

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS
OF NORTH CAROLINA

Blockade Runner, Wrightsville Beach, North Carolina

October 8 - 11th, 1964

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The Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina met at the Blockade Runner, Wrightsville Beach, North Carolina October 8-11th, 1964, for the purpose of interviewing applicants for license by endorsement of credentials, for special limited license and for other business.

The Board convened for dinner and Drs. Ralph G. Templeton, President, Joseph J. Combs, Secretary-Treasurer, James E. Davis, Frank Edmondson, H. Lee Large, Jr., W. Boyd Owen, Clark Rodman, Mrs. Louise J. McNeill, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, and Mrs. Betty Joe Cooke of the secretary's office, were present.

Credentials for license by endorsement of credentials and special limited license were reviewed by the Board.

Drs. Frank Edmondson, Joseph J. Combs and James E. Davis were appointed at the July, 1964 meeting on a committee to formulate some recommendations looking toward plans to set up some method whereby resident physicians coming into the state would meet the requirements of the Board before beginning to practice. This was precipitated by the lack of co-operation in the past. Dr. Frank Edmondson, Chairman, reported on the meeting of this committee September 30th, 1964, and presented the following recommendations:

1. That each resident physician shall have his required credentials in the secretary's office of the North Carolina Board of Medical Examiners before he begins working in a hospital.

2. If said credentials are complete and in the office, permission will be granted by the secretary's office for the resident to begin work. If he has not appeared, the resident will be required to appear before the Board of Medical Examiners at its next meeting thereafter.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the above committee's report be accepted and put into effect and become a part of the policies of the Board not later than July 1st, 1965. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the committee be instructed to put into effect the liason committee meeting in January, 1965. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Paul Dalton Rudd, Denton, North Carolina - (See previous Minutes) - Dr. Frank Edmondson reported that he had been contacted on two occasions by physicians in that area concerning Dr. Rudd's use of alcohol.



Dr. Rudd continued

Dr. Edmondson said that he made a trip to Denton to investigate and learned that he had probably been under the influence of alcohol since he moved and that in his opinion he was in no condition to practice medicine. He stated that he contacted Dr. Rudd's brother, who was eager for assistance, and that he, Dr. Edmondson, had him committed under court order to John Umstead Hospital on or about September 30th, 1964. Dr. Edmondson advised that it was the brother's desire for Dr. Rudd to be required to remain there for more than thirty days in order that he could obtain the necessary treatment.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that information be obtained prior to the next meeting of the Board of Medical Examiners with regard to Dr. Paul Dalton Rudd; that he be directed to appear before the Board at that time. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. W. Boyd Owen and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. John G. Craddock - To summarize, Dr. Craddock appeared before the Board in January, 1964, with regard to his narcotic addiction, at which time he surrendered his order form, narcotic tax stamp and drugs alleged on hand. He was advised of the seriousness of his situation and the Board directed that he appear in one year.

The secretary reported at this time that the State Bureau of Investigation upon investigation ascertained that Dr. Craddock had written prescriptions for narcotic drugs since he had surrendered his narcotic tax stamp and that at the time of the investigation he was employed in medical research only at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine, and is under the care of Dr. Fred Hine of Duke University School of Medicine for his problem.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that this be received as information; that the directive of the Board be carried out and that he appear in January, 1965. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Bennie Brooks Ward, Shallotte, North Carolina - The secretary reported that he first received report of the State Bureau of Investigation as of August 31st, 1964, advising that Dr. Ward had surrendered his narcotic tax stamp; that he did not have a 1964-65 tax stamp, but advised that he had applied for same from the Internal Revenue Service; that when the Internal Revenue Service was contacted the information received was that Dr. Ward had not registered for narcotic tax stamp for 1964-65 as he had claimed.

Report of the State Bureau of Investigation of September 10th, 1964, revealed that Dr. Ward had been admitted to James Walker Memorial Hospital for treatment; that Dr. Ward's physician stated that Dr. Ward had admitted himself as a patient and said he was addicted to narcotics, which he had been taking in large quantities for approximately two years.

