

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS  
OF NORTH CAROLINA

Hotel Queen Charlotte, Charlotte, North Carolina

May 2- 3rd, 1965

- - - -

The Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina met at the Hotel Queen Charlotte, Charlotte, North Carolina, for the purpose of interviewing applicants for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license and other business.

Saturday, May 1st

The Board convened for dinner and Drs. H. Lee Large, Jr., President, Joseph J. Combs, Secretary-Treasurer, James E. Davis, Frank Edmondson, W. Boyd Owen, Clark Rodman, and Ralph G. Templeton and Mrs. Louise J. McNeill, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, were present. Dr. Combs was unable to attend any of the business sessions as he was called away because of a death in his family.

Sunday, May 2nd

10 A. M. - The Board convened and credentials for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license were surveyed; also of foreign medical graduates who appeared to petition to take the written examination.

RE: Dr. James R. Ballew, Raleigh - Report was presented that Dr. Ballew had taken an overdose of medication following difficulty with the police and had been admitted to the hospital and subsequently to Dorothea Dix Hospital. The superintendent of Dorothea Dix Hospital at the time of his report was unable to give complete summary of findings, but referred to the fact that he had suffered a severe head injury several years ago and it was felt that there was some relation between this and his present condition.

VERDICT: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that the secretary follow-up and if necessary that he be seen in June, 1965. This motion was seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. John C. Casstevens - Report presented that the Trust Officer of the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company had advised Dr. Casstevens had been committed to Highland Hospital on the basis of adjudged incompetency. Dr. Casstevens' license to practice medicine in this state was suspended June 16th, 1964 for failure to register his license according to law. He made no reply to any notices sent to him.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that this report on Dr. John C. Casstevens be received as information. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

The following physicians have applied for conversion of limited to full license:

RE: Dr. Salvador J. Cefalu was granted license limited to Dorothea Dix Hospital to cover him in a residency training program. His training will be completed June 30th, 1965, and he will remain there on the staff. His credentials are incomplete at this time.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license of Dr. Salvador J. Cefalu be converted to full license upon completion of requirements. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. James Warren Gibson, Jr. was granted license limited to Duke University School of Medicine to cover him in a residency training program. He will join a group of radiologists in Johnson City, Tennessee, July 1st, 1965, and he has applied for license limited to Mitchell County, North Carolina, as this group covers the hospital in Spruce Pines, North Carolina. The requirements have been met.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of Dr. James Warren Gibson, Jr. be extended to Mitchell County, North Carolina. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Edwin Jacob Lilly was granted license limited to Duke University School of Medicine to cover him in a residency training program. He has now joined the staff there in the Department of Anesthesiology and has applied for conversion of limited to full license. He has met the requirement.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of Dr. Edwin Jacob Lilly be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. John Milton Miller, Jr. was granted license limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine to cover him in a residency training program, which he will complete June 30th, 1965. He is planning to become associated with Dr. Archie Eagles of Ahoskie, North Carolina and has applied for conversion of limited to full license. The requirements have not been met.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of Dr. John Milton Miller, Jr. be converted to full license upon completion of requirements. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. William Terry Taylor was granted license limited to Dorothea Dix Hospital to cover him in a residency training program, which he will complete June 30th, 1965, and he will remain there on the staff. His credentials are incomplete at this time.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of <sup>William</sup> Dr. Terry Taylor be converted to full license upon completion of requirements. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Ingeborg Seiffert Gibson was granted license limited to Rowan County, North Carolina, until citizenship obtained. This was accomplished in April, 1965, and evidence of naturalization presented.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of Dr. Ingeborg Seiffert Gibson be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Emily Susanne S. Mochrie Morley was granted license limited to the North Carolina Sanatorium until citizenship obtained. This was accomplished in December, 1964, and evidence of naturalization was presented.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of Dr. Emily Susanne S. Mochrie Morley be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. John Wilson Morley was granted license limited to the North Carolina Sanatorium until citizenship obtained. This was accomplished in December, 1964, and evidence of naturalization was presented.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the limited license of Dr. John Wilson Morley be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Armando deMoya, now residing in the State of Virginia, was granted license limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, pending citizenship. He has now presented evidence of naturalization.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the secretary be instructed to advise Dr. Armando deMoya the policy of the Board of Medical Examiners is that it is necessary to be practicing in the State of North Carolina in order for limited license to be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James B. Wheless, whose narcotic tax stamp was voluntarily surrendered July 23rd, 1963, appeared to petition for recommendation of reinstatement of his narcotic tax stamp. Dr. Wheless was medically addicted to narcotics, received treatment and allegedly has taken no drugs in two years. A good report was received on him.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the Board of Medical Examiners recommend to the Bureau of Narcotics that Dr. James B. Wheless' narcotic tax stamp be restored. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Lindsay A. Graham, in the Department of Psychiatry at the Veterans Hospital, Durham, and a graduate of McGill University of 1955, has petition to take the written examination. He is a naturalized citizen.

