

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS
OF NORTH CAROLINA

Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, North CAROLINA

May 7-10th, 1960

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The Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina met May 7-10th, 1960 at the Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, North Carolina, for the purpose of interviewing applicants for license by endorsement and special limited license and for other business.

Saturday, May 7th

The Board convened for dinner at 6 P. M. Drs. J. B. Anderson, President, J. J. Combs, Secretary-Treasurer, Thomas W. Baker, L. R. Doffermyre, E. A. Rasberry, Jr., Thomas G. Thurston, Carl V. Tyner, and Mrs. Louise J. McNeill, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, were present.

RE: Dr. John M. Gambill, Snow Hill, North Carolina (See previous Minutes) - On January 10th, 1960, Dr. Gambill's license to practice medicine was revoked, judgment and revocation suspended upon certain conditions.

The secretary reported that he had received information that Dr. Gambill had violated the terms of his suspension.

VERDICT: Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that if everything is not in order in the monthly report due May 15th, 1960, that the judgment go into effect and that Dr. John M. Gambill be notified that his license be revoked. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. T. G. Thurston and passed unanimously.

Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that if information received on May 15th, 1960, is favorable to Dr. John M. Gambill, that the secretary be instructed to ask Mr. R. W. Pope to conduct a special, private investigation for the Board prior to the June 19-23rd, 1960 meeting, with reference to Dr. Gambill's conduct. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. T. G. Thurston and passed unanimously.

RE: Foreign Medical Graduates

RESOLVED: That in order for a graduate of a foreign medical school to receive a full license from the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners he must fulfill the following requirements, namely:

1. He must pass the examinations of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates.
2. If successful in the above examinations, he must appear in person for interview with the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners, to request permission to take the examinations of the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners, and
3. If permission is granted to take the examinations of the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners, he must pass these said examinations.

The above resolution was made by Dr. T. W. Baker, seconded by Dr. E. A. Rasberry, Jr. and passed by a vote of five.

RE: Dr. E. C. Fowler - The secretary reported that Dr. Fowler was on the staff in the State Hospital in Goldsboro on a special limited license; that he is approved American graduate, but not eligible for license by endorsement as the grade on anatomy by the Missouri Board was below our requirement.

VERDICT: Dr. E. A. Rasberry, Jr. moved that Dr. E. C. Fowler be allowed to take the examination on anatomy.

RE: Dr. George W. Melchior - (See previous Minutes) - The secretary presented letter from the Board of Censors of the Wilson County Medical Society as to Dr. Melchior's eligibility for membership in that society.

VERDICT: The Board ruled that according to the constitution as outlined in the secretary's letter, that Dr. George W. Melchior would not be eligible for membership in the Wilson County Medical Society. Motion was made by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre, seconded by Dr. E. A. Rasberry, Jr. and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. J. W. Straughan, Warsaw, North Carolina - (See previous Minutes) - Dr. L. R. Doffermyre reported that from all information Dr. Straughan is doing all right; that he did not see him personally; that he understood he was attending medical meetings; that there was no evidence of his having been under the influence of any drugs.

VERDICT: Dr. J. J. Combs moved that this report in regard to Dr. J. W. Straughan be received as information, seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. J. R. Medlin, Jr., Rural Hall, North Carolina - To summarize, Dr. Medlin was admitted to the United States Public Health Service Hospital for treatment of drug addiction on October 27th, 1959. The Board at its January, 1960 meeting directed that Dr. Medlin be requested to report at the next meeting following his discharge from the hospital and have his brother, Dr. C. T. Medlin, appear with him.

The secretary reported that Dr. Medlin was indicted at the March 7th, 1960 Term of Superior Court of Forsyth County, North Carolina, for forgery of prescriptions for demerol on two counts, using the name of C. T. Medlin, M. D. on the said prescriptions. Dr. Medlin entered a plea of guilty to obtaining narcotics by fraud on one count and nolo contendere to the other count. The judgment of the court as of April 11th, 1960, was as follows:

"State vs Dr. J. R. Medlin, Jr.

T. D. #3895, Indictment, Obtaining Narcotics by Fraud, March 7, 1960, Term

T. D. #3895-A, Indictment, Obtaining Narcotics by Fraud, March 7, 1960, Term

"The defendant comes into open Court and through his counsel Eugene H. Phillips, enters a plea of guilty to Obtaining Narcotics by Fraud as charged in the Indictment in case #3895, and enters a plea of nolo contendere to obtaining narcotics by fraud as charged in the indictment in case #3895-A.

"In case No. 3895, it is the judgment of the Court that the defendant be confined in the Central Prison, Raleigh, for a period of not less than one (1) nor more than three (3) years and be assigned to do labor as provided by law. This prison sentence is suspended for a period of five (5) years on conditions:



Dr. J. R. Medlin continued

- "1. That he pay a fine of \$500.00 and costs;
2. That he remain of good behavior and not violate any of the laws of this State, and particularly that he not violate any of the provisions of the State Narcotics Drug Act which includes G. S. of N. C. section 90-86 through 91-13.7, or any of the provisions of the State Narcotic Drug Act. In event the defendant violates any of the terms of this judgment, capias and commitment to issue.

In No. 3895-A, by consent of the defendant in open Court prayer for judgment is continued from term to term for a period of five (5) years and specifically until the April Term, 1965."

VERDICT: Dr. T. G. Thurston moved that Dr. J. R. Medlin, Jr. be subpoenaed to appear before the Board of Medical Examiners at its June, 1960 meeting to answer to charges looking towards revocation of his license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. George A. Mears, Asheville, North Carolina - (See previous Minutes) - Dr. J. B. Anderson reported that Dr. Mears' behavior has been satisfactory; that he has received no adverse reports from his colleagues or friends; that he is not doing any surgery and is not on the staff of any hospital.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson's report on Dr. George A. Mears was received as information.