Report of the State Bureau of Investigation of September 18th, 1964, revealed that Dr. Ward had broken into Shallotte Rexall Drug Store on September 16th, 1964, and a quantity of narcotic drugs taken; that Dr. Ward had admitted breaking into the drug store and taking the narcotic drugs, but upon realizing what he had done he had disposed of the drugs. At the time this report was received by the secretary of the Board, Dr. Ward had been admitted to Pine Bluff Sanitarium for treatment.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the secretary stay in contact with this problem and that he exercise his discretion, with that of the president, as to what should be presented to the Board. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Frank Edmondson and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. James P. Westmoreland - The secretary reported that he had received information from the Virginia Board of Medical Examiners with regard to narcotic irregularities on the part of Dr. Westmoreland; also the advice that Dr. Westmoreland had left Norfolk, Virginia, and it was understood that he had gone to South Carolina. The secretary reported that before having received this information his office endorsed Dr. Westmoreland to the South Carolina Board of Medical Examiners.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that this be received as information and if information is obtained that he is practicing in the State of North Carolina, that he be requested to appear before the Board of Medical Examiners. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Frank Edmondson and passed unanimously.

RE: Biennial Registration - Reinstatement - The licenses of the following physicians were suspended for failure to register as required by General Statutes of North Carolina 90-15.11 and have now registered:

 Dr. John Dempsey Huitt
 Dr. John E. Zeliff
 Dr. Milton A. Honigman
 Dr. Clarence Ford Clark, Jr.

VERDICT: RESOLVED that the medical licenses of the above physicians be reinstated.

RE: The secretary presented proposal in the sum of \$364.00, plus tax, for a Remington electric typewriter for the registration office as the typewriter now in use is about beyond repair.

VERDICT: Dr. W. Boyd Owen moved that a new typewriter be purchased at the discretion of the secretary. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. James E. Davis and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Richard Dominick Knapp, who had accepted a staff position in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine, failed to pass the written examination in June, 1964, for medical license. Prior to that time he had a special limited license to cover him as a resident at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. He has now applied for renewal of his special limited license to cover him as a fellow in the Department of Psychiatry there until he can repeat the written examination for medical license.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the special limited license of Dr. Richard Dominick Knapp be renewed to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine until he can take the 1965 written examination for medical license. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Frank Edmondson and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Tong Su Kim held special limited license to the State Hospitals for residency training from 1957 to 1962, after which he left this country. He has returned to accept a staff position with Western Carolina Center, Morganton. Dr. Kim entered the country from Jamaica by authority of parole to the defense for the purpose of first preference alien awaiting a number. The authorities with the Department of Mental Health thought that everything had been cleared for Dr. Kim to enter as an immigrant and they did not learn otherwise until he had arrived here. Dr. Kim is now applying for renewal of his special limited license to be limited to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine in order that he may continue in a training status until August 1st, 1965, to be assigned to Western Carolina Center at Morganton.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the special limited license of Dr. Tong Su Kim be renewed to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine until he can take the 1965 examination for medical license, provided he has received immigrant visa. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Ramon V. Canent, Jr., native of the Philippine Islands, held a special limited license to Duke University School of Medicine from 1961 to 1963 to cover him as a fellow in Pediatric Cardiology. He applied in May, 1964 to take our written examination for medical license, but had not at that time received his immigrant visa. Dr. Canent has now advised that he is a research trainee in Pediatric Cardiology at Duke University School of Medicine and has applied for special limited license.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the special limited license of Dr. Ramon V. Canent, Jr. be renewed to Duke University School of Medicine until he can take the 1965 examination for medical license, provided he has received immigrant visa. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. William David Clarkson was granted license limited to Duke University School of Medicine in October, 1961, to cover him as a resident. He has now accepted the position of director of Alamance County Mental Health Clinic and has applied for conversion from limited to full license. He has met the requirements of the Board.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license of Dr. William David Clarkson be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Alvin D. Couch was granted license limited to Charlotte Memorial Hospital in July, 1955, to cover him as a resident. He plans to enter solo practice of Urological Surgery in Charlotte October 15th, 1964. He is applying for conversion from limited to full license. His credentials are incomplete.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license of Dr. Alvin D. Couch be converted to full license upon completion of requirements. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Alton Ray Mayberry was granted limited license to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine in October, 1961 to cover him as a resident. He will complete his training October 31st, 1964, and will be at the Mental Health Clinic in Sanford on a part-time basis, will do part-time practice of Psychiatry in Durham and part-time assistant in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. He is applying for conversion of limited to full license. His credentials are complete.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license of Dr. Alton Ray Mayberry be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. John E. Zeliff was granted license limited to Duke University School of Medicine in August, 1963, to cover him as a resident. He is now Pediatric Consultant with Maternal and Child Health, State Board of Health, and has applied for conversion of limited to full license. His credentials are complete.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis that the limited license of Dr. John Zeliff be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.



