

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS
OF NORTH CAROLINA

Virginia Dare Hotel, Elizabeth City, North Carolina and
The Carolinian, Nags Head, North Carolina

October 8-10th, 1959

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The Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina met October 8-10th, 1959 for the purpose of certify the grades of the special written examination held September 28-October 1st, 1959, to interview applicants for licensure by endorsement of credentials and for special limited license, and for other business.

Thursday, October 8th
8:30 A. M.

The Board convened at the Virginia Dare Hotel, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, for dinner at 7 P. M. Drs. Thomas W. Baker, President, J. J. Combs, Secretary-Treasurer, J. B. Anderson, L. R. Doffermyre, E. A. Raspberry, Jr., Carl V. Tyner, and Mrs. Louise J. McNeill, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, were present. Dr. Thomas G. Thurston was absent.

Credentials for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license were reviewed by the members of the Board.

RE: Dr. Lelia May Lyon-Thomas - The secretary reported that information was received in 1947 that Dr. Lyon-Thomas plead guilty in the United States District Court in Detroit, Michigan to violation of the Federal Narcotic Law and was placed on probation for a period of five years. That since she was out of the state the Board of Medical Examiners took no action with regard to her medical license at that time.

The secretary also reported that Dr. Lyon-Thomas has now registered her medical license in this state.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that if Dr. Lelia May Lyon-Thomas returns to North Carolina that she not be approved for narcotic license until she has appeared before the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners for an interview. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. J. J. Combs and passed unanimously.

RE: One Hundred Year History of the Board of Medical Examiners - The secretary presented a letter from Dr. Ivan Procter, who is writing the History of the Board, giving an estimate for printing of the history by Edwards and Broughton Company of Raleigh, together with his recommendation of the same.

VERDICT: Dr. Anderson moved that the Board approve the previous appointment of Dr. Ivan Procter to carry out the project to publish the history of the Board according to his proposal to the Board of Medical Examiners. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.



RE: One Hundred Year History (continued)

Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that the president of the Board reply to Dr. Ivan Procter's letter and offer the congratulations and appreciation of the Board for the work he has done and carry out the wishes of the Board to invite him to the January, 1960 meeting. That the Board request that Dr. Ivan Procter's picture as editor be put on the fly leaf of the history with a foreword of appreciation to be written by the secretary of the Board. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Samuel A. Pope, Beulaville, North Carolina - The secretary presented report of the State Bureau of Investigation of September 17th, 1959, that Dr. Pope had been indicted by the Grand Jury in Duplin County for criminal abortion; that investigation is pending trial at the October Term of Duplin County Superior Court.

VERDICT: Dr. Carl V. Tyner moved that in light of the charge, the action to be taken be left to the officers of the Board. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. George Frankl appeared with incomplete credentials before the Board of Medical Examiners at the July, 1959 meeting of the Board applying for license by endorsement of credentials. His application was approved contingent upon completion of credentials satisfactory to the secretary and upon his accepting the position with the Child Guidance Clinic of Forsyth County. He was instructed to apply for endorsement from the State of Missouri.

The secretary reported that Dr. Frankl had furnished credentials but that one grade by the Missouri Board did not meet the requirements of this Board, but that his grades had been obtained from the New York Board, where he was licensed by examination, which did meet the requirements. The secretary also reported that Dr. Frankl had accepted the position with the Child Guidance Clinic of Forsyth County.

VERDICT: Dr. E. A. Rasberry, Jr. moved that Dr. George Frankl be approved for license by endorsement of credentials on the basis of written examination from the New York Board of Medical Examiners. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. J. J. Combs and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Arthur K. Husband - The secretary advised that he was granted limited license to Bowman Bray School of Medicine October 18th, 1951; that he is now applying for conversion of limited to full license in order that he might locate in Hendersonville, North Carolina, for the practice of pediatrics; that he has met the requirements of the Board.

VERDICT: Dr. J. J. Combs moved that Dr. Arthur K. Husband's limited license be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Wiley Royster Young, Angier, North Carolina - The secretary advised that Dr. Young had requested an appointment to appear and petition for reinstatement of his medical license, which was revoked October 10th, 1957.

VERDICT: Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that the secretary give Dr. Wiley Royster Young an appointment to appear before the Board. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.



