large group each quarter from the University of Tennessee. The internes were leaving each quarter, no new ones coming in. We were just taking histories and physicals, getting nothing out of it. We asked for a chance to meet with the Board to work out getting more out of it.

Dr. Combs: What was the description of the internship promised?

- A. I do not have all the facts here. Promised certain period on each service, hours of study, et cetera. They were doubling up on services, we were not getting what we were told we would get.

Dr. Davis: This handled by the director?

- A. Yes sir

Q. It was normal procedure to tell the director?

- A. Yes sir

Dr. Large: Did you make rounds every day to see patients?

- A. No, rounds a couple of times a week.

Q. Was there any educational program in the form of lectures?

- A. Lectures two mornings a week, grand rounds one morning, another various departments.

Dr. Combs: How long were you there?

- A. $3\frac{1}{2}$ months

Dr. Faw continued

Dr. Combs: What service?

A. Surgery - one month

Dr. Davis: Was teaching on that service adequate?

A. Yes sir, he worked with us most closely, Dr. Lee.

Q. Your complaint was not personal lack of training as far as it concerned the group, is this true?

A. Yes sir

Dr. Rodman: Was your surgical training divided into categories?

A. No sir

Q. With Dr. Lee three months?

A. No, one month, then others.

Q. You have been in Salem, Virginia, since going to work?

A. Yes

Q. How many people there?

A. 16,000 - eight miles from Roanoke. We used the Roanoke Hospital. I confined my work to the office and referred.

Dr. Davis: Was any charge against you, your moral standard, method of handling patients or just this technical thing?

A. While I was in Salem, had been there about six months a patient lodged a charge against me, parents of a child. I was working one night late, the parents rushed him in with a cut finger, he was screaming. I sewed up his finger, on the way home he regurgitated, I rushed there, gave mouth to mouth resuscitation, took him to the hospital, saved his life. I was totally exonerated. This was Roanoke County. When I rushed to the house the whole neighborhood was standing by, the neighbors all around there were my patients. It never got to a court case. The Grievance Committee says it happens, two surgeons on the board.

Dr. Combs: Would there have been any complaint if they had been working on an eight hour shift.

A. I do not think they were looking for an eight hour shift,

Q. Did you have a full quota of internes?

A. No sir, full quota 32, 6 left, then 17.

Q. How many beds in 1963?

A. 500

Dr. Large : Did any others leave when you left?

A. One other left just before, made him stay an extra six months because they said he had not done satisfactory internship. This thing was fomenting before I got there. I think now they have 2- 3 internships since this all happened, they have not been able to fill the quota. They have gotten two or three new directors of Medical Education.

Dr. Davis: Was there a director of Medical Education when you were there?

A. No

Q. No group of medical staff to come between your group and the hospital?

A. There is a medical board but we applied to the administrator because he was the one contacted us and handled everything.

Q. What medical man was in charge of the medical program?

A. Each department had a head.

Dr. Rodman: When do you plan to go to Aurora?

A. I hope to start January 31st.

Dr. Faw continued

Dr. Rodman: Have you made an arrangement about an office?

A. Yes

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used alcohol or barbiturates to excess? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine?

A. No sir

Dr. Large: Was there any relation between the lady's child who had difficulty and the administrator of the hospital?

A. No sir, I do not think so. The next day the mother came in and cried and thanked me. All this came several weeks later. I never saw the woman or her husband after this. A letter was presented and the Grievance Committee called me and I asked to be tried before this committee and asked the anesthesiologist who was present to be there.

Dr. Combs: Did you use local anesthetic or general?

A. The child was screaming so I used local anesthetic and one of the - - - and he quieted down some, he was scared and screaming.

Dr. Rodman: You transferred from the University of Tennessee?

A. I went there because I had to work my way through and they had quarters but wanted to graduate in North Carolina, where I was raised.