RE: Dr. Ernesto de la Torre was granted license limited to Forsyth County North Carolina on the basis of written examination until he became a naturalized citizen. He has now presented evidence that he has received Certificate of Naturalization No. 85555789, dated June 5th, 1964, and has applied for conversion of limited to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license of Dr. Ernesto de la Torre be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Ramon Barton Jenkins was granted license limited to the University of North Carolina School of Medicine on the basis of written examination until he became a naturalized citizen. He has now presented evidence that he has received Certificate of Naturalization No. 8492165, dated July 10th, 1964, and has applied for conversion of limited to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license of Dr. Ramon Barton Jenkins be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Shankar Nath Kapoor was granted license limited to Duke University School of Medicine on the basis of written examination until he became a naturalized citizen. He has now presented evidence that he has received Certificate of Naturalization No. 8555748 dated December 5th, 1963, and has applied for conversion of limited to full license.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that the limited license of Dr. Shankar Nath Kapoor be converted to full license. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Federation of State Medical Boards - 1965 Meeting - The secretary presented letter from the secretary of the Federation urging the assistant secretaries to attend this meeting.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the Board of Medical Examiners defray the initial expenses of Mrs. Louise J. McNeill, Assistant Secretary, if she elects to go to this meeting. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Yoon C. Kim - The secretary presented correspondence from Dr. Robert S. Shacklett with regard to Dr. Kim, a graduate of a foreign medical school, being licensed by endorsement of credentials.

VERDICT: Dr. Clark Rodman moved that Dr. Robert S. Shacklett be advised that Dr. Yoon C. Kim's case had been considered by the Board of Medical Examiners and that it was unanimously decided that Dr. Kim did not meet the requirements for license by endorsement of credentials. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. James E. Davis and passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned.

The following applicants for license by endorsement of credentials were interviewed:

RE: Dr. Robert Randolph Bradham appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a fellow in Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery.

Dr. Davis: How long do you anticipate being at Duke?
 A. One or two years

Dr. Bradham continued

Dr. Davis: Do you plan to return to the University of South Carolina?

A. That is questionable, I plan to return to South Carolina.

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any trouble with narcotics or barbiturates?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Robert Randolph Bradham was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. William Diuguid Daniels appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He is a native of North Carolina. He stated that he planned to do general practice in New Bern.

Dr. Davis: Is this on a permanent basis?

A. Temporary because I have been drafted in the Army.

Q. You have plans to return to North Carolina?

A. Yes sir

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board? A. No

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. Yes

Q. What was that?

A. Arrested for driving intoxicated. He said that this occurred while in his teens; that he did not appear in court; that it was taken care of by his father.

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with barbiturates or narcotics?

A. No

Dr. Edmondson: Have you ever used alcohol to excess since? A. No

Dr. Templeton: You know the requirements of the North Carolina law about registering your license every two years?

A. No sir

Q. It has to be registered while in service. If you do not, when you come back, you have to pay back registration and penalty.

Dr. Rodman: When do you want to go to work?

