Minutes of the Open Sessions of the North Carolina Medical Board Meeting August 15-16, 2007.

The August 15-16, 2007, meeting of the North Carolina Medical Board was held at the Board's Office, 1203 Front Street, Raleigh, NC 27609. ## **MISCELLANEOUS**

#### **Presidential Remarks**

Dr. McCulloch commenced the meeting by reading from Governor Easley's Executive Order No. 1, the "ethics awareness and conflict of interest reminder." No conflicts were reported.

Mr. Henderson announced that Ms. Kimberly Chapin has joined the staff as a Licensing Assistant in the Licensing Department. Ms. Cooke made introductions

Mr. Gupta provided training on the revised Board Book software.

#### Naturopathic Physician Licensing Act (Senate Bill 1080 Legislative Session 2007)

At the President's request, Dr. Norins met with Senator Kinnaird who was the primary sponsor of Senate Bill 1080 which was not acted on during this legislative session. Sen. Kinnaird is championing an initiative to license naturopathic providers who would diagnose a variety of ailments and offer treatment with an armatarium of "natural" products such as herbal preparations, nutraceuticals and other products. The proposed bill recognizes the

need for providing assurance to the public that naturopaths who offer their services have met a minimum standard of training and competence. Dr. Norins noted the wide scope of practice established in this bill and the pitfalls ahead including opposition or conflict with others with overlapping jurisdictional claims.

Dr. Norins recommends that the Board explore whether the licensing and regulation of naturopaths is needed to protect the public and, if so, whether Senate Bill 1080 is the best way to proceed.

#### Administrative Licenses and Noncertifications

Since 2005 the Board has issued approximately 12 Limited Administrative Licenses via consent orders to individuals who had not been engaged in active clinical practice for a significant period but, unlike most reentry candidates, did not desire to return to clinical practice. Most of these applicants are researchers for pharmaceutical companies or working in the insurance industry doing utilization review work. NCGS § 58-50-61 speaks to who may perform utilization reviews. "...a medical doctor licensed to practice medicine in this State shall evaluate the clinical appropriateness of noncertifications." Legal staff asked if physicians holding only a limited administrative license are permitted by law to make noncertifications. A discussion ensued. One Board Member stated, "Persons second guessing me should be as gualified as I am." Another Board Member pointed out that most utilization reviews and certifications are not done by physicians but by nursing personnel. It was also pointed out that pathologist and radiologist don't see patients in a clinical setting either. Another factor is the Board's increasing focus on continued competence. Even so, if a physician was issued a full license to do utilization reviews and continued to do these for a number of years would that be an issue since they had not technically been in a clinical setting for those years? At some point would they have to go through a reentry process (again)? There appears to be no controversy about who does "certifications," the Board is concerned with who makes the "noncertification" decision. Concern was expressed that if a full license is required there may be some far reaching implications with the insurance companies.

**Motion:** A motion passed that noncertifications (utilization reviews) in North Carolina need to be done by a licensee who holds a full unrestricted license. For initial applications, if the practitioner has been out of clinical practice for more than two years the applicant must appear for an interview to be assessed. (Opposed – Saunders, Robinson, Sathiraju, Lennon; Absent – Moffatt, Lewis)

#### Project Lazarus – Prescription Naloxone in Wilkes County, NC

Dr. Rhyne announced that Wilkes County will has proposed a pilot program for the prescription and distribution of Naloxone for overdose prevention in Wilkes County, to be called Project Lazarus. Wilkes County has one of the highest overdose death rates in the state, on par with the highest anywhere in the country. Several task forces including the Northwest Community Care Network (NCCN), Wilkes County Chronic Pain Initiative, and Wilkes Community Health Council Substance Abuse Task Force have adopted a multi-dimensional approach to reduce opioid overdose deaths. They have asked for the Board's view of this initiative.

**Action:** The President referred this issue to the Policy Committee for additional information and to bring a recommendation back to the Board.