VERDICT: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that Dr. Lindsay A. Graham be granted the privilege of taking the written examination. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. James E. Davis and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Kenneth M. McDonald, graduate of the University of Ottawa, 1963, an American citizen, on duty at Camp Lejeune, has petition to take the written examination.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Kenneth M. McDonald be granted the privilege of taking the written examination. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Joel P. Blancaflor, graduate of the University of Santo Tomas, Phillipines, 1950, has applied for special limited license to Forsyth Memorial Hospital. He does not have the certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates, however, he has license on the basis of written examination by the Illinois Board of Medical Examiners. Dr. W. A. Lambeth, Director of Medical Education there, has presented this problem, stated that he misinterpreted the requirements of the Board, and understood that this state license would be acceptable in lieu of the certificate of the ECFMG, and asked that this be considered by the Board in session.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Joel P. Blancaflor be considered for special limited license to Forsyth Memorial Hospital to cover him as a resident in view of the fact that he has an Illinois license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Purchase of Equipment - The secretary's office reported that with the approval of the president a new typewriter had been purchased for \$309.91.

VERDICT: The Board of Medical Examiners approved purchase of this equipment.

RE: Dr. Leon D. Robinson (See previous Minutes) - Dr. Robinson has applied for renewal of his special limited license to John Umstead Hospital and recommendation from the superintendent of the hospital has been received.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Leon D. Robinson/<sup>be</sup>approved renewal of special limited license to John Umstead Hospital on an annual basis. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Walter Glenn Lewis - In January, 1965, Dr. Lewis was requested to appear before the Board of Medical Examiners in session because of report of the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Board of Health, that Dr. Lewis did not file his birth and death certificates and that every effort had been made to get him to do this. The Board instructed Dr. Lewis to have all his records filed and furnish letter of clearance from the State Board of Health by February 15th, 1965. On February 22nd, 1965, letter was received from the State Board of Health stating that Dr. Lewis had brought his records up to date.

RE: Dr. Paul J. Phillippi, who will be on active duty, has applied for license by endorsement to cover him as an assistant instructor at Duke University School of Medi-

cine for the coming year. This is presented as it has not been the policy of the Board of Medical Examiners to cover physicians on active military duty as license is not required.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that Dr. Paul J. Phillippi be granted the privilege of applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Myron L. Lenkin was granted license by written examination in 1962 by this Board. He has now applied for license by endorsement to the State of Maryland and his grade on Obstetrics-Gynecology does not meet the requirement of that Board. Dr. Lenkin has requested that the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners review his examination for a possible discrepancy.

VERDICT: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that Dr. Myron L. Lenkin be given the privilege of taking the examination in Obstetrics-Gynecology to be given in June, 1965; that if the matter is urgent that he be given a re-examination in the office of the Board. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Bennie Brooks Ward - The Board was advised that the State Bureau of Investigation report received revealed that Dr. Ward had returned from the United States Public Health Service Hospital at Lexington, Kentucky, April 9th, 1965; that shortly after arriving had become intoxicated, had stayed so since that time and had gotten in such condition that he had been committed to the State Hospital in Raleigh as a mental patient. This report was received by the secretary April 29th, 1965. Letter was received by the secretary May 7th, 1965 from Dr. Ward that he had returned home and planned to re-open his office in Shallotte.

VERDICT: The secretary was instructed by the Board to get report of the mental condition of Dr. Bennie Brooks Ward; also the status of the case in criminal court in Brunswick County, which is pending; that report be made at the June<sup>1965</sup> meeting.

The meeting was adjourned.

May 2nd, 2:30 P. M.