A. As soon as possible, I am going in with another doctor.

VERDICT: Dr. William Diuguid Daniels was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Charles Spurgeon Purden appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He has had 20 years active duty in the Navy and plans to locate in Rockingham with Dr. A. S. Covington on or about January 1st, 1965. His wife is a native of North Carolina.

Dr. Davis: You anticipate no hitch on being discharged?

A. I have a letter indicating my papers are being processed for discharge in January, 1965.

Q. You have arrangements with Dr. Covington to go to practice in January?

A. Yes



Dr. Durden continued

Dr. Davis: Do you have a home there?

A. We have been looking.

Q. Why are you leaving the Navy?

A. I have 20 years.

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the use or handling of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. None at all

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board?

A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Charles Spurgeon Durden was approved for license by endorsement of credentials upon completion of credentials, if and when he locates in the state for the practice of medicine, within one year.

RE: Dr. Kenneth Rushton Fourcher appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He has retired from New York and moved to Chapel Hill. He does not intend to do private practice, but perhaps will do some part-time work at the University. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Preventive Medicine.

Dr. Davis: Do you have any commitment at the University?

A. No commitment, only informal discussion, they said they thought it could be arranged. I am tired now and when the next semester begins I may think about doing some work. I have been 34 years with the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. I have traveled a good many places abroad. This was mainly administrative, our medical services abroad.

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board?

A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling or use of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Kenneth Rushton Fourcher was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Joe Ivy Gillespie appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Ears, Nose and Throat.

Dr. Edmondson: How long will you be there?

A. One more year

Dr. Templeton: Do you plan to remain in North Carolina?

A. I do not know, I am not sure.

Q. Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board?

A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in handling or using narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Joe Ivy Gillespie was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. Henry Dailey Haberyan, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Edmondson: What type of work will you do?

A. Pathologist for the Wilson Memorial Hospital. There are no path-

ologists in the town and I am sure that some pathology will be referred to me.

Q. You will do your work at the hospital?

A. Yes, my agreement does not include that I can not set a laboratory up.

Q. Have you made definite arrangements about coming to Wilson?

A. Yes, I have moved my family and am waiting for licensure.

Dr. Haberyan stated that he had not had a narcotic license since he was an interne; that he did not write narcotic prescriptions; that he had not applied since that time.

Dr. Rodman: Are you going to cover any other towns?

A. The administrator has told me several other hospitals in surrounding towns have made inquiry about using the pathologist.

Dr. Is yours percentage?

A. Percentage

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling or use of barbiturates, alcohol or narcotics? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board? A. No

Dr. Henry Dailey Haberyan, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Jimmie Lee Harris appeared July 24th, 1964 and was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when he located in the state for practice, within one year. Dr. Harris advised his home address in Winston-Salem and what his office address would be.

VERDICT: Dr. Jimmie Lee Harris was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. James Hollins Lipsey, Jr. appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials and stated that he would be associated with Orthopaedic Associates, Asheville.

Dr. Edmondson: When do you contemplate beginning work?

A. As soon as possible

Q. Where have you been?

A. Finished my training 15 months ago and since have been in viet Nam.

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any examining board? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling or use of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. Do you have a home in Asheville ?

A. Yes sir

Q. You are living where now? A. Yes sir

Dr. Dombs: Have you ever been a member of organized medicine?

A. No

Q. So you are not a member of the American Medical Association?

A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. James Hollins Lipsey, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.



RE: Dr. Charles Willis Neville, Jr. appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He has an appointment as an associate in the Department of Psychiatry at Duke University School of Medicine.

- Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Charles Willis Neville, Jr. was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. George Hancock Nutt appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Surgery. He stated that he began his training August 18th, 1964.

 Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the use or handling of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No
 Q. You will be given two weeks to complete all credentials or your training program will be interrupted.

VERDICT: Dr. George Hancock Nutt was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, if and when his credentials are completed satisfactory to the secretary, and he will be required to have the same completed within two weeks. (Credentials completed)

RE: Dr. Frederick Stanley Porter appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials. He stated that he is an associate professor of Pediatrics at Duke.