#### NCGS § 90-16. (e1) ... Board to keep public records.

One of the changes to the Medical Practice Act, effective October 1, 2007 is the following additional language to G.S. 90-16:

(e1) When the Board receives a complaint regarding the care of a patient, the Board shall inform the complainant of the disposition of the Board's inquiry into the complaint and the Board's basis for that disposition. Upon written request of a patient, the Board may provide the patient a licensee's written response to a complaint filed by the patient with the Board regarding the patient's care. Upon written request of a complainant, who is not the patient but is authorized by State and federal law to receive protected health information about the patient, the Board may provide the complainant a licensee's written response to a complaint filed with the Board regarding the patient's care. Any information furnished to the patient or complainant pursuant to this subsection shall be inadmissible in evidence in any civil proceeding. However, information, documents, or records otherwise available are not immune from discovery or use in a civil action merely because they were included in the Board's review or were the subject of information furnished to the patient or complainant pursuant to this subsection.

A discussion ensued regarding establishment of protocols for possible dissemination of a licensee's written response to a complaint filed by the patient/complainant with the Board regarding the patient's care.

Motion: A motion passed as follows:

- In the initial letter to licensees advising them of the complaint, licensees will be advised that due to a change in the law a copy of their response may be provided to the complainant but that response may not be used by the patient/complainant in a civil proceeding.
- As complaints are reviewed by OMD, they will indicate whether they believe, in accordance with guidance by the Board, it would be appropriate to send a copy of the licensee's response to the patient/complainant. The SSRC, the appropriate committee and the Board will review this recommendation and make the final decision.
- If a duly authorized person requests a copy of the response, staff will advise the complainant that the request must be in writing. When the written request is received, staff will look to see if the Board has approved release of the response. An appropriate letter will be sent to the complainant.

Time will be set aside at the September meeting for the Board to discuss the following specific issues as part of the above protocol: (a) will the complainant be notified about the change to the law that permits the Board to share a licensee's response?; (b) are there instances where it would be better to provide a summary of the response or a redacted copy instead of the entire response?; and (c) in determining whether to release a copy of the response, should the criteria be (1) don't send unless it so will be beneficial to the patient, or (2) do send unless it would be harmful to the patient?

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## CONTINUED COMPETENCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Michael Norins, MD, Chair; Peggy Robinson, PA-C

The Continued Competence Committee of the North Carolina Medical Board was called to order at 3:15 p.m., Thursday, July 19, 2007, at the office of the Board. Members present were: Michael Norins, MD, Chair; and Peggy Robinson, PA-C. Also attending were: Michael Sheppa, MD, Medical Director; and Jeffery Denton, Recorder (Staff). Absent was Thomas Mansfield, JD, Director, Legal Department (Staff).

#### NC Summit – Formulating an Action Plan

Dr. Norins reported that Dr. Newton, Head of the Pediatric Department, Brody School of medicine has made available a residency program for an applicant of the Board. **Action:** Dr. Sheppa is to draft a thank you letter for Dr. Newton.

Dr. Sheppa reported he has met with Duke Representatives from the summit. He will be meeting with UNC representatives to explore their interest in establishing an evaluation program and/or a remediation program. He will continue to move forward with the goal of establishing an instate evaluation program and developing a remediation program with the medical schools. These two efforts may or may not be linked.

#### **Registration Questionnaire Review**

Background: It has been noted that the questions on the annual registration form that relate to not being in the active practice of medicine, the whys and what have you really been doing are all optional responses. Thus, no reliable data along this line is available. A motion passed to reevaluate subject questions and make answering them "mandatory." This relates to those questions along the line of being out of the active practice of medicine, why and what are you doing. Reviewing the registration questionnaire is a priority for the Continued Competence Committee. Reviewers will be looking for more specific questions pertaining to practice activity and how to refine questions to be useful in identifying physicians that may be in need of reentry type education.(May 2007)

Update: The Physician Registration From was reviewed. There is a consensus that the time has come to do something about physicians that are not practicing medicine but keeping their licenses without continued clinical experience.

**Full Board Motion:** A motion passed recommending that the registration form be modified as follows:

Where the "Are you engaged in direct patient care" equals "**NO**" – they should read as follows:

- $\Box$  retired from active practice
- □ not in practice since \_\_\_\_\_
- percent of time employed in a non-medical field \_\_\_\_\_
- □ percent of time primarily doing research, teaching, or administration related to

#### Self-terminating Reentry Orders

The committee feels that once a reentry program is satisfactorily completed it does not need to come back Board for additional action. The committee believes that in these cases the congratulatory letter can be sent without additional board action. This could be handled at the staff level.