RE: American Medical Association Committee Meeting - The secretary stated that he had been invited by the Medical Disciplinary Committee of the American Medical Association to meet with it in Atlanta November 16th, for which expenses would be met by the American Medical Association. The secretary stated that in his opinion it would be beneficial on behalf of the Board and the Federation of State Medical Boards for him to attend.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that the secretary represent the Board at the committee meeting of the American Medical Association because in his opinion it would be beneficial to the Board and to the Federation of State Medical Boards. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned.

Friday, October 9th

Applicants for license by endorsement of credentials as follows were interviewed, with all members present:

RE: Dr. Edith Hutto appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where she is a resident in Dermatology.

Dr. Combs: Have you been in practice?
A. No, I have not.

Dr. Baker: You have never been convicted of a crime? A. No sir
Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a licensing board or the Narcotic Bureau? A. No
Q. You have never used narcotics? A. No

Verdict; Dr. Edith Hutto was approved for license by endorsement of credentials limited to Duke University School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. Morris A. Lipton appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is certified by the American Board of Psychiatry and the American Board of Internal Medicine, and has had many responsible university positions, with many publications. He is going to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine.

Dr. Baker: Which of the boards did you take first?
A. I took a combined residency.

Q. You are going into Psychiatry?
A. No, I will be doing primarily research in Biochemistry and Psychiatry.

Dr. Anderson: You have accepted a position at the University of North Carolina?
A. Yes

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No
Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a licensing board or the Bureau of Narcotics? A. No
Q. Have you ever taken narcotics yourself? A. No



Dr. Morris A. Lipton continued

VERDICT: Dr. Morris A. Lipton was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactorily to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Barbara Steiner Lipton appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. She is a naturalized citizen and presented naturalization certificate #5243771. She is certified by the American Board of Psychiatrists.

Dr. Baker: Have you accepted a position?

A. I have been offered an assistant professorship in Psychiatry, which I have accepted on a part time basis, as soon as we are settled. We have two children. I will accept it and hope to work myself into a larger basis.

- Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau or a licensing board? A. No
- Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Barbara Steiner Lipton was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Virgil Croom Norris appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to the Good Samaritan Hospital, where he is a resident.

- Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime. A. No sir
- Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No sir
- Q. Have you ever used narcotics to excess for yourself? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Virgil Croom Norris was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Good Samaritan Hospital.

RE: Dr. William Charles North appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He has accepted a position as assistant professor of Anesthesiology at Duke University School of Medicine. He stated that he was born in China of American parents.

- Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No
- Q. Have you had any difficulty with any licensing board or the Bureau of Narcotics? A. No
- Q. Have you ever used narcotics to excess yourself? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. William Charles North was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Thomas Garrison Durham appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Durham: I am interning in Greenville, South Carolina. I plan to go to Kings Mountain January 1st, 1960, and I will be associated with Dr. Hendricks. I will complete the internship in December.

- Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No
- Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No
- Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself? A. No

Dr. Combs: Have you made arrangements to go to Kings Mountain?
A. I moved my wife there yesterday.

VERDICT: Dr. Thomas Garrison Durham was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.



RE: Dr. Augustus Hunter Foster, Jr. appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Doffermyre: You are going to Elizabethtown with Dr. Albert Pumphrey?
A. Yes sir

Q. You are going to do general surgery?
A. Yes

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No
Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or the Narcotic Bureau? A. None at all
Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Augustus Hunter Foster, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. James Turner Googe appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he is going with the State Board of Health and is located at Boone.

Dr. Doffermyre: How long have you been in public health?
A. Since 1926

Dr. Combs: How long was your medical course at the Memphis Hospital Medical College?

A. Four years. It was all at the Memphis Hospital Medical College. The University of Tennessee was formed by merging with Memphis Hospital Medical College and two other schools. I am considered a University of Tennessee alumnus and have a diploma from the University of Tennessee.

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No
Q. Have you had any difficulty with any licensing board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No
Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. James Turner Googe was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Ernest Archie Perry of Clover, south Carolina appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Gaston County, North Carolina, to do border practice, and to be able to obtain hospital privileges in Gastonia.

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir
Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau or a licensing board? A. No sir
Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself? A. No sir

Verdict; Dr. Ernest Archie Perry was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Gaston County, North Carolina.