Dr. Faw stated that though born in Philadelphia his people are natives of North Carolina.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Richard Gordon Faw be granted license by endorsement of credentials. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and was passed. Dr. H. Lee Large abstained from voting.

RE: Dr. Telezee Littlejohn Foster appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is a general Surgeon.

Dr. Edmondson: Do you have your boards?

A. I took the first part in December.

Dr. Rodman: When do you plan on starting to work?

A. Within a few weeks.

Dr. Large: Where will you practice?

A. Charlotte'

Dr. Templeton: Have you rented a home in Charlotte?

A. Not now, I will eventually.

Q. You have no definite plans now?

A. I think I will go for a few weeks and then see about the home after I have been there a few weeks, within one or two months.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No, I haven't.

Q. Have you ever been addicted to the use of narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with an examining board in medicine? A. No

Dr. Large: Have you rented an office in Charlotte?

A. I have a place, medical building.

VERDICT: Dr. Telezee Littlejohn Foster was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Jack Knight Goodrich came in with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He has joined the staff of the Radiology Department at Duke University School of Medicine, in the Nuclear Section, as of January 1st, 1966.

Dr. Combs: When did you receive this appointment?

A. Effective December 15th

Q. When did you agree to come to North Carolina?

A. About the middle of the fall. I was not informed any particular requirements for license. In the previous states I have held license you went in, got settled, and then started making contact while on the job.

Q. You mean you started practicing before being licensed?

A. Yes

Dr. Rodman: Did you receive training in all the states you are licensed in?

A. I have never practiced in California, I obtained license within the five-year period without examination. I thought I might go there. I trained in New Orleans, have practiced in Mississippi, educated in Tennessee. I am director of the Nuclear Division.

Dr. Combs: Have you been coming in contact with patients?

A. Not directly, I interpreted the tests. I have an associate who is licensed, full-time in the Division of Nuclear Medicine, two residents rotating through, who are duly licensed. They have done the injections under my direction.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No, I have not.

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. No

Q. This will constitute your appearance but your application has to be completed in every respect.

VERDICT: Dr. John Knight Goodrich was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary, within one month. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Charles Clinton Griffin, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is director of the Student Health Service at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine at Greensboro.

Dr. Edmondson: You might tell the Board what you have done since 1947.

A. General practice in Iowa, that is all I have done until now.

Q. When do you contemplate going to Greensboro?

A. I have been there since September, but have not been practicing. My sister teaches there, my father was a native of North Carolina and my mother lives here.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used alcohol or barbiturates to excess? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a ny examining board in medicine? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Charles Clinton Griffin, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Montfort Haslam appeared July 26th, 1963 applying for license by endorsement of credentials and was approved contingent upon moving in the state for practice, within one year. Dr. Haslam has advised that he is now ready to move to North Carolina to practice in Hertford.

Dr. Edmondson: What type of practice?

A. General practice.

Q. When do you contemplate coming?

A. Two months, no more.



Dr. Haslam continued

Q. By March 1st?

A. That would be my target.

Q. What arrangements have you made?

A. I have a home already, which I am paying rent on and the bank has allotted me rooms in the rear.

Dr. Rodman: What were your plans two years ago when you appeared?

A. I did not know. But my daughters have married since then. When we have been south my wife's arthritis improves.

Q. How did you pick Hertford?

A. We stayed in Edemton, my wife liked it, we just like that area, no particular reason.

Q. You want to go to work March 1st?

A. Yes sir, with your permission I will be there.

Dr. Combs: The citizens need a doctor there?

A. Yes

Q. Do you think you will be able to do the work there, night duty and everything?

A. I am also team physician at Colgate, I am doing it now.

Dr. Large: Do you do obstetrics?

A. Yes

Dr. Owen: Is your health good?

A. Yes, better than two years ago.

Dr. Rodman: How long have you been team physician?

A. 10 years, cover every sport, travel with football team.

Dr. Combs: Are you director of student health?

