

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS  
OF NORTH CAROLINA

Atlantic Beach Hotel, Atlantic Beach, North Carolina

July 27-29th, 1961

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The Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina met at the Atlantic Beach Hotel, Atlantic Beach, North Carolina, July 27-29th, 1961, for the purpose of certifying to the grades of the annual written examination for medical license, to interview applicants for license by endorsement of credentials, for special limited license, and for other business.

Dr. Baker: What has been your medical experience since graduation?

A. General rotating internship and general surgical resident in San Antonio.

Dr. Raspberry: What are your plans after finishing your residency?

A. I do not know. I have a couple of years in service.

The following is a letter from the secretary of the Texas Board of Medical examiners under date of April 4th, 1961:

"The license of Dr. Harry Paul Clause, Jr. was cancelled April 12, 1957, for allowing Blanch Dietch and the Texas Clinic Hospital to use his license to practice medicine in this state.

"His license was restored May 20, 1958.

"I do not believe that you should hold this against Dr. Clause because I think this violation of the Medical Practice Act was due to ignorance on his part. When he found out that he was doing wrong he voluntarily gave up his license and cooperated with the Board to the fullest extent. I think that under the circumstances, and if this was reversed, and he was applying to the Texas Board for a license with North Carolina, I believe the Texas board would issue him a license."

A full and complete explanation in a letter from Dr. Clause under date of June 28th, 1961, is attached to his file.

Dr. Combs: You are licensed in what states?

A. Maryland by examination and Texas by endorsement.

Q. You graduated in 1955 from Johns Hopkins?

A. Yes

Dr. Combs:

Where did you get your internship?

A. Jefrerson Davis Hospital in Houston

Q. Where did you get your residency?

A. In Houston at Baylor and affiliated hospitals.

Q. When were you licensed in Texas?

A. December, 1955

Q. You started practicing there in a hospital, what year?

A. 1957

Q. What were you doing at that time besides this one hospital?

A. Residency at Baylor

Q. Why did you take this position with the Texas Clinic Hospital?

A. I needed the money.

Q. What were your duties at this hospital?

A. Patients who came in with no referring physicians, the people who operated the clinic would call me. I would prescribe, acute alcoholics, primarily acute alcoholics at this hospital.

Q. Were you paid by the people who ran the hospital or by the patients?

A. By both actually, by the patient part of the time directly, part of the time they made a lump sum to the clinic for my services and the clinic and the clinic would give me a check.

Q. How long were you with this hospital?

A. Three months

Q. Did it come to your attention that the Texas Board did not like this?

A. The investigator, Mrs. Durrenberger, called me on the phone.

Q. When she made this investigation, did you sever your connection immediately and fully co-operate with the Texas Board?

A. Yes sir

Q. How long will you be on Thoracic Surgery at the Charlotte Memorial Hospital?

A. Three years

Q. What do you plan to do?

A. Wherever available

Q. You might stay in North Carolina?

A. Yes

Q. The Texas Board revoked your license because of practicing medicine on the clinic license. The Texas Board reinstated you on May 20th, 1958, and felt this came about through ignorance. The Texas Board does not feel this should be held against you.

Dr. Baker: How many children do you have?

A. Four. I had four at that time.

Q. Did you appear before the Texas Board or Dr. Crabb?

A. No

Q. Your only contact with the board was with this woman and you had no appearance?

A. No

Q. Where were you born?

A. Bedford, Virginia

Dr. Clause said Mrs. Durrenberger brought a paper for him to sign and said if he signed the same, there would be no publicity, if not it would be taken to court.

Dr. Rasberry: Have you ever been convicted of a crime?

A. No, this was my only trouble.

Q. Have you had any trouble with the Narcotic Bureau?

A. No, I let my narcotic license expire when I went in service and have not reinstated it.

A. Similar but changed in that the man before me had a smaller percentage, but he had equipment set up with the hospital and the hospital was not particularly in favor of doing that and that was agreeable with me. Otherwise the contract is the same.