**Full Board Motion:** A motion passed that once reentry programs are satisfactorily completed, the appropriate staff is authorized to send the congratulatory letter, and report in the course of business to the Board and part of the compliance report.

#### CME

The subject of how to make CME meaningful and a reliable indicator of continued competency. At some point in the future look at making physicians with hospital privileges exempt from CME audits.

**Update:** Mr. Henderson stated that the current policy was to look at CME in three cases: (1) open investigations, (2) those invited for informal interviews, and (3) those that report less than the required 150 hours in three years. He indicated the first two cases are being done routinely; however, the third case is a complicated programming issue and being developed by Mr. Hari Gupta, Operations Department Director, and that it will eventually show results. He stated that the Board has limited resources to deal with random audits and it would be a fairly big undertaking.

Action: Mr. Henderson will report back to the committee in September with a proposal. Full Board Motion: A motion passed to move forward in the development of random audits. ABMS constituent boards and self study programs should be exempt from the audits.

A motion passed to close the session to prevent the disclosure of information that is confidential pursuant to sections 90-8, 90-14, 90-16, and 90-21.22 of the North Carolina General Statutes and not considered a public record within the meaning of Chapter 132 of the General Statutes.

The Continued Competence Committee reported on one investigative case. A written report was presented for the Board's review. The Board adopted the Committee's recommendation to approve the written report. The specifics of this report are not included because these actions are not public information.

A motion passed to return to open session.

The next regular meeting of the Continued Competence Committee is tentatively set for Thursday, September 20, 2007.

**Motion:** A motion passed to approve the Continued Competence Committee minutes as modified.

## **BEST PRACTICES AD HOC COMMITTEE REPORT**

The Best Practice Ad Hoc Committee of the North Carolina Medical Board was called to order at 12:40 p.m., Wednesday, August 15, 2007, at the office of the Board. Members present were: George Saunders, MD, Chair; Janelle Rhyne, MD; Michael Norins, MD; Robert Moffatt; MD;

Ralph Loomis, MD; and Donald Jablonski, DO. Also attending were: H. Arthur McCulloch, MD, President; David Henderson, JD, Executive Director (Staff); Nancy Hemphill, Special Projects Coordinator; and Jeffery Denton, Recorder (Staff).

Topics were discussed as follows:

#### **Topic E:** Board Officers and Composition (Moffatt, Loomis)

Appoint committee to study role of officers, Executive Committee, nomination process, also:

- Study internal governance of Board from top to bottom.
- Study structure, makeup and function of the Executive Committee.
- Look at officer structure of Executive Committee (chairman vs. president, etc.).
- Look at the current automatic succession system.
- Consider separate nominating and executive committees. Nomination input is desired from the entire body.
- Make current Executive Committee activities/functions both transparent and *inclusive*.

**Update:** Due to time restrictions and input from the Selection Process Ad Hoc Committee this item is tabled till the July Committee Meeting. (May 2007)

**Update:** Due to time restrictions Dr. Loomis and Dr. Moffatt will write up a recommendation and send it to committee members. A special meeting of the committee will occur during lunch at the August Board Meeting to review this item. (July 2007)

**Update:** Dr. Loomis and Dr. Moffatt reported as follows: They recommend only minor changes to the Executive Committee structure. By combining the secretary/treasurer position and adding a member at large position this will allow for a shorter de facto succession period. It was noted that a succession plan is not part of the bylaws with the current succession trend being a de facto plan. This proposal will provide flexibility to deal with all possible contingencies. The Nominating Committee should be comprised of the Executive Committee and all Board Members being afforded the opportunity to attend this committee meeting, commenting on the slate, and voting on it. Officer terms should remain as one year with the turnover date being October 31 yearly. There is value to the current system of tutoring. It takes years of watching to do the Presidential job well, especially as Hearing Officer. It is felt the actions of the Executive Committees meet at the same time precluding all Board Members from attending the Executive Committee meetings. (August 2007)

#### Specific Recommendations to the Full Board:

• Study internal governance of Board from top to bottom. No changes

recommended.