A. I examine all athletes.

Q. At the infirmary?

A. No, I am health officer in Hamilton.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. Never

Q. Have you ever used narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol or barbiturates to excess? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with an examining board in medicine? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that Dr. Montfort Haslam be approved for license by endorsement of credentials. This motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Wade Frederick Heritage appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He has recently retired from military service after 20 years.

Dr. Edmondson: Are you considering going to practice at the State Sanatorium at McCain?

A. Yes sir

Dr. Large: Where have you practiced?

A. In the Army, July 1st of this year I retired.

Dr. Owen: What did you do in the Army?

A. Primarily hospital commander, division surgeon.

Dr. Edmondson: What type of work do you contemplate doing at McCain?

A. Essentially what I would call a ward officer.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used narcotics to excess? A. No sir

A. Through the American Medical Association. I wanted emergency room because I can't afford to wait for patients. I have a son in medical school.

Dr. Owen: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No sir'

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Ross Vilardo was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary.
(Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. James Andrew Watt appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. Following routine investigation it has been ascertained that Dr. Watt had difficulty on account of personal addiction to narcotics; that he had been discharged from the United States Army in June, 1942, because of addiction; that he obtained drugs to satisfy his addiction that same year from the hospital in Colorado, with which he was connected; that an investigation was conducted in Mississippi in 1944 and this disclosed he had been obtaining narcotic drugs for his own use by issuing fictitious prescriptions, he was indicted, but the case later dropped. That in 1951 an investigation was made while he was employed as a physician at a government facility in Colorado, which disclosed he had diverted narcotic supplies to his own personal use. At that time he pleaded guilty in the United States District Court to violation of the Federal narcotic law and was sentenced to nine months to be served in an institution to be designated by the United States Attorney General, a two years' probation to follow. In 1951 Dr. Watt's license to practice medicine in Colorado was revoked and subsequently his Mississippi license to practice medicine was revoked. Colorado license to practice medicine was reinstated in 1962 after the Board determined that Dr. Watt had been reinstated, and subsequently license reinstated in Mississippi.

Dr. Watt is applying for license at this time to practice Pathology with Dr. C. Harold Steffee and Dr. Phillip Warga in Highsmith and Cape Fear Hospitals in Fayetteville. Dr. Steffee has advised Dr. Watt trained in his department at the Methodist Hospital in Memphis and prior to beginning that training he had been working in an ophthalmologists' office in Mississippi; that he was aware of his narcotic difficulties at that time and that he has no doubt that he is now free of his narcotic problem.

Dr. Owen: You are applying for license to practice Pathology with Dr. Steffee at the Cape Fear and Highsmith Hospitals in Fayetteville.

A. Yes

Q. Give us a little of your history beginning with the time you were in the Army giving high and low points.

A. I got a little low in the Army and permitted a recurrence, none since 1950.

Q. Any difficulty since 1950?

A. Not a bit

Q. What kind of discharge did you get from the United States Army?

A. Administrative discharge, orders to go home, that is all I got.

Q. We have to have a copy.

A. The only thing I got was an order to proceed home, no formal discharge.

Dr. Davis: You were never separated from the service?

A. Yes

Q. On what basis?

A. I guess you would say not a dishonorable discharge.

Dr. Owen: Discharge without honor.

A. Something to that effect.

Dr. Davis: It had a specific - - -

A. I can not give the category, I think it could be other than honorable or something like that.

Q. What was the basis for this?

A. Narcotics

Q. What do you mean?

A. Addiction

Q. You were addicted to narcotics at that time?

A. At that time

Q. You were discharged without _____, was this personal addiction?

A. Personal

Q. Were you accused of mismanagement of narcotics other than self-injection?

A. No sir



Dr. Watt continued

Dr. Templeton: Did you appear before Section 8 Board?

A. No, Re-classification Board

Dr. Davis: Were you accused of improper writing of prescriptions?