A. Housing there is a problem. They have a new industry. I have been unable to find a house. I have rented an apartment in Monroe.

Rishikof, graduate of Queen's University School of Medicine, Canada, appeared with incomplete credentials applying for special limited license to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a fellow in Medicine, for which he was approved on an annual basis upon completion of credentials satisfactory to the secretary.

RE: Dr. Sigurd C. Sandzen, graduate of Loyola University School of Medicine in 1959, appeared applying for special limited license to Duke University school of Medicine, where he is a resident in Orthopaedics, for which he was approved on an annual basis.

Q. If the board will cover you, you will be willing to take the Georgia Board and apply for endorsement?

A. I would be willing to, but I would prefer taking the examination next June.

Dr. Thurston : You were doing this type of work in Pennsylvania?

A. Not exactly, I had my residency and finished in July, 1960. In the year in between I worked with adolescent psychotics in the State Hospital.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that Dr. Lawrence R. Kroner be granted a special permit to Murdoch Training School until he can take the next written examination of the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Thomas G. Thurston and passed unanimously.

RE: Narcotic Film - June, 1962 Written Examination - The Board directed that the same be requested.

RE: Dr. S. G. Wright, Shawboro, North Carolina - The secretary presented the following letter from the State Bureau of Investigation under date of June 21st, 1961, and his reply under date of June 29th, 1961:

"Dear Dr. Combs:

"Dr. S. G. Wright, Shawboro, North Carolina, has been issuing prescriptions over the telephone without seeing the patient, telephoning the prescription to the drug store and asking the drug store to collect his fee of \$1.00 for issuing the prescription.

"Our Agent F. E. Epps, has talked with Dr. Wright and advised him not to do this in the future, and he, Wright, stated he would abide by the Agent's advice.

"As you may know, Dr. Wright is about 80 years of age and does all his work from his home. It is believed if you could write him a letter suggesting that he personally see all of these people who want drugs, examine them, and then if needed, issue to them a prescription, it will be beneficial and perhaps keep Dr. Wright from getting into serious trouble with narcotic and drug prescriptions.

"Your cooperation is greatly appreciated."

S/ "Walter F. Anderson, Director"

"Dear Dr. Wright:

"It has been called to the attention of this office that there have been some discrepancies in handling of narcotic prescriptions, which is in violation of the law. It is my understanding that the legal procedure has been explained to you and I trust that this warning will be sufficient so that it will not be necessary for the Board of Medical Examiners to have to subpoena you to answer to any charges."

RE: Biennial Registration of Physicians - Reinstatement - The medical license of the following physicians were suspended for failure to register as required by General Statute of North Carolina 90-15.1:

Dr. Tindall has applied for conversion to full license and stated that he is now on the staff at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Durham, and in the near future will be part-time at Duke University School of Medicine as a Neurosurgeon. His credentials are in order.

VERDICT: Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that the limited license of Dr. George Taylor Tindall be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. T. W. Baker and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Walter Boris V. Cherny was granted license limited to Duke University School of Medicine on the basis of written examination until citizenship could be obtained. Dr. Cherny has submitted evidence of naturalization and applied for full license.

VERDICT: Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that the limited license of Dr. Walter Boris V. Cherny be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. T. W. Baker and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Alan Welles Grantham appeared July 22nd, 1960 applying for license by endorsement of credentials and was approved when he located in the state for the private practice of medicine, within one year. Dr. Grantham has not located for private practice and failed to reply to letter written him on April 1st, 1961, asking as to his plans.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that Dr. Alan Welles Grantham be refunded fee for license by endorsement, less 50%, and that the same be sent registered mail as he may have left the Veterans Administration Hospital. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Granville F. Knight appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials on July 24th, 1959, and was approved contingent upon coming into the state for practice, within one year. As per Dr. Knight's request, the board on January 6th, 1961, granted Dr. Knight an extension to August, 1961. On June 1st, 1961, Dr. Knight again requested an extension from August, 1961, to August, 1962.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that Dr. Granville F. Knight be granted an extension to July 1st, 1962. Dr. Thomas G. Thurston duly seconded this motion and the same was passed unanimously.