- Study structure, makeup and function of the Executive Committee. Officers to consist of President, President-Elect, and Secretary/Treasurer. Executive Committee to consist of above officers plus Immediate Past President and Member at Large.
- Look at officer structure of Executive Committee (chairman vs. president, etc.). No changes recommended.
- Look at the current automatic succession system. There is only a perceived automatic succession system in that under the current bylaws any Board member may be elected to any office (although it is implied that the President-Elect will be elected as President). At the time of the annual election, it should be made clear that any Board member is eligible for any officer position.
- Consider separate nominating and executive committees. Nomination input is desired from the entire body. The Executive Committee and the remaining members of the Board will convene as a Nominating Committee to nominate and elect officers to the Board. A simple majority will suffice.
- Make current Executive Committee activities/functions both transparent and inclusive. No changes recommended. All Executive Committee activities/functions are on the Board Book for other members to review and are, therefore, transparent. Board workload does not permit scheduling the Executive Committee meetings at a time when all other Board members may attend.
- **By Laws:** The bylaws will need to be modified to accomplish the above. It is recommended that the entire by laws be looked at during this process. The forum for this process is left up to the President.

**Update:** It was suggested that the past (outgoing) president review the by laws yearly. Initially, Dr. McCulloch and Dr. Moffatt will do a joint review this year.

**Board Letterhead:** Board letterhead should contain names of the officers and all Board Members. If possible, the letterhead should not be changed more than once a year.

The next regular meeting of the Best Practice Ad Hoc Committee is tentatively set for Thursday, November 15, 2007.

Motion: A motion passed to approve the Best Practices Committee report as modified.

#### Bowman, James Thomas MD – North Wilkesboro, NC

Denial

Dr. Bowman's application for reinstatement of his medical license was denied. The denial was based on his past history with the Board, the requirement of an intensive reentry period and possibly further training since he has not practiced medicine since 2002, his criminal history, and his probation violation in 2003.

#### Chen, Chih-Cheng, MD – Wilmington, NC

Disciplinary

Dr. Chen was charged with administering injections of Marcaine for myofacial pain without sufficient scientific and evidence based rationale.

HEARING: August 15-16, 2007.

Dr. Chen was represented by Bruce Allen. The Board was represented by Marcus Jimison.

**BOARD ACTION**: Reprimand, discontinue use of injections at issue, and improve charting to satisfy Medicare standards.

#### Crummie, Robert Gwinn MD – Rutherfordton, NC

Dr. Crummie was charged with unprofessional conduct for a history of alcohol abuse.

August 15, 2007 hearing continued to October 17, 2007

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#### Fann, Benjamin Bradley MD – Asheville, NC

Disciplinary

Dr. Fann was charged with unprofessional conduct by practicing below the standard of care in NC, demonstrating disruptive behavior with staff and patients, and failing to inform patients that his hospital privileges were suspended.

#### Fedak, Jason R PA – Wilmington, NC

#### Mauskar, Anant, MD – Houston, TX

Out of State – Texas

On June 2, 2006, the Texas Board and MD entered into an agreed order suspending his license indefinitely, staying the suspension and placing him on probation under numerous terms and conditions. The action was based on MD's conviction in Federal

Court of conspiracy to commit health care fraud and of health care fraud, which conviction is now on appeal.

HEARING: August 16, 2007

Dr. Mauskar did not attend and was not represented by counsel. The Board was represented by Brian Blankenship.

**BOARD ACTION**: Indefinite Suspension. Suspension stayed immediately if MD complies with the Texas Order.

#### Sebhat, Berhan MD – Durham, NC

Disciplinary

Dr. Sebhat was charged with failing to comply with his October 2006 Consent Order.

HEARING: August 16, 2007.

Dr. Sebhat did not attend was not represented by counsel. The Board was represented by Brian Blankenship.