RE: Dr. Grayson S. Waldrop's license to practice medicine in this state was revoked on January 11th, 1964 on charges preferred. On June 15th, 1964, he was granted special limited license on an annual basis to permit him to work at Broughton Hospital.

Dr. Waldrop appeared at this time to petition for reinstatement of his license to practice medicine. He stated that he liked his work at Morganton and at this time planned to remain there. He advised the Board that the State Hospitals would be going on the unit system and in addition to caring for patients, the staff doctors would go out into the communities and offer their services on a local basis.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the Board of Medical Examiners not restore the medical license of Dr. Grayson S. Waldrop at this time; that the administration be advised that his special limited license, as long as working under the supervision and direction there, will cover him in his work with out-patients from Broughton Hospital; that he be given the privilege of returning to this Board at the end of a year.

That the secretary be instructed to extend Dr. Grayson S. Waldrop's special limited license on an annual basis. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James P. Westmoreland, Pittsboro, North Carolina, appeared for an interview at the request of the Board of Medical Examiners. He left Norfolk, Virginia, where he was practicing, because of narcotic drug violations. Investigation was made by Norfolk detectives, a signed statement was alleged to have been made to the detectives and the same was furnished this office by the secretary of the Virginia Board of Medical Examiners. Dr. Westmoreland had written prescriptions for an excessive amount of narcotic drugs, which he stated he gave to his ex-wife.

Dr. Westmoreland admitted to the Board that he had written prescriptions in the name of terminal cancer patients, given the drugs to his wife to be administered by a nurse. He denied ever having taken narcotic drugs. He said he had not renewed his narcotic license since April, 1964; that he had not applied for the same.



Dr. Westmoreland was instructed by the Board of Medical Examiners to abide by the narcotic laws and practice ethical medicine in this state. In answer to his inquiry he was told that if he applied for narcotic tax stamp to advise this office and he might be requested to make another appearance before the Board.

RE: Dr. James E. Fender, Waynesville, North Carolina - Investigation by the State Bureau of Investigation, dated February 4-5, 1965, of activities of narcotic addicts in Haywood County, North Carolina, was precipitated by thefts of narcotics from physicians in that area. This investigation revealed that several doctors in that area had prescribed for these addicts.

Dr. Fender was requested to appear at this time to discuss the matter of having prescribed narcotics in large quantities to a narcotic addict for 10 - 14 years. He stated he had inherited this addict, who is now 75 years of age and in poor health; that he felt that it would be almost impossible to take her off the drug. He said he was treating no other addicts; that so far as he knew, the patient he is treating had no other source of demerol and in his opinion she was using all that he had given her. He also stated that he had reported this patient as an addict to the State Board of Health.

Dr. Fender was warned by the Board of the dangers with regard to administering narcotics.

The Board directed that Dr. Fender be instructed by letter from the secretary as to the proper procedure with regard to narcotics.

RE: Dr. Preston Calvin Stringfield, Jr. (See previous Minutes) - Dr. Stringfield has been a patient at the Veterans Hospital, Salisbury, since 1962, except for a short period of time in 1964. He accepted a position at the Cherry Hospital in June, 1964, and was re-admitted to the Veterans Hospital September, 1964. In January, 1965, the Board ruled that proceedings be instructed based on the mental incapacity of Dr. Stringfield on account of his unfavorable prognosis reported by the Veterans Hospital. In February, 1965, this hospital advised the Board that Dr. Stringfield would soon be discharged as having received maximum hospital benefit and would be in a position to defend himself if the Board pressed charges. He was then requested to appear at this time.

Dr. Stringfield stated that his work at Cherry Hospital went along all right for two and one-half months, at which time he began to drink and went on a six-day binge; that he was now receiving occupational therapy; that he had been attempting to obtain a position in an institution; that he had been told he would be allowed to remain there until he could receive employment.

Dr. Stringfield was encouraged to continue his therapy and urged if he left the hospital to do any practice, that it be in an institution where he could have supervision and assistance.

The secretary was instructed to ask the hospital to advise the Board if his discharge were contemplated.

The meeting was adjourned.

May 2nd - 8:30 P. M.

Dr. William G. Anlyan, Dr. Ma. nson Meads and Dr. Taylor, deans of the three medical schools, requested a conference with the Board of Medical Examiners to discuss mutual problems of licensure and appeared at this time. A round table discussion was held.