The meeting was adjourned.

RE: Foreign Medical Graduates - (See p. 161 these Minutes) - State Mental Institutions and Sanatorium System -

Following reports by letter, Dr. E. A. Hargrove, Superintendent of the State Hospitals Board of Control, and Dr. Stuart Willis, Director of the State Sanatorium System, with Drs. H. F. Easom and C. D. Thomas, Medical Directors, appeared to discuss their problems with the Board. They stated that it is very difficult still to recruit physicians; that they are not now entertaining any applications from foreign medical graduates who have not received the full certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates. Two of the physicians with the State Mental Institutions have received the certificate of the ECFMG and have qualified for written examination. There are now a total of seven foreign medical graduates in these institutions who have not qualified for written examination, two of whom are in the State Sanatorium System for training purposes and will return to their respective countries. The following are resolutions of the Board:

RESOLVED: That the special limited license of the foreign medical graduates of the State Mental Institutions, presently employed as staff physicians be extended for a period of one year to July 1st, 1961, with the understanding that the staff members who have not passed the examination of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates will prepare to do so and apply to this Board for permission to take the written examination of the Board of Medical Examiners, with the exception of Drs. R. J. Christiaens and Sarah Evans.

That this resolution in no way implies that the superintendents of the various institutions are to consider applicants for staff members of foreign graduates, who have not received the permanent certificate of the ECFMG. This motion was made by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre, seconded

by Dr. C. V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

Dr. E. A. Hargrove was given the action of the Board.

RESOLVED: That the special limited license of the foreign medical graduates of the State Sanatorium System, presently employed, be extended for a period of one year to July 1st, 1961, with the understanding that the staff members who have not passed the examination of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates will prepare to do so and apply to this Board for permission to take the written examination of the Board of Medical Examiners.

That this resolution in no way implies that the directors of the various institutions are to consider applicants for staff members of foreign graduates who have not received the permanent certificate of the ECFMG. This motion was made by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre, seconded by Dr. C. V. Tyner, and passed unanimously.

Drs. Stuart Willis, H. F. Easom and C. D. Easom were given the action of the Board.

In reporting this action, only foreign graduates with immigration visa would be eligible to take a position as staff physician, who would be eligible to take the written examination of the Board. That a physician coming for training purposes on an exchange visa might apply for special limited license.

Dr. Combs moved that foreign medical graduates in this country for training purposes on an exchange visa be allowed to work in the state institutions with a special limited license on an annual basis. This motion was seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

Dr. J. J. Combs moved that physicians coming to our state institutions as staff physicians, who present the required credentials for licensure in North Carolina, will be permitted to work under a special limited license until the next written examination given by the Board. This motion was seconded by Dr. E. A. Raspberry, Jr. and passed unanimously.

Foreign Graduates - Residents

Dr. T. W. Baker moved that the Temporary Certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates be recognized for internship and residency training. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

Dr. T. W. Baker moved that the special limited license for residents in regard to the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates comply with the agreement for those who are planning to take the examination in September, 1960, or whose term of residency terminates by January 1st, 1961. This resolution refers to residents presently in training in North Carolina. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. C. V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned.



Sunday, May 8

The Board convened and reviewed credentials for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license.

The meeting was adjourned.

Monday, May 9

The following physicians were interviewed for license by endorsement of credentials:

RE: Dr. Julian Barker, a native of North Carolina, appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials:

Dr. Baker: Why did you go to Leiden?

A. I had difficulty getting into an American school.

Q. Did you have any trouble transferring to the University of Buffalo?

A. No sir

Dr. Thurston: Where do you plan to practice?

A. Charlotte, solo in obstetrics.

Dr. Baker: When are you going to Charlotte?

A. July 1st. I have to go back to Galveston.

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used narcotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a licensing board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Julian Barker was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. George Carl Alderman appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he planned to locate in Wilmington for the practice of otolaryngology.

Dr. Raspberry: Will you be with someone?

A. By myself

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever taken narcotics or hypnotics? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau or a licensing Board? A. No sir

Q. Are you ready to practice now?

A. Yes

VERDICT: Dr. George Carl Alderman was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Robert Stuart Boatright appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he planned to practice pathology in the Haywood County Hospital, Waynesville.

Dr. Anderson: Are you in Waynesville now?

A. No sir, I will begin July 1st.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with narcotics or hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau of a licensing board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Robert Stuart Boatright was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. John Richard Ranvier Bobb appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Anesthesiology. Dr. Bobb has been in the Department of Physiology and Pharmacology as an associate professor.

Dr. Baker: Are you giving up your professorship at Bowman Gray?
A. No

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir
Q. Have you had any difficulty with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Bureau of Narcotics? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. John Richard Ranvier Bobb was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. John Lyndon Brockman, a native of North Carolina, appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. Dr. Brockman stated he has another year in surgical residency at Emory.

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir
Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau? A. No
Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. John Lyndon Brockman was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Leonard Brown of Hackensack, New Jersey, appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Raspberry: You are doing obstetrics and gynecology?
A. For the past 10 years.

Q. Where do you plan to practice?
A. I would like to go to the western part of the state when I do. I have no immediate plans for coming down.

Dr. Anderson: When do you anticipate coming down?
A. I could not tell you, sometime in the future, not immediately. I am tired of the rat race.

Q. You have no place in the western part of the state?
A. Somewhere I am needed, a small town.

Q. Your sole reason for leaving New Jersey is because of the push and hurry of the practice there?
A. That is right. I have one of the best, if not the best practice, in Hackensack and it has beat me down.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir
Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau? A. No
Q. Have you ever taken hypnotics, narcotics or alcohol to excess?
A. No sir



Dr. Leonard Brown continued

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever had any difficulty with a licensing board?