#### BOARD ACTION: Revoke

#### Sleeper, Arthur Michael MD - Martinsville, VA

Out of State – Virginia

Dr. Sleeper was charged based on action taken by the Virginia Board determining that MD engaged in a personal, romantic relationship with a patient. The Virginia Board issued a letter of Reprimand.

Case was settled prior to August 15, 2007 hearing through a pre-approved Consent Order

Dr. Sleeper was not represented by counsel. The Board was represented by Brian Blankenship.

#### Washington, Clarence Joseph MD - Cary, NC

Disciplinary

Dr. Washington was charged with writing prescriptions for close family members without maintaining proper written records.

August 15, 2007 hearing was continued

Dr. Washington was not represented by counsel. The Board was represented by Brian Blankenship.

#### Wurster, Samuel, MD – Cary, NC Disciplinary

On March 15, 2006, the Board charged Dr. Wurster in connection with his serving as medical director for a laser hair removal clinic in Raleigh.

August 15, 2007 hearing was continued to consider a proposed Consent Order

Dr. Wurster was represented by Richard Vanore The Board was represented by Brian Blankenship

**BOARD ACTION**: Accept proposed Consent Order

<u>Legislation</u> – Mr. Mansfield summarized the following legislation passed in the 2007 session of the General Assembly for the Board.

#### HOUSE BILL 818 SESSION LAW 2007-346

AN ACT TO AMEND THE LAWS PERTAINING TO THE PRACTICE OF MEDICINE AND TO AMEND THE LAWS PERTAINING TO THE PRACTICE OF DENTISTRY.

- The current Medical Practice Act lacks certain basic provisions that are commonly found in statutes governing similarly situated Boards including, a definition section and a section describing and prescribing the powers and duties of the Board.
- This bill creates a definition section of commonly used terms and clearly defines the powers and duties of the Board. Among the most important is the ability of the Board to regulate the retention and disposition of medical records and, when necessary, appoint a custodian of medical records abandoned by a physician who has passed away or disappeared.
- This bill enhances the ability of the Board to conduct disciplinary hearings by allowing the use of "hearing officers". Presently, only Board members can conduct disciplinary hearings. This bill will allow the Board to use as hearing officers, current and <u>past</u> Board members and any current or retired member of the state or federal judiciary. It is anticipated that this will allow the Board to conduct additional disciplinary hearings by increasing the pool of available hearing officers.
- This bill will result in a more public friendly medical practice act.
- This bill reorganizes the entire Medical Practice Act in logical manner and incorporates many existing rules into the statute so that the public and physicians can more easily find the law relevant to them.
- The bill changes the Board member selection process by establishing an independent review panel to make recommendations to the Governor for appointments to the Board.
- This bill also establishes qualifications that physicians, physician assistants, and nurse practitioners must meet to be eligible for a position on the Medical Board.
- The bill creates an online profile that will provide greater information to the public about physicians and physician assistants.

- The online profile will include information such as certain criminal convictions, disciplinary action taken by other state and federal agencies, and certain malpractice information.
- On behalf of dental board, this bill creates a volunteer dentist license.
- A volunteer dentist may not charge a fee and may volunteer to work only at certain hospitals, at non-profit clinics serving low-income populations, or as a volunteer for the State.

### HOUSE BILL 1381 RATIFIED BILL

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE NORTH CAROLINA RESPIRATORY CARE BOARD TO RAISE THE CEILING ON CERTAIN LICENSURE FEES AND AUTHORIZING THE NORTH CAROLINA MEDICAL BOARD TO ESTABLISH AND INCREASE CERTAIN FEES.

- The sections relating to the Medical Board are primarily a reorganization of existing law.
- The licensing provisions will appear in sequence instead of scattered through the Medical Practice Act.
- The provisions of the repealed sections have been moved to new section numbers.
- The bill codifies several existing rules.
- The bill is revenue neutral.
- The only entirely new fee is for the Special Purpose License and will be set by rule.
- The Special Purpose License will permit physicians in good standing in other states to come to North Carolina to teach new techniques to North Carolina surgeons and physicians.
- The bill permits the Board to retain jurisdiction over lapsed licenses held by resident physicians in training.

## SENATE BILL 864 RATIFIED BILL