The meeting was adjourned.

Monday, May 3rd

RE: Dr. Clyde Harold Steffee, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is a Pathologist.

Dr. Large: Will you tell the Board your status with regard to coming to North Carolina.  
 A. I am going to Fayetteville looking to possibly serving Highsmith and Cape Fear Hospitals. My other possibility is Whiteville, which has just come to 150 beds. This is my second choice at the moment. I am reasonably certain I will be in one or the other of these places.

Dr. Davis: When will you locate if it works out favorably?  
 A. I presume by June 1st.

Dr. Large: We do not grant license until a man comes to the state.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No  
 Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with the use or mishandling of alcohol or narcotics or any trouble with a licensing board? A. No  
 Q. He is now chairman of the Council for the American Board of Clinical Pathologists.

VERDICT: Dr. Clyde Harold Steffee, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he makes his decision to locate in the state for practice. (Located in Fayetteville)

RE: Dr. Robert B. Belk appeared without credentials applying for license by endorsement, limited to Charlotte Memorial Hospital, where he will begin a residency July 1st, 1965.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir  
 Q. Have you ever used barbiturates or other drugs to excess? A. No sir  
 Q. Have you ever used alcohol to excess? A. No  
 Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with an examining board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Robert B. Belk was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Charlotte Memorial Hospital, contingent upon completion of credentials satisfactory to the secretary.

RE: Dr. Marguerite Blanks Benway appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. She is a native of North Carolina.

Dr. Large: What have you done?  
 A. After internship in Houston I worked three years in out-patient department in an army hospital, seeing dependents, plus retired army personnel. Following this I have been home with my three children.

Q. What do you contemplate doing?  
 A. Part-time work, in the Health Office of the Student Nurses at Duke Hospital and physician for the Methodist Retirement Home. This is affiliated with Duke.  
 Q. When do you wish to start this appointment?  
 A. At the Methodist Retirement Home and Student Nurses June 15-July 1st. There is one other convalescent home, Mt. Sinai, they have asked that I overlook and start as soon as possible.

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No  
 Q. Have you ever used drugs, barbiturates or alcohol to excess, or narcotics?  
 A. No  
 Q. Have you ever had any trouble with any examining board? A. No

Dr. Large: You and your husband are in Durham?  
 A. Yes, my husband is an Anesthesiologist.

VERDICT: Dr. Marguerite Blanks Benway was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Robert Steele Boring appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Large: What have you done since graduation?  
 A. I have been in the Navy.



Dr. Boring continued

Dr. Large: What do you plan?

A. Solo practice in Internal Medicine in Charlotte in October, 1965.

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever used drugs, alcohol, barbiturates or mishandled narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with a medical licensing board? A. No

Q. We appreciate your coming and making your appearance. Since you do not plan to come to North Carolina until October, you will be advised the action of the Board.

VERDICT: Dr. Robert Steele Boring was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he locates in the state for practice, within one year.

RE: Dr. Edward Kent Carney appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he planned to go in partnership with Dr. Craig Jones, Shelby; that he is completing his training in Thoracic Surgery.

Dr. Large: When will you locate in Shelby?

A. July, 1966.

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with alcohol, barbiturates or narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with a licensing board? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Edward Kent Carney was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. James Howell Davis appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He plans to locate in Raleigh to do Thoracic Surgery.

Dr. Large: What have you done since graduation?

A. Residency training at George Washington University, Philadelphia and general practice in Kansas.

Q. When do you plan to go to work?

A. July 1st

Dr. Davis: Will you be associated there?

A. Yes, eventually, Dr. Kornegay. He is still in residency.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Richard Thomas Deaton was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Charlotte Memorial Hospital.

RE: Dr. Harold Samuel Engler appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is now on the faculty in the Department of Surgery, Medical College of Georgia.

Dr. Edmondson: What are your plans in coming to North Carolina?

A. I am planning to move to Charlotte about September, if possible, or the first of the year, to go into surgical practice with Dr. E. J. Dunning.

Dr. Engler continued

Dr. Davis: What position do you hold now?

A. Associate Professor in the Department of Surgery

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with drugs, narcotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any licensing board? A. No sir

Dr. Edmondson: How long have you been there?

A. Since 1955

VERDICT: Dr. Harold Samuel Engler was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he locates in the State for practice, within one year.