A. Not in the service

Q. Any other time?

A. 1951

Q. By whom?

A. I was working as a civil employee for the Department of the Army.

Q. What was the basis for improper writing of narcotic prescriptions?

A. To satisfy my addiction.

Q. You were improperly writing prescriptions and obtaining narcotics under fraudulent conditions?

A. Yes

Q. Were you sentenced?

A. United States Public Health Service Hospital and a year of probation. I was there from May or June until the middle of December.

Dr. Owen: What state licenses were revoked because of this?

A. Colorado and Mississippi and both have been reinstated, Colorado in 1962 and Mississippi in 1964.

Q. When revoked?

A. Both in 1951

Q. One as the result of the other?

A. Correct

Dr. Davis: What is the basis of your reinstatement?

A. Just past performance.

Q. Over how long a period?

A. From 1951 until whenever I reapplied, which I think was 1960 or 1961.

Q. You convinced them you had been free of narcotic addiction during that time?

A. Yes

Q. Have you been completely and absolutely free since that time?

A. Yes sir

Dr. Edmondson: Do you have narcotic stamp now?

A. No

Dr. Owen: You don't want one?

A. No

Q. Did you ever have any trouble with barbiturates?

A. No

Q. What drugs were you on?

A. ~~Demerol~~ was the last, off and on, morphine, pantapone, dilaudid at one time.

Dr. Combs: Were you on drugs from 1942 to 1951 continuously or free periods?

A. Free periods

Q. What was the longest period off?

A. One year to 15 months

Q. Was there more than one period of that length of time off drugs?

A. Yes sir

Dr. Owen: You stated you were on one year's probation?

A. At the end of 1951.

Q. That wasn't two years?

A. Yes, it was two years, that is right.

Q. What have you been doing since 1951?

A. After I got out of the hospital I had a job as chemist for an airline company,



Dr. Watt continued

Dr. Watt: - - - -water and sewage treatment, in Mississippi, plant superintendent for a canning factory until 1958. At the end of that period I figured I wanted to get back into medicine so I became laboratory technician, with Dr. Boggess in Columbus, Mississippi.

Dr. Large: How long did you work for him?

A. Two years roughly

Dr. Owen: What have you done since then?

A. In 1961 I came to Memphis and started residency in Pathology, finished in March of last year, middle of May, 1965 residency in Forensic Pathology, which will finish the middle of this coming May in Memphis.

Dr. Rodman: Do you have an opinion which might have precipitated this with narcotics?

A. I think so, I suffered a great deal with headache and you have to learn the hard way and it did not cure migrain.

Q. Are you still suffering with migrain?

A. No

Q. Do you take any medicine?

A. No sir

Q. Do you take a drink?

A. Yes sir

Q. If licensed, you plan to go to work after completion of your present residency?

A. Yes sir, after the middle of May.

The Board asked to talk along with Dr. Steffee, who requested to be allowed to appear with Dr. Watt.

Dr. Steffee

Dr. Davis: I believe you helped train Dr. Watt?

Dr. Steffee: Yes

Q. You got to know him personally as well as professionally?

A. Yes sir

Q. Obviously you have confidence in his professional ability. What confidence do you have that he will withstand temptation of narcotics?

A. Absolute confidence, no qualms about him being cured.

Q. Good clean person, no bad habits?

A. No sir

Dr. Combs: What are you basing your opinion on?

A. He has been burned once, had to get out of medicine.

Q. Have you had previous experience in narcotic addiction?

A. No sir

Dr. Davis: This man has fallen prey twice. It would appear to be more difficult for this man to stay clean. This is the basis of my fear. Knowing him well, you do not share this fear?

A. I do not

Dr. Large: How was he with every day living, reasonably stable?

A. Yes

Q. He is nervous to-day, is he this way ordinarily?

A. No, quite calm.



Dr. Watt continued

Dr. Large: Has he ever demonstrated psychotic background which might be the basis for this episode with narcotics?

A. No

Dr. Davis: Has he demonstrated good judgment as far as you are concerned?