- Dr. Owen: Have you ever belonged to a medical society?
 A. I never have.
 Q. Where have you been since 1955?
 A. Boston Children's Hospital three years, following that University of Arkansas as assistant professor until I came here.
 Dr. Templeton : Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir
 Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board? A. No sir
 Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling or use of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No sir
 Q. Have you established residence in Durham?
 A. Yes
 Q. You are already teaching?
 A. Yes

VERDICT: Dr. Frederick Stanley Porter was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Jack Monroe Smith appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, where he is an assistant resident in Surgery.

- Dr. Combs: How long have you been there?
 A. August 1st



Dr. Smith continued

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Jack Monroe Smith was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine.

RE: Dr. Dean Gale Waters appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Large : What have you been doing?

A. In the Army, now at Fort Bragg and have been there almost a year. I am chief of the Obstetrical Department.

Q. What do you plan to do?

A. I have made arrangements to go in practice at Mt. Airy at the end of this year.

Q. When do you get out of the Army?

A. December 31st

Q. Do you have arrangements to go to Mt. Airy?

A. I have signed a lease for office and am building a home there and have made other commitments.

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board?

A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling or use of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No sir

Q. What if you do not get discharged?

A. Pending crisis in Viet Nam I think I will get out.

VERDICT: Dr. Dean Gale Waters was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Frank Gavin Wilson appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials.

Dr. Large: What did you do between 1956 and 1963?

A. Practiced in Miami.

Q. What do you plan to do in North Carolina?

A. To go in practice with Dr. Richard D. Surnier, Hickory.

Q. Have you made arrangements?

A. Yes

Q. Have you moved your family?

A. No, I will in December.

Q. Have you signed a contract?

A. No, pending the decision of this Board.

Q. Have you made arrangements about a home?

A. No, that is part of my trip this time.

Q. It is the policy that we do not license any man until he has established a residence.

Dr. Wilson continued

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling or use of narcotics, alcohol or barbiturates? A. No

Q. Have you ever been convicted of a crime? A. No

Q. What type of practice have you been doing?

A. Obstetrics-Gynecology, the competition there is quite stiff. I have been made an offer by a classmate of mine, it is an attractive offer.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Gavin Wilson was approved for license by endorsement of credentials.

RE: Dr. Henry Van Peters Wilson III appeared with incomplete credentials applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Surgery. He said he had been there since July 1st.

Dr. Templeton: Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board?

A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the handling or use of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No

VERDICT: Dr. Henry Van Peters Wilson III was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Bowman Gray School of Medicine, credentials to be completed within two weeks.

RE: Dr. Edgar Ellis Strong appeared applying for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Anesthesiology. He stated that he had had a rotating internship and had been in the Air Force. He began his training August 17th, 1964.

Dr. Templeton : Have you ever been accused of a crime? A. No

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty with any medical examining board?

A. No sir

Q. Have you ever had any difficulty in the use or handling of narcotics, barbiturates or alcohol? A. No sir

VERDICT: Dr. Edgar Ellis Strong was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Duke University school of Medicine.

APPLICANTS FOR SPECIAL LIMITED LICENSE - FOREIGN MEDICAL GRADUATES - HOSPITAL RESIDENTS

RE: Dr. Heriberto Alfred Ferrari, graduate of the University of Buenos Aires, South America, in 1954, appeared applying for special limited license to Duke University school of Medicine, where he is a resident in Anesthesiology, for which he was approved on an annual basis.

RE: Dr. Thomas Selwyn Morley, graduate of St. Thomas Hospital Medical School, England, 1960, appeared applying for special limited license to Duke University school of Medicine, where he is a resident in Anesthesiology, for which he was approved on an annual basis.

RE: Dr. Vitalapura N. Venkatachala, graduate of Mysore University, India, appeared applying for special limited license to Watts Hospital, where he is a resident, for which he was approved on an annual basis.

Dr. Templeton: You understand that special limited license is for study purposes limited to your institution in which you are training, renewable annually, and another appearance is not required.