A. No sir, this is the first time I have applied in another state.

Q. It is the policy of the Board of Medical Examiners not to grant license until you are ready to come to North Carolina. We would have to hold this in abeyance, provided you move in the year.

Dr. Combs: When you are ready to come in, if the Board looks with favor, you will be notified you will get license, if you come in within a year. Otherwise, the Board may require you to make another appearance.

A. I do not think it will be within a year.

Q. This is not against your record.

VERDICT: Dr. Leonard Brown was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, when he locates in the state for the practice of medicine, within one year.

RE: Dr. William Joseph Callison appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Raspberry: You are at Vanderbilt?

A. Yes

Q. Dr. Callison plans to practice in Asheville on July 1st.

Dr. Anderson: Are you going to be associated with Drs. Watts and Montgomery?

A. Yes

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No, I have not

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau? A. No, I have not.

Q. Have you had any difficulty with barbiturates, opiates, hypnotics?

A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board? A. No sir

Q. Have you got a place there?

A. Yes, I got a house this week-end.

VERDICT: Dr. William Joseph Callison was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are approved satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Patrick Joseph Cavanaugh appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Raspberry: Are you at Duke already?

A. Yes, I started there April 1st.

Q. He is a radiologist.

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you had any difficulty with narcotics or hypnotics? A. No

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau of a licensing board? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Patrick Joseph Cavanaugh was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Kenneth Henley Chambers, a native of North Carolina, appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Raspberry: Where do you plan to practice?

A. Either in Wadesboro or Montgomery County.

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with narcotics or hypnotics? A. No

Q. Have you had any difficulty with alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with any licensing board? A. No sir

Dr. Doffermyre: When do you plan to practice?

A. In July after I finish my internship.

VERDICT: Dr. Kenneth Henley Chambers was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary.

RE: Dr. Charles Otis Chrysler appeared before the Board January 8th, 1960, applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He was approved contingent upon moving into the state. Dr. Chrysler presented evidence to Board member Dr. T. W. Baker that he would move to Charlotte in June, 1960, where he has purchased a home and leased an office.

VERDICT: Dr. T. W. Baker moved that Dr. Charles Otis Chrysler be granted license by endorsement of credentials, as he has complied with the requirements of the Board. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Henri deSaussure Clarke appeared before the Board January 8th, 1960, with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is an interne. His credentials are now complete.

VERDICT: Dr. Henri deSaussure Clarke was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. Thomas Lawrence Clarke, a native of North Carolina, appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Tyner: You are planning to locate where?

A. I have not definitely decided. I am considering Rocky Mount.

Q. When

A. In July or soon after.

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or the Narcotic Bureau? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Thomas Lawrence Clarke was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.



RE: Dr. Clarence Cokely, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Tyner: You are going to Richardson Hospital in Greensboro?

A. Yes sir

Dr. Anderson: Where have you been?

A. I have been working for the VA in Tuskegee, Alabama.

Q. Since you finished medical school?

A. After finishing residency training at Meharry in 1955 I have been employed by the VA.

Q. When are you planning to go to Greensboro?

A. By July 1st.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Clarence Cokely, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Virgil Munsey Cox, Jr. appeared before the Board January 8th, 1960, with incomplete credentials, applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Psychiatry. Dr. Cox' credentials are now complete.

VERDICT: Dr. Virgil Munsey Cox, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. John Thomas Dayton appeared before the Board January 8th, 1960, applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He was approved contingent upon moving into the state. Dr. Dayton presented evidence to Board member Dr. T. W. Baker that he would move to Charlotte in June, 1960, where he is building a home and a clinic building.

VERDICT: Dr. T. W. Baker moved that Dr. John Thomas Dayton be granted license by endorsement of credentials, as he has complied with the requirements of the Board. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Robert L. Dame appeared before the Board January 8th, 1960, and was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, contingent upon his coming into the state for practice. The secretary presented letter from Dr. J. S. Holbrook of Davis Hospital, Statesville, North Carolina, confirming the fact that he would begin work there in June or July of this year.

VERDICT: Dr. T. W. Baker moved that Dr. Robert L. Dame be approved for license by endorsement of credentials. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Edwin Justin Dealy appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Tyner: You plan to locate in Pinehurst?

A. Yes in Anesthesiology.

Q. When are you planning to move to Pinehurst?

A. Sometime in the next six months.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau or with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any trouble with a licensing board? A. No sir

Dr. Baker: Have you made any commitments in Pinehurst as to a home?

A. I almost did but we did not get together.

Q. It is definite you are coming to Pinehurst?

A. As definite as a thing like that can be. I want to cut down as I have worked pretty hard. They need somebody there.

Dr. Anderson: We do not issue a license to a doctor moving into North Carolina until he has moved in. If we see fit to issue you a license, we would have to do that in one year, when you get ready to move notify the secretary.

Dr. Doffermyre: Your practice in Pinehurst will be year round, you anticipate to make it your year round home?

A. If I go there, I intend to stay there.

Q. Pinehurst is a resort area and we find some who want to practice three to four months in Pinehurst.

VERDICT: Dr. Edwin Justin Dealy was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary and if he comes into the state within one year.

RE: Dr. John Charles Doerr appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Tyner: You plan to go to Rex Hospital in Anesthesiology?

A. Yes

Dr. Anderson: Where have you been since you finished school?

A. I was in the Army two years, general practice in Kentucky three years, residency in Rochester, Minnesota three years, then have been in Charleston, South Carolina for seven years.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau or a licensing board? A. No sir

Dr. Combs: Why do you want to move?

A. My family have developed hay fever and asthma and we decided it might be well to get out. We took a trip and they seemed to clear up. That is when I thought it might be well to get away from the coastal area.