RE: Dr. Hugh Mason Foster, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Large: Dr. Foster is contemplating locating in Charlotte in June, 1965, thoracic surgeon, to locate with Dr. Fred Taylor.

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with drugs, narcotics or alcohol? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with an examining board? A. No sir

Dr. Foster: I hope to be here by July 1st.

VERDICT: Dr. Hugh Mason Foster, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he locates in the state for practice. (To be included with June licentiates if plans are still the same as at this time.)

RE: Dr. John Tilmon Gentry appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. Dr. Gentry is the assistant dean of the School of Public Health at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No, I have not.

Q. Have you ever used or mishandled narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. John Tilmon Gentry was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Joe Brannon Godfrey appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he planned to locate in Forest City upon discharge from the service in July, 1965.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with handling or mishandling barbiturates, alcohol or narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with an examining board? A. No sir

Dr. Godfrey stated that he was going to locate with Dr. Bobby England.

VERDICT: Dr. Joe Brannon Godfrey was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary and when he locates in the state for practice.

RE: Dr. Thomas LaFayette Griffin appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials and stated that he had joined the Carolina General Clinic, Wilson, as Urologist.

Dr. Edmondson: When do you contemplate starting work?

A. As soon as possible, tomorrow.

Dr. Davis: How long have you been there?

A. Two and one-half months

Q. What have you been doing?

A. Sitting around waiting.

VERDICT: Dr. Thomas LaFayette Griffin was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Richard Paul Hancock appeared applying for license limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine to cover him in his residency in Surgery.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime?

A. Yes sir, when I was 19, sophomore year of college, I was convicted of first degree burglary in Tucson. I broke into a grocery store. I was given a three-year suspended sentence, was out of the University for a year and went back the following year.

Q. What prompted this?

A. I can't really say. When I first entered the University I planned on pre-med, did not have the finances, went into a math major, was not interested, was not doing well, got tied up with some who ran around too much. It was first degree in Arizona because of difference between night and day.

Dr. Templeton: Were you or your colleagues armed?

A. No, we had been on a party and we intended to steal a bottle of whiskey.

Dr. Large : Had you been drinking?

A: Yes, when we were apprehended we were not drunk.

Dr. Davis: Any disciplinary plans in the school?

A. No, when I went into medical school at the University of Arizona, they had just set up premedical board and my dean knew about this and they recommended me to Hopkins.

Q. You are applying for limited license for training?

A. Yes, at the present time. My wife is from Newton, in residency training, coming next year to Bowman Gray for training, then we plan to go to Newton to practice.

Dr. Large: Where was your trouble?

A. In Tucson, where I was born and went to school.

Q. Does the chief of police know you ?

A. No, the superior court judge who tried me knew my family.

Q. Is the judge still alive?

A. I do not know, I have not been back in three-four years, my parents are dead.

Q. Have you had any trouble with barbiturates, alcohol, narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board? A. No sir

Q. Are the examining boards aware of this trouble?

A. The Maryland Board is, the only one I have taken.

Dr. Davis: Were they aware of this trouble at Bowman Gray when you were appointed to the residency staff?

A. I do not think so.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Richard Paul Hancock be granted special limited license to cover him until July 1st; that he appear at the June, 1965 meeting and have information sent to clarify the circumstances. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. William Preston Haynes appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials to go to Fontana Dam to do general practice.

Dr. Owen: When do you plan to go work?

A. May 21st

Dr. Large: Do you intend to practice the year round, will this be your permanent home?

A. That is what I am planning.

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir



Dr. Haynes continued

Dr. Large: Have you ever had any difficulty with barbiturates, alcohol? A. No sir  
Twenty-five years ago I drank a little too much, but I quit entirely.

Q. Have you not had any difficulty with alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with narcotics? A. I have never taken them at all except in the hospital.

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. William Preston Haynes was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Robert P. Hornsby appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a research fellow in Medicine.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with barbiturates, alcohol, narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Robert P. Hornsby was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Mildred T. Keene appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials and stated that she planned to join the staff at Broughton Hospital August 1st, 1965.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Leonard Irving Koch was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. Edwin Forrest Mathis appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he contemplated locating with Dr. Harold Lane in Rutherfordton in two weeks.

Dr. Owen: Are all arrangements made?