RE: Dr. Henry W. Poore of Virgilina, Virginia, came in applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he lived in a border town and desired full license; that he was at present obligated to the State of Virginia to practice there for a period of three years; that it was eventually his intention to move into North Carolina.

Dr. Anderson: How long have you been practicing?
A. Three months. I have two years and nine months to practice in Virginia.



Dr. Henry W. Poore continued

Dr. Baker: Are you planning to live in Virginia two years and nine months before moving to North Carolina?

A. Yes sir

Q. We can not give you a full license until you move to North Carolina.

A. That is what I wanted to find out.

Q. What counties will you practice in?

A. Person and Granville

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you used narcotics yourself, A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Henry W. Poore was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Person and Granville Counties, North Carolina.

RE: Dr. Hugo Casiner Pribor appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he was with the United States Public Health Service, running a research laboratory and an instructor of Pathology at Bowman Gray.

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No, I have not.

Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No, I have not.

Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself? A. No, I have not.

VERDICT: Dr. Hugh Casiner Pribor was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary.

RE: Dr. John Crayton Pruitt appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Surgery.

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. John Crayton Pruitt was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. Bernard Leslie Richards appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials and stated that he had located in Mocksville for general practice.

Dr. Doffermyre: Have you practiced?

A. I did locum tenens in California for five weeks.

Q. Are you to be associated with anyone in Mocksville?

A. No

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No



Dr. Bernard Leslie Richards continued

Dr. Baker: Have you had any difficulty with a licensing board or Bureau of Narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you used narcotics yourself? A. No

Dr. Anderson: Are you ready to start practice now?

A. That is right.

VERDICT: Dr. Bernard Leslie Richards was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Robert Eugene Sandy appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is a certified radiologist.

Dr. Anderson: Where are you going to practice?

A. Washington

Dr. Raspberry: Where have you been previously?

A. Brownsville, Pennsylvania

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you had any difficulty with the Bureau of Narcotics or a licensing board? A. No sir

Q. You have never used narcotics yourself? A. No sir

Dr. Anderson: When are you going to Washington?

A. The middle of December.

VERDICT: Dr. Robert Eugene Sandy was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are approved satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Claude Earl Steen, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he was a missionary in Ethiopia for 12½ years.

Dr. Anderson: You are planning to do general practice with Drs. Waller and Sommerville?

A. They are not practicing together at present but are planning to erect a building, which will house four doctors, of which I will be one.

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. I have not.

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any licensing board or the Narcotic Bureau? A. I have not.

Q. Have you used narcotics for yourself? A. Not a bit.

Q. When do you wish to start practicing?

A. I am going to Chicago for three weeks to do post work and should like to start after that.

VERDICT: Dr. Claude Earl Steen, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. David James Stump appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He has accepted the position of assistant pathologist at Rex Hospital.

Dr. Baker: You are transferring to Rex from where?

A. I was in Boston.

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. I have not

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with a licensing board or Narcotic Bureau? A. No sir



Dr. David James Stump continued

Dr. Baker: Have you ever used narcotics for yourself? A. I never have.

Dr. Anderson: What have you been doing since 1936 to the present?

A. First a residency in Pathology; worked in Research Hospital in Kansas City as assistant Pathologist; Army until 1946; locum tenens at Fort Worth, Texas; assistant professor at Columbia University, fellow three months, assistant professor 15 months; California three years, Santa Claire County Hospital pathologist; returned to Columbia University; pathologist Chattanooga Memorial Hospital; England one year at Oxford.

VERDICT: Dr. David James Stump was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Eugene Archibald Thomason, resident in Anesthesiology at Duke University School of Medicine, appeared July 24th, 1959, with incomplete credentials, applying for license by endorsement of credentials. The secretary reported that following this appearance information was received from the Bureau of Narcotics that Dr. Thomason had been in difficulty by taking narcotics; that he had obtained treatment at the United States Public Health Service, Lexington, Kentucky, for four and one-half months in 1957-1958. That upon receipt of this information Dr. Thomason had been requested to make another appearance before the Board. That the secretary of the South Carolina Board had called by telephone and reported that Dr. Thomason was before that Board in December, 1958, at which time he was placed on probation with the understanding that he would get out of general practice and take a residency in Anesthesiology; that it would be pleasing to the South Carolina Board if he were permitted to complete his training in Anesthesiology and the return to South Carolina.

Dr. Anderson: Where did you practice?