Q. When do you want to move?

A. I would like to move in this afternoon.

VERDICT: Dr. John Charles Doerr was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. George David Gowder, Jr. appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Raspberry: Where do you plan to practice?

A. Franklin - I am practicing about 10 miles across the Georgia line and reside in Blairsville. I am considering a move to Franklin.

Dr. Combs: If you are going to live in Georgia, we would give a license limited to the area you need or if you move into North Carolina, then you would be a resident and get a full license.

Dr. Baker: What counties?

A. Clay and Macon

Dr. Anderson: What type of practice?

General practice - Dr. Ed Angel suggested I apply for license in case I move to Franklin. If I stay in Blairsville, I would need a license for Clay County. I think the limited license would be sufficient.

(Dr. Gowder was advised to notify the secretary as to his plans)

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau or a licensing board? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol?

A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. George David Gowder, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary, for limited license to Macon and Clay Counties if he remains in Georgia, and full license if he moves into North Carolina. (Credentials completed, limited to Clay, Cherokee and Macon Counties, North Carolina)

RE: Dr. Robert Clyde Grant appeared with incomplete credentials, applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Doffermyre: What type of practice?

A. Internal medicine

Q. Where?

A. I am not sure, probably Waynesville, Hendersonville or Asheville.

Q. When?

A. July or August.

Q. It is not the policy of this Board to issue license until a residency has been reestablished. I mean by that, we would issue license contingent upon your moving into the state.

A. I will be moving in a month.

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau or a licensing board? A. No sir

Q. You have not made plans to get a home?

A. No

Q. When do you think you will?

A. In about two weeks.

VERDICT: Dr. Robert Clyde Grant was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary and when he moves into the state, within one year.

RE: Dr. Alton Lee Hood, native of North Carolina, appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Anderson: Where are you going to practice?

A. I am going to be a foreign medical missionary. I am going to the Seminary at Wake Forest and want to be associated with a physician while there. I have not made arrangements yet.

- Dr. Anderson: Where did you go after 1943?
 A. Internship at Fitzgerald Mercy one year, in service three years 1943-1946. 1946 temporarily practiced with another individual until set up practice in Nanticoke, Pennsylvania, until 1956. In 1954-1956 I was contemplating a move to Philadelphia and did graduate work in obstetrics-gynecology and did partial practice in Nanticoke. I was in Philadelphia from 1956 until the present. In contemplating a move here disposed of practice.
- Q. What type of practice?
 A. General practice and obstetrics and gynecology 1956-1960, except a few months while disposing of practice I filled in at Taylor Hospital, Philadelphia.
- Q. Were you in any other hospital?
 A. I was on the staff on a great number of hospitals.
- Q. In Philadelphia?
 A. St. Agnes and Jefferson
- Dr. Baker: From 1956 to the present were you in private practice in Philadelphia except in the short interim prior to moving to Wadesboro - how long was that short interim?
 A. Possibly four to five months
- Q. Did you do anything medically during that time?
 A. Yes, I was at Taylor Hospital. Yes, since I had disposed of the practice, through a friend at the Dixon Hospital, a hospital for upper respiratory diseases, medical complications and thoracic surgery.
- Dr. Anderson: Did you have any difficulties while there?
 A. None, the only difficulties I had were reverberations of divorce action of my wife while in the Philadelphia area. I had office and home together. I continued practicing there awhile. It was not feasible to try to continue home and office.
- Dr. Baker: What year were you divorced?
 A. It became final in September, 1959.
- Q. You have remarried?
 A. Yes



Dr. Alfons Stanley Warakowski continued

Dr. Baker: Any children by your first marriage?

A. Yes, a daughter. That, of course, was an influential factor. Being situated in the residential section there I had a nice set up, but not feasible for a man by himself to continue.

Dr. Anderson: Why did you want to move to North Carolina from Pennsylvania?

A. Through Dr. Sorrell and the Alumni Association. I had worked at Jefferson in the Obstetrics-Gynecology clinics for sometime. Dr. Sorrell contacted me and I took a trip down to Wadesboro.

Q. When did you come down?

A. That would probably have been in February.

Q. You have not been doing anything since January until now?

A. Except at the Taylor Hospital. I was in Philadelphia until the latter part of March until I moved down with my equipment, which is set up. The office and home is set up simply waiting for reciprocity.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with narcotics or hypnotics?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with alcohol? A. No sir

Q. None?

A. No, absolutely none.

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with a licensing board?

A. No, I have only had a Pennsylvania license.

Dr. Tyner: Are you going to do solo?

A. Dr. Sorrell has reached the place he wants somebody to take over and obstetrics-gynecology is open. The office is next door to Dr. Sorrell. The physician there went into residency training. The intention is permanently settling there.

Dr. Anderson: When were you last active in the medical society in Pennsylvania?

A. As far as dues are concerned 1958.

Q. Why did you not keep up your dues in 1959?

A. I gave up my practice in 1959. I did not pay the dues. I did not know where I would relocate. At Taylor Hospital there was no advantage in belonging to the society when I knew I was going to move.

Dr. Combs: Were you on a salary at Taylor Hospital?

A. Yes, house physician.

Dr. Baker: What was your position at the Dixon Hospital?

A. That is a state proposition.

Dr. Anderson: Were you on a salary?

A. Yes, it was a temporary fill in. The surgery was the thing that interested me there. It was not the thing one practicing would be interested in.

Dr. Raspberry: How many months were you there?

A. Approximately six months.

Dr. Combs: What was the appointment when you went there?

A. There was no particular length of time for appointment. There

A. is no obligation. It was simply a fill in until something better turned up.

Dr. Anderson: Why did you leave Dixon Hospital before you had secured a location? Because you intended to go back in practice?