A. Yes

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the use of barbiturates, narcotics or alcohol?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a licensing board in medicine? A. No sir

Dr. Edmondson: What are you planning to do?

A. Pediatrics

VERDICT: Dr. Edwin Forrest Mathis was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.



RE: Dr. Hervey Winthrop Mead appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials and stated he planned to locate in Charlotte.

Dr. Large: Are you going to be with anyone?

A. Drs. Holbrook and Mundorf.

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a medical examining board? A. No sir

Q. When do you plan to start practice?

A. July

Q. Do you have any negotiations pending contingent upon action of this Board?

A. I want to meet with the Board of Censors of the Mecklenburg County Medical Society.

VERDICT: Dr. Hervey Winthrop Mead was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Donald Torian Moore appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he would practice Obstetrics-Gynecology in Durham.

Dr. Large: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with barbiturates, alcohol or narcotics?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with an examining board in medicine? A. No sir

Dr. Davis: When do you plan to go to work?

A. July 6th. The specialty board is just before that.

Q. Will you be associated?

A. I will be at Lincoln Hospital

Dr. Rodman: What are your plans?

A. I want to look for a job in the State of North Carolina. I can not apply for a job until I have a license.

Q. Your residency will be completed July, 1965?

A. Yes

Q. You could not have made any definite commitments?

A. I could not without license.

VERDICT: Dr. Augustin Aguilar was approved to take the written examination in June, 1965, provided credentials are completed satisfactorily; that license to be limited geographically until citizenship obtained, to be given a period of six years in which to obtain the same.



RE: Dr. Mario C. Battigelli, graduate of the University of Florence, Italy, appeared applying for the privilege of taking the written examination. RE: Dr. Pedro J. Irigaray, graduate of the University of Mexico, "Titulo", appeared petitioning for the privilege of taking the written examination. He received residency training in Psychiatry at Duke University School of Medicine and is now in advanced training at John Umstead Hospital. Dr. Irigaray advised that he expected to receive his immigrant card in the near future. It is planned for Dr. Irigaray to train in the new program in Community Psychiatry.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that Dr. Pedro J. Irigaray be approved to take the written examination contingent upon receiving immigration visa. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Tong Su Kim appeared applying for the privilege of taking the written examination. He is graduated by the Seoul National University, Korea, and received his psychiatric training at the North Carolina Mental Hospital and the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. Dr. Large: What are your plans?

A. I would like to finish surgical residency. I have been offered three to six months surgical fellowship. I would eventually like to locate in the Charlotte area, in one year.

VERDICT: Dr. Stephen J. Naso, Jr. was approved to take the written examination.

RE: Dr. Juan F. Rios, resident at the Forsyth Memorial Hospital, appeared petitioning for the privilege of taking the written examination. He is on an immigration visa, is graduated by the University of Mexico, "Titulo". His wife is a native of Alabama.

Dr. Davis: What are your plans upon completion of residency?

A. Since July of last year I have worked at Forsyth Hospital on a special limited license. I want to take the American Board of Surgery.

Q. You plan to go to Warren County?

A. Yes, Warrenton

Dr. Edmondson: Do you contemplate going in with someone?

A. By myself.

Dr. Davis: Would you do only surgery?

A. Yes, that is what I told the administrator and both of trustees and agreed with the doctors.

Dr. Large: If you are granted the privilege of taking this examination, you will receive license geographically limited, to be converted after achieving citizenship, within six years, or expire.

A. I expect citizenship within eight weeks.

VERDICT: Dr. Juan F. Rios was approved to take the written examination contingent upon completion of credentials.

RE: Dr. Seuk ky Kim, staff Radiologist at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Durham, graduate of the Medical College of Yonsei University of Korea, appeared petitioning for the privilege of taking the written examination. He is a naturalized citizen and it is the desire to have him under contract at Duke University School of Medicine.

Dr. Davis: Did you have your Radiology at the Veterans Administration?

A. No, New York at Syracuse, one year in Pittsburgh.

Q. What type of Radiology will you do at Duke?

A. Diagnostic

Q. Has it been confirmed by Dr. Lester that you will have an appointment at Duke?

A. Ye

VERDICT: Dr. Seuk ky Kim was approved for the written examination contingent upon meeting all the requirements of the Board of Medical Examiners.