RE: Examination Institute 1964 - Federation of State Medical Boards - Dr. James E. Davis reported on this Institute, which he attended.

APPLICANTS FOR SPECIAL LIMITED LICENSE - HOSPITAL RESIDENTS

RE: Dr. Jackson Howard McCarter, graduate of the University of Pittsburgh in 1963, appeared applying for special limited license to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Pathology, for which he was approved on an annual basis.

RE: Dr. Herbert J. Gerber, graduate of the University of Pennsylvania in 1961, appeared applying for special limited license to Duke University School of Medicine, where he is a resident in Pathology, for which he was approved on an annual basis.

Dr. Templeton: Special limited license is for training purposes only. You are not eligible for narcotic license. It is renewable annually on application and recommendation from your chief of service.

RE: Medical Practice Act - The secretary advised that his office had exhausted its reprints of the Medical Practice Act; that he has made arrangements with the executive director of the North Carolina State Medical Society to publish the Medical Practice Act in the Medical Journal, for the Board to assume one-half of the expense for setting it up for printing and to purchase 1500 reprints.

VERDICT: Dr. Frank Edmondson moved that the Board of Medical Examiners approve the defraying of one-half of the expense of setting up the Medical Practice Act for printing and to purchase 1500 reprints of the same.

RE: Dr. Hubert A. Eaton, Wilmington, North Carolina - The secretary called the attention of the Board to publicity given with regard to charges preferred against him and he was instructed to ascertain what progress this case had made in the court.

The meeting was adjourned.

RE: Dr. E. J. Palacios - The secretary presented letter from Dr. Palacios, a Cuban refugee, requesting the privilege to take the written examination for medical license.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the secretary be instructed to advise Dr. E. J. Palacios that it is not the policy of the Board to grant one in his position the privilege of taking our written examination. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Frank Edmondson and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. R. Boza - The secretary presented letter from Dr. Boza, a Cuban physician, requesting the privilege to take the written examination for medical license.

VERDICT: Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that the secretary be instructed to advise Dr. R. Boza that it is not the policy of the Board to grant one in his position the privilege of taking our written examination. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Frank Edmondson and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Marcelino Amaya was granted special limited license to Murdoch Center to cover him as a staff physician until he could take the written examination in 1964, which he took and failed. He has remained

there since that time in an administrative capacity. He appeared at this time accompanied by Dr. John Fowler of the Department of Psychiatry at Duke University School of Medicine and Dr. J. F. Elliott, Superintendent of Murdoch Center, to petition for reinstatement of his special limited license to cover him for a fellowship to Duke University School of Medicine in Advanced Child Psychiatry in order to proceed with this work and participate in intensive review looking toward repeating the written examination, and work under Dr. Elliott's supervision.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Marcelino Amaya's special limited license be renewed to Duke University School of Medicine until he can take the written examination in June, 1965. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. Angelina V. Edralin Knox, graduate of the University of Santo Tomas, Philippines, holds the permanent certificate of the ECFMG and is married to a native of New Hanover County, North Carolina. She was granted special limited license to Rex Hospital in 1961, where she was a resident in Pediatrics. She is in this country on a non-immigrant visa. She has been offered a staff position at Dorothea Dix Hospital.

Dr. Knox appeared at this time to petition for renewal of her special limited license to Dorothea Dix Hospital in order that she might accept a staff position there and to also petition for the privilege of taking the written examination for medical licensure in 1965. She said she had been approved for immigrant visa and is awaiting receipt of the card and immigration number. She said she and her husband desire to remain in North Carolina.

VERDICT: Dr. Joseph J. Combs moved that the special limited license of Dr. Angelina V. Edralin Knox be renewed to work at Dorothea Dix Hospital on the staff and that she be approved to take the written examination in June, 1965, contingent upon presentation of immigration visa. This motion was duly seconded and passed unanimously. (Immigration card presented to the secretary)

RE: Dr. Wiley Royster Young - (See previous Minutes) - Dr. Young's license to practice medicine in this state was reinstated January 11th, 1964. He appeared at this time to petition for the Board's recommendation of reinstatement of his narcotic tax stamp.