RE: Narcotic Tax Stamp - The secretary advised the Board that Mr. H. C. McAllister, Secretary of the North Carolina State Board of Pharmacy had requested that his office be advised when a physician surrendered his narcotic tax stamp in order that druggists in the physician's area might be notified.

VERDICT: Dr. Thomas W. Baker moved that the Board of Medical Examiners notify the North Carolina Board of Pharmacy of action taken in regard to requesting the surrender of narcotic tax stamp of a physician and also restoration of the same; that all such action taken within the last year be included. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. J. B. Anderson. The motion was passed by a vote of four to two, Drs. L. R. Doffermyre and Thomas G. Thurston dissenting.

RE: Dr. Joe Robinson, Hamlet, North Carolina - To summarize, Dr. Robinson was requested by the Board of Medical Examiners in session to surrender his narcotic tax stamp, requisition blanks and any other narcotic supplies on hand to the Bureau of Narcotics or a representative thereof at the May, 1961 meeting of the Board. This action was reported to the Bureau of Narcotics.

On June 28th, 1961, in a telephone conversation with Mr. Olin Johnson, Narcotic Agent, Greensboro, the Board was advised that on June 13th, 1961, he and State Bureau of Investigation Agent Williams went to Hamlet and after looking into the situation, agreed due to circumstances to allow Dr. Robinson to keep his narcotic tax stamp for two weeks, until June 30th, at which time he agreed not to apply for registration; that he signed a good faith agreement not to reapply for one year. On July 14th, 1961, the District Supervisor of the Bureau of Narcotics, advised that on June 30th, 1961, Dr. Robinson surrendered his narcotic tax stamp and unused order form.

This information on Dr. Joe Robinson was received as information by the Board. The Board directed that Dr. Robinson be requested to appear for a routine visit at the October, 1961 meeting.

RE: Dr. F. S. Kincheloe, Jr. - Dr. Edwin A. Rasberry, Jr. reported that from information received Dr. Kincheloe is doing all right.

VERDICT: The Board directed that Dr. Kincheloe get an appointment with Dr. Edwin A. Rasberry, Jr. about December 15th and be put on agenda for Dr. Rasberry to make report at the January, 1962 meeting.

RE: Dr. Victor H. Prusa, Taylorsville, North Carolina - On June 19th, 1961, the Board of Medical Examiners received a letter from the medical staff of the Alexander County Hospital Association, Taylorsville, reporting that it had investigated the professional work and conduct of Dr. Prusa; that he was doing or attempting to do surgery and obstetrics while apparently intoxicated. That on October 3rd, 1960, a meeting was held with him, his difficulties were pointed out, and it was recommended that he take some time off in order to recover and recommended treatment, which he did not think necessary. He was off work five days; that he did better but returned to his old ways and has attempted to work when in the opinion of the staff he was unable to do so.

A report from Appalachian Hall, Asheville, was received on July 18th, 1961, that Dr. Prusa was hospitalized from June 20th to July 8th, 1961; that his attitude was good, he was co-operative, and seemed to gain good insight.

Dr. Prusa appeared at this time at the request of the board for an interview. Dr. Thurston advised that he had resigned from the hospital staff and now has applied for reinstatement; that he had been doing an office practice, but had not been doing any hospital work; that he is a good practitioner.