RE: Dr. Angus Sinclair Dunn appeared petition for the privilege of taking the written examination. He presented immigration card. Dr. Dunn was graduated by Anderson College of Medicine, which was incorporated within the University of Glasgow, Scotland. He stated that he planned to do general practice and pediatrics or public health with pediatrics.

Dr. Large: Where do you plan to work?

A. I should like to live in a town between 2-50,000.

Dr. Davis: What draws you to North Carolina?

A. Dr. Higgins offered me a health officer post. My wife was ill and that fell through. In Florida one has to wait for citizenship.



Dr. Dunn continued

Dr. Large: Have you looked into any particular community?

- A. I have written to Mecklenburg County and Siler City was suggested. I wrote there. I have not pursued it. It is too early in the gam until I can take the examination. I am going to look around. If granted the opportunity and did not make a good showing, would one have an opportunity to repeat?
- A. You would have, but not for a year. If you were granted the privilege of taking the examination, the license would be geographically limited to the area in which you would live, convertible to full license after full citizenship achieved.

VERDICT: Dr. Angus Sinclair Dunn was approved for the written examination.

The meeting was adjourned.

RE: Dr. Alton Lane Bullard - On January 10th, 1964, Dr. Bullard's license to practice medicine was reinstated. (See his previous record)

On April 23rd, 1965, the secretary received report from the president of the Forsyth County Medical Society stating that Dr. Bullard had been dropped from the staff of Forsyth Memorial Hospital due to being intoxicated while on his 24 hour duty at the emergency room; that a patient had reported he seemed too intoxicated to see patients in his office; that Dr. Bullard had allegedly been a patient at the Alcoholic Rehabilitation Center at Butner.

Upon presentation of the above report to the Board in session (May 2nd, 1965) it was decided to call Dr. Bullard and direct him to appear at this time, which he did. He said he was in practice 11 months after having his license reinstated, that he want to the hospital in Radford, Virginia, in June or July, 1964, for treatment and then to John Umstead Hospital, Alcoholic Rehabilitation Center, for treatment for alcoholism. That in February, 1965, his driver's license was suspended for two years for driving under the influence of alcohol; that his hospital privileges at the Forsyth Memorial Hospital were suspended because of drinking while on emergency room duty. He stated his office burned February, 1965, but he was out of practice at that time. It was recommended to Dr. Bullard that he voluntarily surrender his license to practice medicine and seek treatment, which he agreed to do.

VERDICT: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton moved that the Board of Medical Examiners accept the voluntary surrender of medical license of Dr. Alton Lane Bullard and that he get under immediate psychiatric treatment in one of the mental institutions. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

Dr. Bullard was advised the actgon of the Board and was told that the Board would endeavor to assist him in expediting his admission to John Umstead Hospital.

Dr. Franklin S. Kincheloe, Jr.- On June 17th, 1963, following a hearing, Dr. Kincheloe was found guilty of unprofessional and dishonorable conduct by the Board of Medical Examiners and his license to practice medicine was revoked. He appealed the action of the Board to the Superior Court of Wake County and the decision of the Board was upheld in said court on January 16th, 1964, following which Dr. Kincheloe surrendered his license certificate to practice medicine to the secrteary of the Board.

Dr. Kincheloe appeared at this time to petition for reinstatement of his license to practice medicine. A delegation from Selma appeared on behalf of Dr. Kincheloe, who were the chairman of the Chamber of Commerce, the postmaster, his pastor, a Methodist minister, the chief of police, and a druggist; also letters of recommendation were received from members of the medical profession. A need for Dr. Kincheloe's professional services there were expressed; also a personal interest in having him returned to practice. (See file for interview)

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the Board of Medical Examiners reserve its decision relative to the request of Dr. Franklin S. Kincheloe, Jr. to reinstate his license to practice medicine to the July, 1965 meeting, during which time further investigation could be made with regard to Dr. Kincheloe. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

Dr. Kincheloe was advised the verdict of the Board by the president.



RE: Dr. William M. Bethune, Jr., Raleigh - Report was presented that Dr. Bethune, due to excessive intake of amphetamines, was committed to Dorothea Dix Hospital January 9th, 1965 and discharged March 4th, 1965. (See file for report from hospital) He was to continue under the care of a psychiatrist.

The report from the hospital also revealed that Dr. Bethune has had a previous commitment at this hospital, as well as one other.