A. Fountain Inn, South Carolina

Q. He is a resident in Anesthesiology, beginning May of this year.

Dr. Baker: For how long?

A. Two years

Dr. Anderson: You wish license to carry on residency?

A. Yes

Dr. Baker: Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with a licensing board?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever used narcotics for yourself? A. No sir

Q. Do you feel that you have told this board the full story as regards narcotics?

A. Specifically the answers to the questions were correct.

Q. I asked if you have had any difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau, with a licensing board or if you have used narcotics yourself. Your reply was "no".

A. My difficulty with the Narcotic Bureau, the man came to see me one time and asked if I could account for the last order I had written on my narcotic book. I told him I could not. It was difficulty I guess. I voluntarily gave up my license.



Dr. Eugene Archibald Thomason continued

Dr. Baker: Your narcotic license?

A. Yes, I voluntarily gave it up at that time. As far as the Board, I talked to them, they talked to me.

Q. Did you make a formal appearance?

A. Yes sir. I talked to them. Dr. Wilkerson who is on the Board has always been a close friend of mine. I talked to him before. They talked to me two or three minutes and that was it.

Q. Have you ever used narcotics yourself?

A. I have in sickness, but not as far as being an addict or using it over a period of time.

Q. What do you mean by sickness?

A. For the past three or four years on two or three occasions I have had a staphylococcus infection on my right leg. I used narcotics about a week.

Q. How much during that week?

A. The last time I was hospitalized and was given it in the hospital, on the records. When I used it I used methadon.

Q. Gave it to yourself?

A. Gave it orally.

Q. Have you ever been admitted to the hospital for narcotics?

A. No sir

Dr. Tyner: Why was it necessary for you to surrender your narcotic license?

A. He asked me if I could account for my last order. I had gotten it and used a good bit. He asked me to check out my records. I had practiced 10 years and had not kept a record.

Dr. Baker: Is Dr. Stephen at Duke aware of any difficulty you have had with narcotics?

A. I think he is. I have not specifically myself talked to him.

Q. What leads you to think he may know?

A. I am sure he may know because some of the people who recommended me have discussed it with him.

Dr. Combs: As a result of your appearance before the South Carolina Board in December, did that have any effect on your changing your practice?

A. No sir

Q. Did the South Carolina Board put you on probation?

A. I really do not remember. I practiced after that.

Q. Was there some understanding you were going to give up general practice in South Carolina?

A. No sir

Dr. Combs: You have not been to any hospital for drug addiction?

A. No sir

Q. You have never been at the United States Public Service Hospital as a patient?



Dr. Eugene Archibald Thomason continued

Dr. Raspberry: How have you been getting along at Duke with your residency?

A. Fine. I enjoy it and think it is the thing for me to do. I think the work has been very satisfactory.

Dr. Baker: Did you tell Mr. Wyatt, the drug inspector, that you had been admitted to the Lexington Hospital for narcotic addiction?

A. Yes, I did. I thought about that when I went outside. I guess it is a matter of shame for me to say anything.

Q. Will you tell us about that?

A. Yes sir. For a period of time 1957 I had a lot of difficulty in my partnership, which had been going on, started in 1949, and a family marital difficulty and I was having recurrences of rheumatic fever. I did take some at that time, some methadon, the only drug I ever took, most of it I took orally, took it a week or two, go three weeks. My father and brother, who are physicians, said something to me about it. We talked about it and I told them I would do what they thought best and I would go voluntarily. At that time there was no pressure, no one knew it. The Board said nothing, no one knew it.

Dr. Baker: You were there how long?

A. 86-87 days.

Q. Do you feel like you were helped?

A. I feel like I was helped by seeing people who were addicts, the life they lived, the point they had come to. As far as medical help, I was just kept there and that was it.

Q. Custodial care?

A. Yes

Dr. Anderson: After you were there, did you take narcotics again?

A. At the time I told you about.

Q. Did you or did you not tell the inspector that you took dilaudid?

A. I may have told him. I never liked dilaudid.

Q. Did you take dilaudid?

A. I may have. I can not say there is anything I have not taken.

Dr. Raspberry: Do you have a narcotic license?

A. No

Q. As an anesthesiologist, if you go to South Carolina, would you not need a narcotic license?

A. As of November of this year, it will be automatically or I can apply and it will be granted to me.

Dr. Combs: How do you know it will be granted?