VERDICT: Dr. James E. Davis moved that Dr. Wiley Royster Young's request for recommendation of reinstatement of narcotic tax stamp be denied. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Clark Rodman and passed unanimously.

RE: Dr. James Allen Greene on July 24th, 1964, was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Dorothea Dix Hospital, upon completion of credentials satisfactory to the secretary. Upon receipt of Dr. Greene's grades from the Mississippi Board of Medical Examiners it was found that his grades on the written examination did not meet the requirements of this Board. Thereupon, the secretary issued to Dr. Greene special limited license on an annual basis to cover him in his residency there. He was advised that upon completion of his training, if he desired to locate in this state for practice, it would either be necessary for him to repeat the examinations in which he was deficient by his original board or this Board.

VERDICT: The Board of Medical Examiners approved the action of the secretary in issuing Dr. James Allen Greene special limited license to Dorothea Dix Hospital to cover him in his residency training.

RE: Dr. Ernest Luther White on July 24th, 1964, was approved for license by endorsement of credentials, limited to Lincoln Hospital, upon completion of credentials, satisfactory to the secretary. Upon re-

ceipt of Dr. White's grades from the Mississippi Board of Medical Examiners it was found that his grades on the written examination did not meet the requirements of this Board. Thereupon, the secretary issued to Dr. White special limited license on an annual basis to cover him in his residency there. He was advised that upon completion of his training, if he desired to locate in the state for practice, it would either be necessary for him to repeat the examinations in which he was deficient by his original board or this Board.

VERDICT: The Board of Medical Examiners approved the action of the secretary in issuing Dr. Ernest Luther White special limited license to Lincoln Hospital to cover him in his residency training.

RE: Election of President - Dr. Clark Rodman nominated Dr. Hiram Lee Large, Jr. president of the Board of Medical Examiners for the coming year. Dr. Large was elected unanimously.

RE: Finance Committee - The incoming president appointed the Finance Committee as follows: Dr. Ralph G. Templeton, Chairman, and Drs. James E. Davis and Clark Rodman.

RE: Dr. Joe Robinson - To summarize Dr. Robinson was interviewed by the Board of Medical Examiners in May, 1961, with reference to an excessive amount of prescribing of narcotics following an investigation by the State Bureau of Investigation. At that time it was alleged that Dr. Robinson had taken narcotics and he was requested to surrender his narcotic tax stamp.

In 1962 Dr. Robinson went to South Carolina and took a position with the Veterans Administration Hospital.

In June, 1963 Dr. Robinson was indicted in the United States District Court for the Middle District of North Carolina for failure to file income tax returns. He plead guilty and was committed to custody of the Attorney General for imprisonment for a period of one year each on two counts and for study. He remained in custody for five months and was evaluated psychiatrically.

Dr. Robinson appeared at this time and stated that he planned to return to his home, Reidsville, North Carolina, and practice medicine. He said that he was under the care of a psychiatrist in Greensboro and that when he saw him in June, he advised that he should be back at work, as his situation had stabilized. Dr. Robinson discussed with the Board the difficulty he had had with regard to failure to file his income tax returns, which lead to his indictment and conviction.


Dr. Robinson was advised that his license was in effect; that he would remain under surveillance; that the Board appreciated his frankness; that the Board would not recommend that he get his narcotic tax stamp. The secretary was instructed that he not be seen under one year.

RE: Salary of Assistant Secretary - Dr. H. Lee Large, Jr. moved that this salary be raised to \$5400.00 per year. This motion was duly seconded by Dr. Frank Edmondson and passed unanimously.

The Minutes for the July, 1964 meeting were approved as read.

Dr. Frank Edmondson and Dr. Ralph G. Templeton were elected to the Board of Medical Examiners for two years and took office November 1st, 1962. This was their last meeting under this tenure. These two physicians were re-elected to the Board of Medical Examiners by the State Medical Society in May, 1964, for a term of six years each.

The meeting was adjourned.