Dr. Bethune appeared at this time at the request of the Board. He stated that he had withdrawn himself from amphetamines prior to treatment, but the toxicity was long lasting; that he felt he was all right at this time and had had no temptation to return to amphetamines; that he had never taken narcotics nor barbiturates; that he was not a "drinker". He stated that it would be difficult for a surgeon to obtain institutional work; that he felt he was able to return to his practice in General Surgery. Letter was presented from Dr. Alfred T. Hamilton, Chief of Surgery, at Rex Hospital.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the Board of Medical Examiners recommend that Dr. William M. Bethune, Jr. work for the immediate period of time under the direct supervision of another surgeon, preferably Dr. Alfred T. Hamilton, Chief of Surgery, or someone he would be directed to; that he continue his psychiatric therapy; that he continue his psychiatric therapy; that he be seen by the Board of Medical Examiners in six months with reference to his preceptorship and his psychiatric therapy. Dr. Frank Edmondson duly seconded this motion and the same was passed unanimously.

This information was given to Dr. Bethune by the president and he was commended.

Dr. Large: Do you wish us to communicate with Dr. Harper?

Dr. Bethune: Yes, if you wish to do so.

RE: Dr. Patrick L. Chipley, Enka, North Carolina - Investigation by the State Bureau of Investigation (report dated February 4-5th, 1965) of activities of narcotic addicts in Haywood County, North Carolina was precipitated by thefts of narcotics from physicians in that area. This investigation revealed that several doctors in that area had prescribed for these addicts.

Dr. Chipley was requested to appear at this time to discuss the matter of having prescribed narcotics in large quantities to a narcotic addict, for six months in 1962, about one prescription per month for demerol, six months in 1963-64, averaging about one prescription per week, about seven ampoules.

Dr. Chipley stated that he used demerol thinking it had less addictive tendencies; that the patient referred to complained of migraine headaches; that he had not studied the etiology of her headaches.

Dr. Chipley was warned by the Board of the dangers of administering narcotic drugs indiscriminately and requested to look into the disposition of narcotics more thoroughly.

The Board directed that Dr. Chipley be instructed by letter from the secretary as to proper procedure with regard to narcotics.

RE: Dr. A. E. Perry - January 8th, 1960, Dr. Perry's license was revoked and on June 21st, 1961, his license to practice medicine in North Carolina was restored, limited to Mecklenburg County, with certain limitations as to his practice.

Dr. Perry has appeared at this time to petition the Board of Medical Examiners to remove the limitation from his license to practice medicine. (See file for full interview) He stated that he resided in Union County (Monroe) and practiced in Charlotte; that he had no plan to return to Union County to practice, but that he might want to pursue training in Psychiatry or move his practice to another location.

The Board advised Dr. Perry that if he had a plan to change his location either for further training or practice, to make a request to the Board; that the Board felt that due to information it had, it was best for his position to remain as is.

RE: Dr. Edwin S. Mize, Jr. had been requested to appear at this time with regard to his narcotic addiction.

Dr. Large: Since the last report it has been discovered by nurses that Dr. Mize was ordering drugs for patient and administering to himself; that he called last week and asked to be excused as he was going to Lexington for treatment; that he was directed to have the hospital report to the Board; that his wife took him and he was admitted voluntarily.

RE: Dr. Charles Warren Williams, Charlotte, North Carolina (Colored) - Pursuant to indictment of violation of the Internal Revenue Laws by filing false and fraudulent



Dr. Williams continued

income tax returns, Dr. Williams was convicted in Federal Court in February, 1965. The judgment was fine of \$10,000.00 and 18 months imprisonment, execution of sentence suspended on condition that defendant pay the fine and file all reports timely and correctly and defendant placed on probation.

Dr. Williams appeared at this time at the request of the Board. He stated that he had bought a large tract of property for development; that due to circumstances he had been unable to develop the same and had taken a great loss; that he attempted to take the loss off his income tax by underestimating his income by \$14,000.00 per year until this absorbed; that he then reported his income correctly, but by that time the investigation had begun.


Mr. John H. Anderson, Jr., Attorney, stated that evidently the judge took his explanation into consideration.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Charles Warren Williams be reprimanded and that the district councilor be asked to co-operate with the Board and report periodically. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

Dr. Williams was given the verdict of the Board.

The Minutes were approved as read.