A. The inspector told me.

Dr. Baker: Do you have another appearance before the South Carolina Board?

A. The South Carolina Board would have to go along with it I guess, but he did not say anything about it.



Dr. Eugene Archibald Thomason continued

- Dr. Baker: After you left Lexington did you revert to the use of narcotics?
- A. No except that period of time immediately before Mr. Wyatt came to see me that I told you about. A period of a few weeks off and on only when I had some infection.
- Q. You did and have used narcotics since Lexington Hospital dismissal and you/^{told}the inspector that?
- A. Yes sir
- Q. You told him you were presently addicted to dolophin in December, 1958?
- A. Yes
- Dr. Doffermyre: Have you taken anything at all, barbiturates or anything in any form, since you have been at Duke on a residency?
- A. No sir
- Q. Have you been sick since you have been at Duke?
- A. Yes sir. I had an infection and drainage, staphlacoccus. It has been recurrent on this one leg. My foot now is swollen.
- Q. Have you been hospitalized?
- A. No
- Dr. Thurston: Did you give yourself injections on that leg?
- A. No sir.
I have never taken barbiturates. The only thing I take is millpath.
- Dr. Doffermyre: When you give anesthetics who is responsible for the hypo?
- A. We are not responsible for narcotics at all, we do not order.
- Dr. Tyner: Is your family with you?
- A. Yes sir, we moved, wife and two children.
- Dr. Thurston: You resolved your family difficulties?
- A. Yes sir
- Dr. Combs: Your residency will be completed as of what date?
- A. May 1st, 1961.
- Dr. Thurston: Can you remember any more about Dr. Stephens? You do not remember any direct talk with him?
- A. Specifically, no sir. I was out 10 days with the leg and he was there two or three times a day and offered to give me some medicine for pain. I told him I did not need it.

VERDICT: Dr. J. E. Anderson moved that in regard to Dr. Eugene Archibald Thomason, the president ask the secretary to handle with Dr. C. R. Stephens, Professor of Anesthesiology, to straighten out to the satisfaction of this Board. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Thurston and passed unanimously.

Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that if the secretary feels that this is worked out to the satisfaction of the Board that he be given the authority to grant limited license to Duke Hospital to Dr. Eugene



Dr. Eugene Archibald Thomason continued

Archibald Thomason. That he should be seen at intervals. That he be advised that the limited license would not be extended to full license in North Carolina. That he be instructed not to apply for narcotic license. That he be put on probation. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. E. A. Rasberry, Jr. and passed unanimously. (License limited to Duke University School of Medicine was issued)

RE: Dr. James Donald Vaughn appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he planned to be associated with Dr. Alan R. Brown of Waynesville in Radiology.

Dr. Anderson: Will you be located in the town of Waynesville?

A. Yes, we will be associated at the Haywood County Hospital.

Q. And the new clinic?

A. Yes sir. He bought the equipment for the clinic in Canton and he has the hospital in Sylva.

Q. You will do radiology at the clinic?

A. Yes

Dr. Doffermyre: Gentlemen, this special limited license actually is a permit to continue training in the bounds of North Carolina. It does not imply that it can be converted to a full license, permitting you to carry on the regular practice of medicine within the state, until there have been further examinations. We have no endorsement relations with the National Board of Medical Examiners. The first part of the Nebraska Board can not be endorsed. You will be issued the special permit to continue training. It does not permit you to apply for narcotic stamp. Therefore, it will not be permitted for you to prescribe or dispense narcotic drugs. It does not limit you within training, except you can not prescribe narcotics.

Upon motion and being duly seconded, it was resolved that the licenses of the above physicians be reinstated.

RE: Dr. Warren D. Carter, Wadesboro, North Carolina - State Bureau of Investigation report of June 2nd, 1959, revealed that Dr. Carter had been prescribing excessive amounts of narcotics for D. E. Chewning of Lilesville, North Carolina for about four years.

Dr. Carter was requested to appear before the Board at its July, 1959 meeting but due to a previous committment, the president had extended the date of the interview to this meeting.