A. Yes

Q. In Philadelphia?

A. Yes. To get such a location as in Wadesboro would take quite a bit of time.

Q. Did you go back in practice in Philadelphia?

A. More or less doing general practice but taking over for some of the men who wished to take off a few days. I was awaiting if possible an association in practice, hoping for obstetrics-gynecology, which I have been concentrating on for quite a period of time. The only reason I left Philadelphia was to go in service. Coming back it was just the good fortune, an old friend died, I took over the office and home. I had a misfortune in 1950, resulting from a fire next door, my house caught fire and was demolished and I had to start all over. There was a delay.

Dr. Anderson: Do you have professional liability insurance?

A. I did have. The change occurred with membership in the county society, once you drop membership you lose it. I have not had it since I dropped that.

Q. You practiced without it?

A. Yes

Q. Don't you think that is dangerous?

A. I was never afraid of it.

Q. You have never been declined any insurance?

A. No, definitely not.

Q. Why did you take a chance?

A. It is one of those things, you do not think.

Q. We have information that you were discharged from your service at Dixon Hospital because of the use of alcohol.

A. Let me straighten that out. Unknown to me an embarrassing situation arose. I resigned from Dixon. There was a little disturbance there. It was called to my attention by the attorney who handled my divorce proceedings. He told me not to reveal my whereabouts. I made a trip up state. My wife was spoiling for me. She was instrumental.

Q. That does not have anything to do with charges of the hospital, alcohol, absent from work.

A. I had resigned, in refusal of the resignation, that was brought up. There was no use of alcohol. I can have that verified by my wife.

Q. We have information from the institution that you were drinking.

A. I do not drink.

Dr. Baker: He was discharged for incompetency and alcohol.



Dr. Alfons Stanley Warkowski continued

Dr. Anderson: You did not drink any alcohol while at Dixon Hospital?

A. I may have off duty at times. I can say this, even prior to my leaving Dixon I did not drink.

Q. Did you drink while at Dixon excessively?

A. No, there is no access on the grounds, no sir. Someone may have brought it in. We may have had some. The guard had access to some brought in on state property.

Q. Did the guard ever bring it to your place?

A. Yes

Q. Did you ever drink while there?

A. Yes

Q. Did you drink on duty?

A. No

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been denied, has your application for malpractice insurance, ever been turned down?

A. No sir, no application for anything has ever been turned down.

Q. Your lack of carrying professional liability insurance is purely voluntary on your part?

A. Yes, it was carried while a member of a county society.

Dr. Anderson: We will have to go further to investigate your problem.

A. I am in the position of having been brought to Wadesboro by Dr. Sorrell and I can not remain there without practicing.

Q. Were you ever associated with Dr. Turner?

A. Yes

Q. How were you associated?

A. Only as a friend. I should have mentioned that, I forgot it. Dr. Turner was at Montgomery. It was a temporary stop over there for Dr. Turner, who had hepatitis. I thought it was something while I am setting up in the Philadelphia area.

Dr. Baker: Have you been told you would have hospital privileges at Anson County Hospital?

A. My assurance came from such men as Drs. Covington and Sorrell. No formal assurance has been made.

Q. How recently have you been assured?

A. I was assured of that when I visited there in February.

Q. Have you been assured since that time?

A. By Dr. Sorrell, yes I would say, Dr. Kress of course.

Q. Has Dr. Kress assured you that you would get hospital privileges?

A. We spoke on the assumption I was on the staff.

Dr. Warkowski was advised by the Board that further investigation would have to be made and he would have to furnish further reference; that the next meeting of the Board would be the third week in June; that no action could be taken until that time.

RE: Dr. Joyce M. Williamson, graduate of the University of Edinburgh, M. B., 1958, appeared applying for special limited license to Charlotte Memorial Hospital where she is an assistant resident in Internal Medicine. Dr. Williamson is on an immigration visa, which she presented.

Dr. Combs: Do you plan to remain in the United States?

A. Yes

Q. Will you practice in North Carolina?

A. I may.

VERDICT: Dr. Joyce M. Williamson was approved for special limited license to Charlotte Memorial Hospital on an annual basis.

RE: Dr. Maria G. Perez-Reyes, graduate of the National University of Mexico in 1952, appeared January 8th, 1960 with incomplete credentials, applying for special limited license to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine, where she is an interne in Pediatrics. Her credentials are now in order.

VERDICT: Dr. Maria G. Perez-Reyes was approved for ^{special limited} license to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine, on an annual basis.

SPECIAL LIMITED LICENSE - RESIDENT

RE: Dr. Bernard Spiegel, graduate of Boston University School of Medicine, appeared applying for special limited license to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Obstetrics-Gynecology, for which he was approved on annual basis.

SPECIAL LIMITED LICENSE- FOREIGN GRADUATES - STAFF STATE INSTITUTION

RE: Dr. Serhif Sochocky, graduate of the University of Lwow, Poland, M. D., 1935, appeared applying for special limited license to the State Sanatoria to cover him as a staff physician. He presented his immigration visa. The photograph on his passport compared favorably. Dr. Sochocky was approved for special limited license on an annual basis.

Dr. Sochocky also petitioned for the privilege of taking the written examination for 1960 and presented his certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates as of September, 1959.

Dr. Combs: If you pass the examination do you think you will stay at the Sanatorium?

A. Yes

Q. You do not think you would go into private practice?

A. I desire to stay.

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever had any difficulty with a board of licensure or the Narcotics Bureau? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with drugs, narcotic or hypnotics or alcohol? A. No sir

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Dr. Combs: If you are given the privilege of taking the examination, your license would be limited to the Sanatorium System until citizenship obtained. We give you six years to get citizenship. If you were transferred, we would change the geographical limitation.

VERDICT: Dr. Serhif Sochocky was approved to take the written examination in June, 1960 and if he passes the same, to be limited to the State Sanatorium System until citizenship obtained, within six years.

RE: Dr. Kenneth M. Clark, graduate of the University of Geneva in 1958 and a citizen of the United States, appeared applying for the privilege of taking the written examination for licensure. He has received the certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates. He stated that he would seek employment at one of the State Hospitals, either in Raleigh or at Butner. Dr. Combs: Where were you born?

A. Albemarle, North Carolina.

Q. Why did you go abroad to take your medical education?

A. At the time it was difficult to get in, so I went to Mexico. I plan to take additional work in general practice residency.

Dr. Thurston: Where do you plan to practice?

A. I am interested in the Piedmont area in a rural practice.

Dr. Anderson: Have you been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you had any difficulty with a board of licensure? A. No sir
He presented the certificate of the ECFMG.

VERDICT: Dr. James Edward Cranford was approved for the written examination.

RE: Dr. Ramon B. Jenkins, graduate of the University of Cambridge, M. B., 1954, appeared petitioning for the privilege of taking the written examination for license. He presented the certificate of the ECFMG. He is a resident in Neurology at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine.

Dr. Anderson: Where were you born?

A. Wales

Q. You want to take our examination in June?

A. I wonder if there were a later date?

Q. It is given once a year.

A. Then I would like to take it this June.

Q. How long will you be in training?

A. It will last another year. I would like to stay here very much and wondered about citizenship. I was wondering about a full license without waiting five years.

Q. You do not plan to stay at the University?

Dr. Anderson: Do you want to practice in Raleigh?

A. Yes sir

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with narcotic or hypnotic drugs or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any trouble with the Narcotic Bureau or any licensing board? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Paul Vlaanderen was approved for the written examination, to be limited until citizenship obtained, within six years.

VERDICT: RESOLVED that the license of the above listed physicians be reinstated.

RE: Dr. Franklin Bailey Wilkins, Whittier, California - Licensed to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina in 1937. The secretary presented information from the California Board of Medical Examiners that Dr. Wilkins' license to practice medicine in California was revoked as of April 27th, 1960; that the effectiveness of the order was stayed for a period of three years during which period respondent was placed on probation subject to certain conditions. The Board accepted the above as information.

Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that Dr. Franklin Bailey Wilkins be sent notice of registration and if he does not comply with the law, that the usual procedure be followed. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. J. J. Combs and passed unanimously.

The Minutes were approved.

RE: Dr. Preston Calvin Stringfield, Jr., Rutherfordton, North Carolina was requested to appear before the Board at this time due to the fact that he voluntarily surrendered his narcotic tax stamp in december, 1959. A report was received by officers of the county medical society that he was writing an excessive amount of narcotic prescriptions, at which time said officers confronted Dr. Stringfield with this. Dr. Stringfield denied narcotic addiction. The secretary presented report of the State Bureau of Investigation under date of February 1st, 1960.

(See file for complete interview with Dr. Stringfield.) He gave a long history of illness, had a thyroidectomy and duodenal ulcer, for which he has been hospitalized. He also gave a long history of domestic difficulties and illness of his wife and mother, at which time he prescribed narcotics for them. Dr. Stringfield stated that he and his wife are now separated; that he is convalescing at the home of his parents. He said that he planned to get a position in an institution and that his uncle is helping him.

The Board wished Dr. Stringfield success and commended him on his plan to get institutional work.

RE: Dr. Evan Charles Fowler was granted special limited license to the State Hospitals January 18th, 1956, due to the fact that he was unable to receive license by endorsement from the Missouri Board of Medical Examiners as his grade on Anatomy did not meet the requirements. Dr. Fowler has appeared at this time with regard to being allowed to take the examination on Anatomy in order to become eligible for the full license.

VERDICT: Dr. Evan Charles Fowler was approved to take the written examination on Anatomy in order to be eligible for license by endorsement.



RE: Dr. W. Percy Carter, colored, Gastonia, North Carolina
 Dr. Carter was convicted of criminal abortion in the Gaston County Superior Court in July, 1957. He voluntarily surrendered his license, number 1965, to practice medicine in North Carolina on September 7th, 1957, and the same was revoked by the Board in session October 10th, 1957.

Dr. Carter appeared at this time, with his attorney, Donald E. Ramseur of Gastonia, to petition for reinstatement of his license to practice medicine. The original judgment against Dr. Carter sentenced him to from one to two years in prison, suspended on payment of a fine and that he remain of good behavior and violate none of the criminal laws of this or any other state; that he refrain from practicing or attempting to practice medicine in this state or any other state.

On December 23rd, 1959, in the Superior Court of Gaston County, following petition of Dr. W. Percy Carter the following order was made by the resident judge:

"It is, therefore, ordered that certain judgment entered at the July, 1957 Term of the Superior Court of Gaston County, North Carolina, be modified to the extent that that portion which prohibits the defendant from practicing medicine be stricken therefrom."

VERDICT: The secretary was directed to consult with Judge J. Frank Huskins, who presided at the trial of this case and consider the appeal of Dr. W. Percy Carter at the June, 1960 meeting.

RE: Dr. John Dillard Workman, who is now employed as director of the Lenoir County Health Department, appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Thurston: What postgraduate work have you taken?

A. I have a Master's Degree in Public Health from the University of North Carolina School of Medicine and postgraduate in Anesthesia from Cook County.

Dr. Doffermyre: You were not of the opinion that you could stay in public health in North Carolina without license, were you?

A. I understood from Dr. Higgins that we made application after coming for license, otherwise, I would not have come.

Q. Have you attended medical society meetings in Kinston?

A. I have.

Q. Have you been proposed for membership?

A. I have. It is in abeyance until I am licensed.

Dr. Anderson: What society did you belong to in Florida?

A. Suwanee County. Society is not functioning now.

Q. Did you belong in Lake Worth?

A. Yes. All the doctors I knew down there have died and they are all young ones.

Dr. Doffermyre: Could you get letters of recommendation which date back 15-20 years?

A. I think that would be very easy.

Dr. Doffermyre: You might start immediately to expedite the fulfillment to the extent which it will be possible. I feel that the Board will want to have this completed by the next meeting, which will be by the 20th of June.

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with narcotics, hypnotics or alcohol? A. No

Q. Have you had any trouble with the Narcotic Bureau or a licensing board? A. None at all.

Dr. John Dillard Workman's credentials to be considered at the June, 1960 meeting.

RE: Dr. Harold Preston Burbage, who is now employed as the director of the Health Department of Granville County, appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

The secretary presented letter under date of April 14th, 1960 from the Deputy Commissioner of Narcotics, Washington, D. C., reporting that Dr. Burbage was investigated in 1938, where he was practicing in Charleston, South Carolina, relative to apparent excessive purchases of narcotic drugs by means of his Government order forms, at which time he denied being addicted to narcotics. That he closed his office there about January 1st, 1939, and his location was unknown until the early part of 1940, when it was learned that he was undergoing treatment for narcotic addiction at the United States Public Health Service Hospital, Lexington, Kentucky. An investigation was made in January, 1949, of prescriptions for large quantities of dolophine obtained from the pharmacy of the South Carolina State Hospital by Dr. Burbage, where he was employed as a member of the staff since 1945. The hospital records did not show that all of the narcotics thus prescribed were used by the hospital patients. Dr. Burbage denied being addicted to narcotics. He surrendered his narcotic special tax stamp and agreed not to re-register for a period of two years.

Dr. Anderson: You are in Oxford now?

A. Yes

Q. How long?

A. Since March 1st

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with the taking of narcotics or hypnotics?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with alcohol?

A. None whatsoever.

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with a licensing board?

A. No sir

Dr. Anderson: Were you in Charleston, South Carolina?

A. Yes

Q. Did you do private practice there?

A. That is correct.

Q. Did the Narcotic Bureau investigate you there?

A. Not that I know of.

Q. Is there another H. P. Burbage in Charleston, South Carolina?

A. Not that I know of?

Q. You do not remember an agent of the Bureau of Narcotics in 1938 in Charleston, South Carolina

A. 1938, no sir, I do not.

Q. You never did take any narcotics or hypnotic drugs?

A. No sir

Q. Were you on the staff of the South Carolina State Hospital in 1945?

A. Yes sir

Q. Were you there in 1949?

A. No sir

Q. When were you on the South Carolina Hospital staff?

A. 1945-1948. In 1949 I was in Mississippi.

Dr. Combs: What year were you born?

A. September 3rd, 1899

Q. Have you ever been in an institution for treatment?

A. No sir

Q. You have never been in Lexington, Kentucky Public Health Service Hospital?

A. No sir

Q. And you are H. Preston Burbage, born September 3rd, 1899, and graduated by the Medical College of South Carolina in 1925?

A. Yes

Q. You left the State Hospital when?

A. 1948

Q. Where were you from 1938 to 1940?

A. I do not know, sir. It has been along time.

Q. When did you give up private practice in Charleston?

A. 1938-1939.

Q. Where did you go from there?

A. I think that I went to work for the Government for a while in New Mexico, British Columbia and Alaska.



Dr. Harold Preston Burbage continued

Dr. Anderson: In what capacity?

A. As a contract doctor.

Q. Was that public health?

A. With the Army, general medicine.

Q. When did you give up that contract?

A. July, 1945.

Q. That is when you went with the South Carolina Hospital and stayed until 1949?

A. 1948

Q. When you went where?

A. Mississippi until 1959. I went to Louisiana for three months. My wife said it was too far away from home. In the meantime I had correspondence with Dr. Higgins and I came here.

Q. Do ^{you} have a narcotic license?

A. No sir

Q. Did you ever have one?

A. Yes sir

Q. When did you surrender that license?

A. I think when I left the State Hospital.

Q. What year?

A. 1948

Q. Why did you surrender it?

A. I gave it up. I had no use for it any further.

Dr. Thurston: Did you agree not to apply for reinstatement of it for a period of years?

A. No sir

Q. You talked to an agent at that time?

A. I just gave it to him.

Q. That employment in New Mexico, British and Alaska, where did you apply for that job?

A. Civil Service in Washington.

Dr. Anderson: We have unfavorable information to the effect that you were investigated by the Bureau of Narcotics September 21st, 1938 and you could not show sufficient evidence to justify the use of your narcotic drugs.

A. I have no idea of that, sir.

Q. And we have further information that you did discontinue practice on or about 1938-1939 in Charleston, South Carolina, and that your location was unknown at that time until January, 1940, or the early part of 1940, when it was found you were in Lexington in the USPHS Hospital for the treatment of narcotic addiction. And further that you did agree to surrender your license and you surrendered your license, narcotic stamp, and agreed not to reregister under the Federal Narcotic Laws for a period of two years because of your addiction.

A. That was in 1938?

A. That was in 1949.



Dr. Harold Preston Burbage continued

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been a patient in the United States Public Health Service Hospital in Lexington?

A. No sir

Dr. Thurston: Did you go there voluntarily?

A. No, I was not there.

Dr. Raspberry: You never worked there?

A. No

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been there?

A. I have visited there. I have some friends who live in Lexington and we visited the hospital. They moved there three or four years ago.

Q. You went through as a visitor?

A. Yes

Dr. Thurston : Do you know anybody who would use your name?

A. No, I do not know why they would do that.

Q. Have you ever had amnesia?

A. No

Dr. Anderson: Have you ever had psychiatric treatment?

A. No

Dr. Baker: Do you have any infirmities?

A. None except I broke my neck when I was 18 years old.

Dr. Anderson: Does that bother you still?

A. No

Dr. Doffermyre: I feel since you say this is not true, before we could consider action, it would be necessary to reaffirm the information.

Dr. Anderson: We will let you hear.

Dr. Tyner: When you surrendered your narcotic stamp, did you turn in the narcotics on hand?

A. I did not have any on hand.

Dr. Anderson: Did you have a narcotic book?

A. No

Q. What had you done with it?

A. I had not had one in many years.

Dr. Thurston: What was the agent's name?

A. Tommy Gerard

Q. How did you happen to turn it over to him?

A. He came through from Atlanta.

Q. Did he come by to see you?

A. I saw him in the hospital and I told him I wanted to get rid of it.

The secretary was instructed to obtain further information from the Bureau of Narcotics.

Dr. Harold Preston Burbage continued

Dr. T. W. Baker moved that Dr. J. W. R. Norton, Secretary of the State Board of Health, be informed of the Board's experience with Dr. Burbage and that on the basis of this experience that the State Board of Health be urged not to allow future health officers to assume duties until the requirements for licensure in North Carolina had been met. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned.

Monday, May 9th

RE: Dr. W. C. Perry, Louisburg, North Carolina - The secretary presented a report from the Narcotic Bureau that it was noted Dr. Perry was making apparently excessive purchases of narcotic drugs by means of his order forms; that an inquiry was addressed to him as to the disposition of the drugs. On January 25th, 1960, following receipt of the letter, Dr. Perry's attorney surrendered his narcotic stamp and agreed not to reregister for a period of three years. He had admitted to his attorney that he had personally used most of the narcotics which he had purchased. On January 24th, 1960 he entered Westbrook Sanatorium for treatment of his narcotic addiction and was still under treatment as of February 22nd, 1960.

VERDICT: The secretary was instructed to request Dr. W. C. Perry to appear before the board for an interview at the June, 1960 meeting.

RE: Dr. Louis D. Hayman, Jr., Jacksonville, North Carolina - (See previous Minutes) - On a routine follow-up the following is letter received from Dr. Cornelius Lansing, Instructor in Psychiatry, University of North Carolina School of Medicine, April 15th, 1960:

"In reply to your recent letter of inquiry concerning Dr. Hayman, I am glad to report that he is doing very well, to the best of my knowledge.

"During 1959 I saw him about once a month, and on October 21, 1959, it was decided by mutual agreement to terminate regular formal therapy, leaving it that he should feel free to write for an appointment at intervals of several months, if he should wish to discuss something with me. Subsequent appointments have been made strictly at his request, one in February, and one for the latter part of this current month.

"Thus, although I maintain marginal contact with him, he has not been "under my care" since October, 1959. I feel that the gains he has made in alteration of attitudes and personality, make his prognosis good. It is possible that under serious stress he might break down in some way, (but then any person will break down if sufficient stress is applied.)

"In my opinion, the strength he has gained makes such an eventuality no more likely than it would be in a person randomly selected from an average group of similar station in life.

RE: Dr. Louis D. Hayman, Jr. continued

VERDICT: The Board received the above as information and instructed the secretary to get a report on Dr. Louis D. Hayman, Jr. in one year.

RE: Dr. David Reiner, Veterans Administration Hospital, Swannanoa, North Carolina, appeared before the Board May 4th, 1959 applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He was approved for license contingent upon locating in the state for the practice of medicine, within one year.

On April 11th, 1960 Dr. Reiner advised that he had no immediate plans for locating for the practice of anesthesiology in the state, but expected to do so when a suitable location presented itself. He asked for an extension of time.

VERDICT: Dr. David Reiner was granted an extension of time of one year in which to locate in the state for the practice of medicine.

RE: Dr. Marjorie A. Crews, Jackson Heights, Long Island, New York, appeared on January 17th, 1959, with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. Dr. Crews has never completed her credentials nor communicated further with the secretary's office. On November 11th, 1959 a letter was addressed to her inquiring as to her plans for North Carolina, to which no reply was received.

VERDICT: Dr. E. A. Raspberry, Jr. moved that fee for license by endorsement, less 50%, be forwarded to Dr. Marjorie A. Crews. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Written Examination Schedule - The secretary presented letters from students at Duke University School of Medicine asking if some dispensation could be granted those who wished to take both the North Carolina and Florida State Board examinations, which are given at the same time; namely, that they be allowed to begin the North Carolina examinations late.

VERDICT: The Board ruled that it could make no exceptions to the examination schedule.

RE: Written Examination - Grades - Dr. J. J. Combs moved that the grades be in the secretary's office not later than July 13th. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: October, 1960 Meeting - The Board elected to hold this meeting at Elizabeth City and Nags Head October 6-8th, 1960.

RE: January, 1961 Meeting - The Board elected to hold its meeting at the Mid Pines Club, Southern Pines, January 19-22nd, 1961.

RE: One Hundred Year History of the Board of Medical Examiners - The Board directed that the type be stored at Edwards and Broughton for one year and that a charge of \$5.00 be made per copy.

The meeting was adjourned.



Tuesday, May 10th
10 A. M.

RE: Dr. Wiley Royster Young, Angier, North Carolina - Dr. Young appeared at the January, 1960 meeting of the Board to petition for the reinstatement of his license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina. At that time the Board directed that a special investigation be made of Dr. Young and report made at this time.

The secretary presented report on the special investigation of Dr. Wiley Royster Young, which did not indicate that his license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina should be reinstated at this time.



RE: Dr. George W. Melchior - The secretary was instructed by the Board to request a report from Dr. M. M. Vitols, Superintendent of the Cherry Hospital, as to a recent report received and to be reviewed at the June, 1960 meeting of the Board.

The meeting was adjourned.