A. Yes

Q. He has demonstrated this?

A. Yes

Q. You think he is mature at this time and makes good decisions?

A. Yes indeed.

Dr. Large: Was ~~ay~~ performance as resident not exemplary?

A. No

Q. Always on time?

A. Always on time.

Dr. Davis: Did he work with you and under your supervision?

A. That is right.

Q. How many others?

A. One other

Q. You were head of the department and responsible for his professional work?

A. Yes

Q. If he slipped up, it would embarrass you professionally?

A. Yes

Dr. Large: Is he married and have family?

A. Yes sir, two daughters who are married.

Action of the Board was deferred until another session. (See p. 225 these Minutes)

RE: Dr. Alexander Harley, graduate of the University of Cambridge, England in 1960, appeared applying for special limited license to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a fellow in Medicine, for which he was approved on an annual basis, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary.

RE: Dr. Juan Kang, graduate of Kyungpook University, Korea in 1959, appeared with incomplete credentials applying for special limited license to Watts Hospital, where he is a resident in Surgery, for which he was approved on an annual basis, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. He presented non-immigrant card. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Abdul Majid Mirza, graduate of the University of Panjab, Pakistan in 1960, appeared applying for special limited license to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Medicine, for which he was approved on an annual basis. He presented non-immigrant card.

RE: Dr. Victor Weiss, graduate of the University of Havana in 1959, appeared with incomplete credentials applying for special limited license to Forsyth Memorial Hospital, where he is a resident in Surgery, for which he was approved if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. He presented immigrant card.

Dr. Rodman: The special limited license is granted on annual basis and you will not be eligible to apply for narcotic tax stamp.

SPECIAL LIMITED LICENSE - STAFF PHYSICIAN - FOREIGN MEDICAL GRADUATE

RE: Dr. Mustafa Avci, graduate of the University of Istanbul, Turkey, in 1953, appeared applying for special limited license to cover him as a staff physician at the Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium until he can become duly licensed. He also petitioned for the privilege of taking the written examination.

Dr. Davis: How long have you been in Wison?

A. More than two months.

Q. Dr. Avci hopes to stay on the staff and is petition to take examination in June.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. No sir

Q. No disciplinary action? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Mustafa Avci was approved for special limited license to the Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium until he can take the June, 1966 examination and pass the same.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that Dr. Mustafa Avci be granted permission to take the written examination in June, 1966. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.



SPECIAL LIMITED LICENSE - HOSPITAL RESIDENT

RE: Dr. Joseph K. Bush was granted special limited license to Duke University School of Medicine in May, 1963, and he remained there until December 31st, 1963. He has now returned there and has petitioned for reinstatement of his special limited license to cover him as resident in Medicine, for which he was approved on an annual basis. Another appearance was not required.

RE: Dr. Renato Freire, graduate of the University of Minas Gerais School of Medicine, Brazil, 1956, was granted special limited license to the State Hospitals January 16th, 1961. He returned to his home where he spent the last three years practicing Orthopedic in Surgery in Brazil. He is appearing at this time to petition for reinstatement of his special limited license to Cherry Hospital and for the written examination in June, 1966. He presented his immigrant card.

Dr. Davis: Where have you been since leaving Cherry Hospital?

A. I went back to my home in Brazil.

Q. You plan to return to Cherry Hospital?

A. Temporarily, I want to complete my residency in Orthopedics.

Q. Have you been assured of a position on the staff?

A. Yes, I have a letter.

Q. Have you ever asked to take the examination before?

A. Yes, they said I was only going to stay a few months and gave me the temporary license.

Q. Do you plan to stay, you are not going to return to Brazil?

A. I may go back sometime.

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever used alcohol, barbiturates to excess? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. No

Q. You go to work immediately if you can?

A. Yes

VERDICT: Dr. Renato Freire was approved for special limited license to Cherry Hospital until he can take the written examination in June, 1966 and be notified that he has passed.

Dr. Renato Freire was approved for the written examination in 1966 and, if he passed his license to be limited geographically until citizenship can be obtained, within six years.

RE: Dr. James Wellington Dixon was granted limited license to Kate B. Reynolds Hospital in June, 1960. He has located in Greensboro and has petition for conversion of limited to full license. He appeared at this time.

Dr. Rodman: Where have you been in the past three years?

A. The past 18 months in the Navy in Washington, before that Fort Howard at the Veterans Administration Hospital.

Dr. Davis: Have you recently been an employee of the Navy?

A. Yes, civilian employee.

Dr. Rodman: You plan to open an office in Greensboro and do General Surgery?

A. That is right.

Q. Have you made arrangements in Greensboro, place to live and office?

A. Yes

Q. When do you want to go to work?

A. In a couple of weeks.

Dr. Edmondson: Will you be associated?

A. I will start by myself. I would like to have somebody.



Dr. Dixon continued

Dr. Rodman: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever been addicted to narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or alcohol to excess? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board in medicine? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the limited license of Dr. James Wellington Dixon be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned.

January 14th - 2:00 P. M.

RE: Dr. Shirish R. Pandya = Dr. John S. McKee, Superintendent of the Broughton Hospital, appeared and outlined some of his staff problems. He said at present they are working on the unit system and he was unable to operate without sufficient staff members. He related that his institution is in the process of being approved for a training program.

Dr. McKee petitioned at this time for Dr. Pandya to be considered for special limited license for a year on his educational visa, during which time he might be able to change the same to immigrant, whereby he would become eligible to take the written examination for medical licensure. Dr. Pandya's credentials were considered by the Board.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the Board consider the application of Dr. Shirish R. Pandya for special limited license to cover him as a resident for training purposes on an annual basis. This motion was duly seconded and passed by Dr. Ralph G. Templeton and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James Robert Howerton - The secretary presented to the Board a transcript of testimony in a criminal case in the Superior Court of Guilford County, North Carolina, October, 1965, in which Dr. James Robert Howerton appeared as a witness. Dr. Howerton's testimony revealed that he had admitted accepting kickbacks for a short period of time from a pharmacist when he practiced in Columbia, North Carolina. Dr. Howerton testified that he later dispensed his own drugs.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that this matter be tabled until the next meeting of the Board and receive further reports. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James Andrew Watt -(See pp. 213-219 these Minutes)

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. James Andrew Watt be granted license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he locates in the state for practice, within one year. This motion was duly seconded and passed by a vote of four to one. One member of the Board abstained from voting.

RE: Dr. John G. Craddock, Jr.- (See previous Minutes) has been under the surveillance due to previous difficulty with personal use of narcotic drugs. He appeared for a routine interview at this time and stated that he is still in research at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine in Infectious Diseases and expects at an early date to receive appointment to the staff there as control officer in Infectious Diseases. A satisfactory report was received from Dr. Craddock's psychiatrist. The Board commended Dr. Craddock and directed that he be seen for a routine interview in one year.

RE: Dr. Winston Arthur Young Sargent, Burnsville - Pursuant to reports from the Pharmacy Board that he was writing many prescriptions for large quantities of narcotics, Dr. Sargent was requested to appear at this time. It was alleged that these prescriptions were written for people said to be narcotic addicts whose names were known to the police in Asheville and the vicinity.

Dr. Sargent came in and admitted that he had one patient whom he knew was a narcotic addict and the influx of patients requesting narcotics seemed to stem from that; that this began in November, 1965. He said he was overly sympathetic, attempted to get some of them into the United States Public Health Service Hospital in Lex-





ington and did not know how to manage the situation.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the president reprimand Dr. Winston Arthur Young Sargent and also ask him if he would voluntarily surrender his narcotic tax stamp, order forms and supplies. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

The Minutes for the October 14-15, 1965 meeting were approved as read.

The meeting was adjourned.