Dr. Carter appeared and related that Dr. Chewning was an addict when first seen by him some years previously, at which time he had sent him to a sanatorium, but that he returned to the use of narcotics. He said that the report of the State Bureau of Investigation was correct in the amount prescribed; that he charged him \$1.00 per prescription; that in his opinion he was not selling any of the drugs obtained. He also said that Mr. Chewning had diabetes, hypertension, vascular and coronary disease. That he had not treated him since the Board communicated with him in July, 1959. He presented a statement signed by Mr. Chewning to this effect. He said that he felt it was detrimental to Mr. Chewning to cut him off drugs; that though it might be legally wrong, he did not feel it was morally wrong.

VERDICT: Dr. J. J. Combs moved that Dr. Warren D. Carter be informed by the president that it had been the unpleasant duty of the Board to call him in, but that it was the legal responsibility of the Board. And whereas it might be morally right, it was illegal for him to prescribe drugs under the circumstances.

The above verdict was given to Dr. Carter by the president.

RE: Dr. Sami Solu, graduate of the University of Ankara, Turkey, and on the staff at the Eastern North Carolina Sanatorium, appeared and petitioned to allow him to take the written examination without repeating the examination of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates, which he had taken and received a temporary certificate. Dr. H. F. Eason wrote the Board a letter of recommendation on behalf of Dr. Solu.

VERDICT: Dr. L. R. Doffermyre moved that action be deferred. This motion was duly seconded ^{by Dr. E. A. Raspberry Jr.} and passed unanimously.

The Board convened at The Carolinian, Nags Head, North Carolina.

RE: Certification of Grades on Written Examination - The Board canvassed the grades of the written examination given September 28-October 1st, 1959. All applicants made a passing average of 75% or over, with the following exception, and the grades were certified:

Dr. Leon DeVale Robinson failed to make a passing average on Part II.

Dr. Leon DeVale Robinson's special limited license to Butner State Hospital was renewed to September 1st, 1960.

RE: Dr. J. W. Straughan (See previous Minutes) - Dr. Doffermyre advised with regard to his routine investigation that he had gone to Warsaw and found that Dr. Straughan was in the hospital as a result of thrombo phlebitis in his arm; that he will make further investigation and recommended that his report be deferred to the January, 1960 meeting.

RE: Dr. John M. Gambill appeared before the Board at its July, 1959 meeting following adverse reports on him. The Board instructed Dr. Gambill to see Dr. George A. Silver within the next week or two and have Dr. Silver send a summary of his past hospitalization and present findings; that he was to see Dr. Silver at regular intervals.

On August 6th, 1959 the secretary reminded Dr. Gambill of the verdict of the Board and also asked him to advise if he had seen Dr. Silver or on what date he expected to see him, which letter went to Dr. Gambill by registered mail, return receipt requested, the receipt being signed by Dr. Gambill. No word has been received from Dr. Gambill, nor any report from Dr. Silver.

The Board directed that Dr. Gambill be present at the January, 1960 meeting.

RE: Dr. J. R. Medlin appeared in June, 1959 and reported that he had surrendered his narcotic stamp in April, 1959 (the same having been reinstated in September, 1958) due to the fact that he returned to the use of drugs. That since that time he had felt well and his practice was satisfactory. The secretary presented the following letter dated August 21st, 1959:

"Dear Dr. Combs:

"As you may have already learned, Dr. Jasper R. Medlin, Jr., Rural Hall, North Carolina, called at the narcotic office in Greensboro, North Carolina, on April 22, 1959 and surrendered his narcotic special tax stamp for cancellation. He agreed not to register under the Federal narcotic law for an indefinite period. He admitted that he had been using Demerol, but claimed he had discontinued such use. On July 2, 1959, he entered Tucker's Sanatorium in Richmond, Virginia, where he remained until July 23, 1959. During this period he participated in psychotherapy as administered by the doctors in that institution. Since the surrender of his narcotic stamp on April 22, 1959, he had obtained Demerol for his own use by issuing fictitious prescriptions."

VERDICT: Dr. Anderson moved that Dr. J. R. Medlin be subpoenaed to appear before the Board at its January, 1960 meeting to show cause why his license should not be revoked. This motion failed for the lack of a second.

VERDICT: Dr. J. J. Combs moved that Dr. J. R. Medlin be invited to appear before the Board for another interview, with the provision that he bring his brother with him, at the January, 1960, meeting. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. John S. Hooker - Dr. Thurston stated that he had attempted twice to see Dr. Hooker and had not been able to do so. That two druggists related he was in practically every day and as far as he could determine he was doing reasonably well; that he had not given a report from his psychiatrist.