Dr. Prusa stated that he had received treatment at Appalachian Hall. He said that he has been drinking all his life socially; that lately he had taken a few too many and upon direct question admitted that he supposed he should be classified as an alcoholic. He said that upon return from the hospital he had been doing only office practice as he had been suspended from the hospital, but that he was applying for reinstatement. He denied having taken any alcohol since his treatment. He admitted having gone to the hospital after taking a drink, but did not admit being intoxicated.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that Dr. Victor H. Prusa be given a reprimand for his action; that he remain under the observation of this board; that he be notified if this Board receives any further report of unprofessional conduct that he be subpoenaed to appear before this board looking towards the revocation of his license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina, with the understanding that he will remain under Dr. William R. Griffin, Jr.'s management. That he also be advised that the Board may request an examination and report by Dr. Griffin. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. J. B. Anderson and passed unanimously.

The above verdict was read to Dr. Prusa.

RE: Dr. James Valentine Thomas, Leaksville, North Carolina - On June 5th, 1961, the Narcotic Bureau advised that Dr. Thomas had voluntarily surrendered his narcotic tax stamp on May 17th, 1961, following his admission to the addiction of narcotic drugs. That he stated he had used dilaudid for approximately one year and had used some dolophin.

A report under date of July 21st, 1961, was received from Appalachian Hall that Dr. Thomas was treated there from March 16th to July 4th, 1961. It was stated that his withdrawal was uneventful and it was felt the drug was out of his system; that he had returned one time for outpatient follow-up and after an additional visit, would be transferred to someone nearer home.

Dr. Thomas appeared at this time at the direction of the Board for an interview. He admitted his narcotic addiction (see file complete interview). He said he first had narcotics in the hospital for treatment of migrain headaches; that he had high blood pressure and had nephritis as a child. He said he was now at the beach and expected to transfer to a psychiatrist in Winston-Salem. He said he expected to return to work if he were in condition.

VERDICT: Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that Dr. James Valentine Thomas be advised that this Board is fully conscious of his narcotic irregularities and addiction and we will keep him under surveillance and should any further irregularities occur, he can look forward to a subpoena before this Board looking toward revocation of his license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina. And that he will be instructed to appear before this Board at intervals. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. J. B. Anderson and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. John S. Hooker, Carrboro, North Carolina - To summarize, on December 10th, 1958, Dr. Hooker surrendered his narcotic tax stamp on account of narcotic addiction. On January 16th, 1959, Dr. Hooker appeared before the Board and was

advised that he would continue on probation and remain under the direct supervision of Dr. Thomas G. Thurston; that he be under continuous therapy by a psychiatrist and that if there were any further violation of the law, his license to practice medicine would be revoked.

Dr. Thurston has made investigation intermittently in Dr. Hooker's area and Dr. Hooker has appeared before the Board from time to time. From all reports and Dr. Hooker's allegations, he was doing all right. He stated at one interview that there was no difficulty in practicing without drugs.

Pursuant to a report from the secretary of the State Pharmacy Board that Dr. Hooker was writing an excessive number of narcotic prescriptions and from the manner in which the same were handled, it was indicated that he might be diverting the same to his own use, the secretary of the Board of Medical Examiners requested an investigation by the state bureau of Investigation, which report is dated July 20th, 1961. This report revealed that Dr. Hooker has written 4,239 prescriptions for narcotics since he surrendered his narcotic tax stamp December 10th, 1961, and that this investigation included only a portion of the drug stores in Dr. Hooker's community.

Dr. Hooker was requested to appear at this time and he admitted during this interview that he had been writing prescriptions for narcotics. (See file for complete interview). The following is the verdict of the Board:


VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that Dr. John S. Hooker be subpoenaed by the board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina at the October, 1961 meeting of the board to show cause why his license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina should not be revoked. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

Dr. Hooker was read the above verdict.

RE: Dr. Thomas Beath (see pp 285-287 these Minutes) VERDICT: Dr. Doffermyre moved that Dr. Thomas Beath be advised by the Board of Medical Examiners that it is not good for him to practice such distant medicine since he is not in the position to follow-up and that the Board feels he should discontinue his services in Rocky Mount unless he should desire to move to North Carolina for permanent practice. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

The Minutes for the June 19-22nd, 1961 meeting were approved as read.