VERDICT: Dr. T. G. Thurston moved that Dr. John S. Hooker be written and requested to appear at the January, 1960 meeting and bring a report from his psychiatrist. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James A. Brown - Dr. T. G. Thurston reported that Dr. Brown had considerable trouble, wrecked his car and domestic trouble and he was prevailed upon to go to Chapel Hill, where he saw a medical man and was persuaded to have psychiatric care; that he remained there one month; that the medical doctor reported to him they were convinced he was taking tranquilizers but did not find out if he were taking narcotics; that he is seeing his psychiatrist at regular intervals. He said he is back in practice, is not on the hospital staff, and it is said that he seems all right, more like himself.

VERDICT: Dr. T. G. Thurston moved that Dr. James A. Brown be requested to appear at the January, 1960 meeting, with a report from his psychiatrist. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. J. B. Anderson and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Ora Mabel Lomax-Fisher was convicted in the January, 1947 Superior Court of Rockingham County, North Carolina, for criminal abortion and the judgment of the court was that she pay the costs of the action and fine of \$2,000, and be imprisoned for a term of 10 years and that she surrender her license to practice medicine in the State of North Carolina. Prayer for judgment was continued on three counts during good behavior and that the defendant leave the State of North Carolina within 30 days and never return. Dr. Lomax-Fisher's medical license was forwarded to the office of the Board of Medical Examiners by the Clerk and the same is on file. On May 1st, 1947, Dr. Lomax-Fisher's medical license was revoked by the Board of Medical Examiners.

The secretary presented letter under date of October 1st, 1959 from Dr. Lomax-Fisher on the letterhead of the Community Hospital, Wilmington, North Carolina, asking if she were eligible for license and what fees would be necessary. The secretary reported that he reiterated in letter dated October 6th, 1959 the indictment, conviction and judgment rendered in the Superior Court of Rockingham County; that she was advised that if she were practicing medicine

in the state she was violating the Medical Practice act of North Carolina and also violating the judgment of the court by returning to this state. He also said that a copy of this letter was forwarded to the Director of the Community Hospital and the State Bureau of Investigation.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that the action taken in the matter of Dr. Ora Mabel Lomax-Fisher be approved. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. L. R. Doffermyre and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Sarah Evans, graduate of the University of London, has special limited license to cover her as a staff physician at the State Hospital at Morganton, which was granted January 19th, 1953.

RE: Dr. Robert J. Christiaens, graduate of the Free University of Brussels, has special limited license to cover him as a staff physician at the State Hospital at Butner, which was granted April 30th, 1956.

The secretary presented a letter from Dr. E. A. Hargrove, General Superintendent of Hospitals Board of Control, stating that these physicians will be eligible for retirement July 1st, 1961. He petitioned the Board to extend their special limited licenses to that date.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that the Board sympathizes with these cases but an agreement was made by the Hospitals Board of Control and the Board of Medical Examiners and it will be necessary that the above physicians comply with the agreement. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Carl V. Tyner and passed unanimously.

RE: Murphy Protestant Hospital, Murphy, North Carolina - The secretary reported that he had received a copy of announcement to the medical profession from the Murphy Protestant Hospital dated July 15th, 1959 from Dr. Charles O. Van Gorder, President of the Cherokee County Medical Society. That he advised Dr. Van Gorder that in his opinion the proposal of the Murphy Protestant Hospital in its announcement to the medical profession dated July 15th, 1959 was fee splitting, which was unethical. That it was his feeling that the proposition should be handled by the Committee on Grievances of the North Carolina Medical Society and/or the Third Party Intervention Committee; that if evidence of violation of the Medical Practice Act were found by either committee, the same should be presented to the Board of Medical Examiners.

VERDICT: Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that the above be received for information. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Sami Solu (See p. 85 these Minutes) VERDICT: Dr. E. A. Raspberry moved that Dr. Solu be allowed to take the written examination of this Board in June, without repeating the examination of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates. This motion failed for lack of a second.

Dr. J. B. Anderson moved that the Board comply with its regulation; that Dr. Sami Solu be required to obtain the certificate of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates before he be permitted to our written examination. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

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RE: Special Limited License - The following special limited licenses were renewed on an annual basis:


